

TEITON SKY FLEET RAIDS ALBION AGAIN

London Defenses Repel All
Enemy Machines; Bombs
Drop in Suburbs.

47 DIE IN FIRST ATTACK

Injured Number 160—Property
Damage Slight—Three Germans
Perish When Their Blazing
Machine Falls 10,000 Feet.

LONDON, Jan. 29.—(Special.)—Another hostile air raid over Eastern England began at 9:20 o'clock last night, and up to the present hour is still in progress, according to an official communication just issued.

None of the enemy machines has yet been able to penetrate the London defenses, although there are reports that bombs have been dropped in the outskirts of the city.

The communication says:

"Hostile airplanes crossed the coast of Essex and Kent about 9:30 P. M. Some machines attempted to penetrate into London about an hour later.

"Up to the present none of them has succeeded in penetrating the London defenses. Some bombs are reported as having been dropped in the outskirts.

"The raid is still in progress."

LONDON, Jan. 29.—German airplanes made their first attack of the year upon London and its suburbs last night. Their bombs inflicted casualties, and caused damage to property.

Most Victims Londoners.

All the victims except one of the killed and seven of the injured were in the London area, itself. No serious material damage was done.

The raiders lost one machine, which fell in flames from a height of 10,000 feet. Its three occupants were burned to death.

A large number of machines came over the coast in relays, but apparently only three or four succeeded in getting through the barrage and dropping bombs into the town. The gun fire lasted intermittently through five hours.

British Flyers Alert.

The British flyers were more active than ever before, having gained experience in night flying. Besides the Gotha, brought down by British scouts over Essex, one was pursued over London by the scouting forces and the battle of machine guns in the air was plainly heard from the streets.

There was a full moon and no clouds or winds. The population had ample time for securing shelter, adequate warning having been given.

The tube railways and buildings of strong construction were crowded during the raid, but the audiences assembled at most of the theaters saw the performances through.

The House of Lords was sitting when the raiders first appeared and it continued its deliberations until midnight, with an attendance of 40 peers, which was a fair number for that body.

The House of Commons had adjourned a few moments before the warning was given.

Hodge Urges Reprisals.

John Hodge, the Minister of Pensions, was addressing a public meeting in Battersea, attended by 1500 persons, when the raid began. He declared that the only regret was that the Germans had not been given months ago a taste of what they were giving Londoners.

"When a squadron of British and French airplanes bombarded Karlsruhe," he remarked, "what a whining cry was set up about bombing 'my beloved Karlsruhe'."

RED GUARD IN CONTROL

HELSINKI FALLS INTO HANDS
OF REVOLUTIONISTS.

Swedish Troops Said to Have Arrived
at Tornea and Clashed With
Finnish Troops.

COPENHAGEN, Jan. 29.—The Red
Guard has won complete control of
Helsinki, capital of Finland, a Stock-
holm dispatch to the National Tidende
reports. It is not known whether the
Finnish government officials escaped from
the revolutionaries.

LONDON, Jan. 29.—The Petrograd
correspondent of the London Times, re-
ferring to the civil war in Finland, says
that Swedish assistance seems to have
been asked by the Finnish Senate, and
adds that doubtless many Finns, or
at least Finnish Swedes, would wel-
come the intervention of Sweden.

An evening paper announces the ar-
rival of Swedish troops at Tornea, and
says that a clash has already occurred
between an advanced guard of Swedes
and the Finnish Red Guards.

A Stockholm dispatch to the Post
says that the Swedish government on
Friday decided to propose that Norway
and Denmark invite Finland to co-
operate with the three Scandinavian
countries regarding legislative ques-
tions.

TRAGEDY OF SEA TOLD

CAPTAIN SAID TO HAVE SHOT MATE
AND HIMSELF.

Swedish Steamer Anglia Puts Into At-
lantic Port in Charge of
Second Officer.

AN ATLANTIC PORT, Jan. 29.—The
Swedish steamer Anglia was brought
into port tonight by her second
officer with a story of how Captain
A. B. Waerna, the master, shot and
fatally wounded the first officer, G.
B. the pilot on himself. The first officer
shot himself. The captain fell over
the ship's side and his body was not
recovered.

According to the second officer, Cap-
tain Waerna had been drinking and
abused First, who was shot in an ar-
gument that followed. The master then
rushed to the ship's side and turned
the pistol on himself. The first officer
died before the ship could reach port.
A maritime inquiry will be held by
the Swedish Vice-Consul tomorrow in
the presence of a representative of the
customs and justice departments. In
the meantime an American armed
guard is in charge of the ship.

The Anglia was bound from an At-
lantic port to South America.

BOMB WRECKS BIG PLANT

Chemical Company at Marquette,
Mich., Victim of Outrage.

MARQUETTE, Mich., Jan. 29.—That a
time bomb caused the explosion and fire
which caused damage estimated at
\$500,000 to the chemical plant of the
Pioneer Iron Company today was the
assertion made by employees to the po-
lice.

The explosion leveled seven build-
ings and destroyed huge stores of
chemicals used in the manufacture of
munitions by the American and allied
governments.

The explosion occurred in the alcohol
refinery. The flames that followed
were not brought under control until
late today.

Company officials refused to comment
on the incendiary theory, but it is un-
derstood that they are conducting a sepa-
rate investigation.
