Under the food control act the United States Department of Agriculture is to use \$10,000,000 for the purchase of nitrate of soda to be sold to farmers for cash at cost. About 100,000 tons have been purchased by the Government and will be sold to farm-ers at \$75.50 per ton f. c. b. cars at ports. 
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
