## CITY'S WAR AGAINST 6-CENT FARE IS ON

Council's Complaint Completed and Filed in Circuit Court. Early Decision Is Sought.

### FIVE POINTS IN ARGUMENT

Attorneys Believe They Have Strong Case Against Order of Commission in Streetear Case and Are Hopeful of Winning Battle.

The City Council's fight against the 6-cent streetcar fare order of the Public Service Commission is on. The complaint in the case was finally completed yesterday and was filed in the Circuit Court. An effort will be made to get an early decision.

Attorneys in the case are strongly hopeful of winning the battle. In their complaint they set forth five special points, two of which are considered particularly strong. They have uncovered a mass of argument, decisions and law which, they say, is favorable to their side of the issue. The attorneys in the case are City Attorney LaRochs, Chief Deputy City Attorney Tomlinson, Martin Pipes, attorney selected by Mayor Baker, and W. T. Hume, attorney representing Commissioner Kellaher.

The first point made in the complaint is based on the technicality that the

The first point made in the complaint is based on the technicality that the state was not a party to the order of the Public Service Commission setting aside the 5-cent fare; that it was not an act of the state by any of its law officers or by its law.

The second contention, and one of the strongest, is that the people of Purtland in 1911 enacted the commission charter in which are minute provisions pertaining to the regulation of public service companies, including ma-

public service companies, including machinery for the fixing of fares. This charter with these provisions was enacted under the initiative and it is contended that this gives the city control over the streetcar company instead of that control being in the hands of the Public Service Commission. It is contended that the Public Service Commission act exampts from jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission laws and regulations enacted by the voters in communities under the initiative. The third contention is that the Public Service Commission order violates the constitution of the state of Oregon and of the United States by impairing the obligations of the contract, which in this case is the franchise.


