

CITY'S WAR AGAINST 6-CENT FARE IS ON

Council's Complaint Completed and Filed in Circuit Court. Early Decision Is Sought.

FIVE POINTS IN ARGUMENT

Attorneys Believe They Have Strong Case Against Order of Commissioner in Streetcar Case and Are Hopeful of Winning Battle.

The City Council's fight against the recent streetcar fare order of the Public Service Commission is on. The complaint in the case was finally completed yesterday and was filed in the Circuit Court. An effort will be made to get an early decision.

The first point made in the complaint is based on the technicality that the state was not a party to the order of the Public Service Commission acting under the 5-cent fare; that it was not an act of the state by any of its law officers or by its law.

The fourth point is based on a technicality. It is contended that there was no allegation in the complaint of the streetcar company and nothing in the proceedings in the case to show that the city's regulation of rates has become unreasonable. In this respect it is claimed that the complaint of the company should have mentioned specifically the city ordinance providing for the 5-cent fare, claiming that these ordinances were unreasonable and should be set aside.
