REVENUE MONEY GIVEN GENEROUSLY.—In view of the fact that Sheriff Harburt will have complete charge of the apprehension of bootleggers within the county and outside the city limits, the County Treasurer yesterday afternoon created a special fund of \$1000, which is to be placed at his disposal for advance expense money for his deputies in securing bootleggers. New taxes that will be levied on the illegal sale of liquor. The order states that the money secured in fines will more than offset the additional expense in securing evidence.

AGENTS DISMISS SUPERINTENDENT.—The office of L. R. Alderman, superintendent of schools, is in a state of siege this week, with an army of book agents as the invading force. Because of several changes authorized in the school book list, Mr. Alderman has granted the book agents a week of his time in which to show their wares. New taxes are to be adopted for the grade schools in spelling, music, grammar and writing and for the high schools in history, general sciences and pedagogy.

DENTAL CLINIC HOURS CHANGED.—On account of the City Hall being closed Saturday afternoon hereafter as a war measure, the free dental clinic which heretofore has operated all day Saturdays will be open Friday mornings from 8 A. M. until noon and on Saturdays during the same hours. The free clinic is operated by the city for the benefit of poor children who are unable to pay for dental work, and is enabling them properly to do their school work.

RAILWAY SUED FOR SON'S DEATH.—Damages aggregating \$7500 are demanded from the Spokane, Portland and Seattle Railroad in a personal injury suit started yesterday by Carrie Huttman, surviving mother of Lamont Fletcher, who was killed near Linnerton, December 2, last, when a train ran into him as he was upon the right of way. The injuries and resultant death, she asserts, were due to the negligence of the railroad employees.

COURT GIVES GORMAN LIBERTY.—George W. Gorman, under indictment for a statutory offense, who was recently tried before Circuit Judge Jewell, was given his liberty yesterday when the District Attorney's office announced it would not re-try him. The first jury disagreed. Gorman, recently married, Susan Hay, the woman he brought to Portland from Washington. Her husband secured a divorce recently in Washington.

FERTILIZERS CITY PROBLEM.—The problem of fertilizing vacant lots used for war gardens has been raised before the City Council in a communication asking that the city donate fertilizer for the purpose. The question was up yesterday and was referred by Mayor Baker to City Commissioner Kellisher. When the Mayor referred the matter to Mr. Kellisher a laugh went the rounds of the Council chamber.

RUSSELLVILLE GRANGE TO MEET.—Russellville Grange will hold its regular meeting next Saturday evening, February 9, in its hall on the Base Line road. A very interesting meeting has been promised, as Lecturer Herman Lewis has a fine program scheduled. Aside from the local talent, Professor E. J. Kraus, of Oregon Agricultural College, will give an interesting talk on "Tree Pruning."

MISS ALICE JOYCE TO ADM.—Oregon Agricultural College announces that Miss Alice Joyce, assistant club leader in the college's extension department, to the Portland Board of Education for two weeks, February 11 to 22. Miss Joyce will speak at the schools of the city and at parent-teacher circles in a campaign for school war gardens.

LEWISTOWN FIRE OVERSEAS.—A cablegram was received in Portland yesterday announcing the arrival overseas of Edgar Piper, Jr., First Lieutenant in the equipment division of the aviation section of the Army. The message did not say whether Piper had been killed or landed in England or France, but it is presumed that it was in France.

MOUNT TABOR SCHOOL FORMS UNIT.—The pupils of Mount Tabor School have each subscribed 25 cents and have organized a Junior Red Cross unit with a membership of more than 400. W. M. Miller is principal and he reports an enthusiastic interest in the Junior movement. The children are now awaiting their Red Cross buttons.

MILL WATCHMAN ARRESTED.—Henry Lewis, a German alien and an employee of the Portland Flouring Mills Company, was yesterday placed under arrest by Deputy United States Marshal Mann and is being held for investigation and internment. Lewis was employed on the night shift in the flouring mills which are located within the prohibited area along the waterfront. In addition, he has not had the required permit allowing him to come within one-half mile of the Army.

RANSOM UNDED TO GO EAST.—F. H. Ransome, treasurer and manager of the Eastern & Western Lumber Company, is being urged to go to Washington, D. C., to represent the Douglas fir industry of the Pacific Northwest as an adviser to R. H. Eisenhower, director of the lumber, raw materials division, of the war munitions board. Mr. Ransome said last night he had the matter under consideration. He may yield to the request of his friends and devote a month to the work.
