No longer will manifests of vessels in the coastwise trade be accepted on stering or clearing when only the tal amount of each commodity aboard specified, but a complete record of the ship, her voyage and business must be recorded in compliance with the following telegram received yes-terday at the Custom-house from the Treasury Department:

Callectors of customs will be immediately supplied with two special forms of reports to be remotered to the Shipping Board, Wash-Dagton, D. C. These reports will be here-siter referred to as incoming and estigoing cargo reports. Vessel Is One of Ten Steam Auxiljary Schooners Now Building for French Government and That Number Is to Be Doubled.

Planking was started on ship No. 2, at the Foundation Company's yard yes terday, and she will be in the water next month. The keel was laid Octo ber 22, 1917, few skilled mechanic being then employed in the yard and the work was done largely with the aid of laborers. It was not until the middle of November that power saws were installed, so it is figured that actual time spent on the hull will not exceed four months.

Hulis Nos. 4, 6 and 3, will be sent down the ways in close order and it is estimated that two or three hulls a month will be floated for a time. The vessels are steam auxiliary schooners for the French government, 10 of them being on the ways, and there are 10 more to be laid down as rapidly as building berths are vacated.
