

DYNAMITE NOT FAKE

Federal and County Officials
Continue Investigations.

BRIDGE GUARDS DOUBLED

Explosives Found Pronounced by
Experts of High Grade and Ex-
ceedingly Dangerous to Handle.
Authority to Destroy Asked.

Federal and county officials yesterday were continuing their investigations in an effort to locate the source of more than 500 sticks of dynamite, together with a large quantity of fuse and "X" dynamite caps which have been found in various places on the East Side and more particularly in the Mount Scott district and near the Steel bridge.

Special Agent Woods, of the O.-W. R. N. Co., yesterday joined in the investigation. Mr. Woods told Sheriff Hurlburt that his investigation thus far has not shown that the explosive, packed within two blocks of the Steel bridge, was for the purpose of destroying the structure, but he offered to double the guard on the bridge if the county officials deemed it necessary.

Federal Force Investigating.
Deputy United States Attorney Rankin said yesterday that the Federal Government has men investigating the case in an effort to determine the source of the large quantity of dynamite. It intends to continue this investigation. It was said at the Court-house late yesterday afternoon that another clue has been obtained relative to another dynamite cache which the officials hope will be uncovered shortly.

So dangerous are the 51 sticks of dynamite found near the Steel bridge, Superintendent of Properties Eatchel said, that he will ask United States Attorney Rankin for authority to destroy it. He is fearful that it may explode at any time if kept at the Kelly Butte powder house.

Reported Hoax Condemned.

County officials yesterday condemned a report which has been circulated to the effect that they have been made the victims of a dynamite hoax. "I have been handling dynamite and powder for 15 years and know what it is and what it will do," said Mr. Eatchel. "Every stick of this we have found is genuine dynamite, some of it being 60 per cent powder. We have tested the fuse and caps and know just what we have on our hands."

Deputy Sheriff George Hurlburt and Joseph Simmons, of the Juvenile Court, both of whom have had much experience with powder and explosives, declared the dynamite found by the officials is a highly dangerous powder.

SKILLED WORKMEN SIGN

REGISTRATION IN U. S. SHIPYARD
VOLUNTEERS HEAVY.Keen Interest Taken in Industrial
Drive Now Being Conducted to
Help Win the War.

Lively registration of men in the building trades and various other lines of skilled artisanship in the United States shipyard volunteers was reported to Eugene E. Smith, county enrollment agent, yesterday, the opening day of the campaign in this county. The total will not be made up till this morning. Reports from upstate sections also indicate that keen interest is being shown in this industrial drive to help win the war.

State headquarters of the public service reserves yesterday made up the minimum quota of the individual counties of the state, and dispatched the statement to all county enrollment agents, with an urgent request that state once more "cover the top" in good old Oregon style.

ARTISTIC snow scenes, well selected exterior locations, and good acting are the three chief assets of "The Avenging Trail," the latest Harold Lockwood production which is furnishing film entertainment to week-end Liberty Theater patrons.

There are plenty of fight scenes in this picture story of the woods and lumber camps, some wonderful snow scenes and a thrilling climax. Lockwood is supported by a cast including Sally Gray, former Edison star, and "The Girl at Home" star, Mabel Normand. The story is an adaptation of the Henry Owen story, "Gaston O'Leary," with Handsome Hal as Gaston, and Miss Crute as Rose Hackett. Gaston arrives at the village of Haven Falls in time to rescue Rose from the forced attentions of Lefty Red. Then Dave Taggart hires Gaston to be foreman of his lawless band of wood-cutters. Taggart's cruelty has won him the enmity of the better element of the town so Gaston is shunned by all after it is known that he is the tool of the lumber boss. Unknown to O'Leary, Taggart has directed his men to cut timber belonging to Rose. After it is all cut O'Leary learns of the treachery and refuses to permit the men to remove the logs. Taggart then purchases the ground from Rose and then plans to rob the safe which she has placed in the house. O'Leary returns to prevent the deed, rescues the girl from the clutches of Taggart and wins her for a bride.

Sunset.

"God's Country and the Woman," with its magnificent background of the winter wilds, Siberian dog teams and strenuous conflict, furnishes Sunset Theater fans with some splendid screen entertainment. The story, however, is a variation of the "The Girl at Home," an excellent slapstick foil to the James Oliver Curwood drama of Alaska.

William Duncan, George Holt and Neil Shipman are the principals who enact the drama of a girl who assumes blame for an offense committed by her mother. To protect herself the girl, first before the return of her father, writes him that she is going to the North woods to meet her husband. The romance works well, for a young man drifting down a stream on a houseward journey from the wilds beaches his canoe near the girl's forest abode and falls in love with her.

She prevails upon him through his great love for her to pose as her husband and they go back home together to protect the good name of the mother. A marriage ceremony is performed, and they live in separate rooms in a frontier home until finally the baby dies and the villain, who all the while is trying to get possession of the girl, is devoured by a pack of sledge dogs who trail him down after a sensational battle in which the arch-conspirator and his fellow outlaws in "Devil's Nest" are vanquished and the girl, who has been made captive, is freed by her sweetheart. Thereafter, in the glow of the burning rendezvous, the hero takes the girl to his home as wife in fact as well as name.

Taylor Holmes, stage star of "Bunker Bean," scores another successful impersonation in "The Small Town Guy," which is taken from the novelette, "A

Picture of Innocence." In this picture the Esplanade comedian appears as the unsophisticated, glib little town chap who has never been to the city. His great delight in his own cleverness, when he keeps the constable from discovering about the fight over cards in the hotel, and his joy in the city when he earns his first money, is laughable.

Some of the cleverest situations of the five-reeler arise from the tender conscience of Ernest, for this conscience tortures him when he believes that he is a man with a past because he was mixed up with crooks, and he does not dare go near the girl he loves because he is unworthy.

Holmes is a hotel clerk in a small town hotel in this new picture. A couple of confidence men are marooned in the American over night and Jolly Ernest, the clerk, into believing that he's wasting his time and talents in Compton Center. So he goes to the city, becomes involved in the operations of the crooks and is arrested. He is sent back home by the police, but is afraid to venture near his girl because of his past. He finally helps to a fortune, successfully defends it against the crooks who demand "hush money" and finally confesses all to the girl who is ready to wed him.

ARE EXCEPTIONALLY CLEVER.Kartell Offers Splendid Slack-Wire
Act and Other Jolly Entertainers
Complete Perfect Bill.

There's a trio of attractive girls who would decorate any bill on the Hippodrome this week. One is Aman Owens, who looks like little Frances White; one is Miss Warden, who is a picturesque and dashing brunette, and the other is Anna Marston, charming and smart looking.

The three girls are not in the same act. Each has a clever partner and acts which are wholly dissimilar, but the girls are so vivacious, so pretty and work with such pep that they each stand out for individual merit.
