CITY'S HEALTH IMPROVES. DR. WHEELER TELLS OF PROGRESS IN SANITATION.

Establishment of Bull Run Water Supply Held to Be Greatest Single Improvement.

Dr. C. H. Wheeler, in a talk before the City Club, at his luncheon in the Benson Hotel yesterday, on "Some of the Frequent Diseases in Portland and Their Causes," told of the progress that has been made in sanitation in this city since the early days.

The greatest single item of improvement, according to Dr. Wheeler, has been in the water supply. In early days, he said, when the city's water was taken from the river, various creeks around town and wells, typhoid fever was a prevalent disease. With the institution of the Bull Run water supply, the prevalence of typhoid was immediately cut down, and now a case of this disease is rare.

The Bull Run water, however, because of its high degree of purity and the small percentage of mineral salts it contains, is believed by some authorities, Dr. Wheeler said, to be the principal cause of the prevalence of goiter in this section.
