mently as a free passage to the ships of all nations.

American sharpshooters on the sector held by the United States forces northwest of Toul, on the western front, have matched their marksmanship and wit against the skill and experience of the German riflemen and thus far have had the advantage.

Enemy snipers have been routed from their hiding places among bushes in the hilly, wooded terrain or in shell-holes by the fire of the Americans and where the rifle proved unavailing, there was brought into action machine guns or light artillery, which destroyed the German snipers and caused casualties among their occupants.

Dr. von Seydler, the Austrian Premier, has tendered the resignation of his Cabinet to Emperor Charles, according to Vienna advices reaching Amsterdam. Parliamentary circles in the Austrian capital understand that the Cabinet's resignation is due to the opposition of Polish Deputies to special debates and the provisional budget.

Dr. von Seydler, January 20, informed labor delegations that it was the wish of the Emperor to end the war at the earliest possible moment by an honorable peace, and this declaration of the Premier was instrumental in ending the strikes in Vienna.

Progress of the War.

The latest figures available on the loss of life in the torpedoing of the troopship Tuscania indicate that 166 persons are missing, of whom 147 were Americans.

The estimate was furnished by the British Admiralty to the Associated Press Friday night, with the information that 2235 persons had been saved. Among them were 132 officers and 1917 of the American foresters, engineers, supply train men, military police and aero units.

As the ship's company included 2177 Americans, only 19 missing remain to be accounted among the 218 members of the British crew and six passengers. According to the Admiralty's figures, the total number of persons on the Tuscania was 2491.

American officers among the survivors testified to the courage of their men while they faced the acute emergency of the ship sinking. They brought with no assurance that the German submarine would not send another torpedo to hasten her disappearance beneath the waves.

British officials praise the discipline and steadfastness of the Americans, and the London press is lavish with encomiums of their conduct.

The Turkish Foreign Minister, Neasmy Bey, speaking in the Ottoman Chamber of Deputies Thursday, asserted that Turkey was in full accord with the attitude of Germany and Austria as outlined in the recent speeches of the German Chancellor, Count von Hertling, and the Austrian Foreign Minister, Count Czernin. In regard to the Dardanelles, Neasmy Bey declared that the strait would remain open in the future to international traffic as in the past and on the same conditions.

This declaration is regarded as Turkey's reply to the provision in President Wilson's announcement of America's war aims which required that the Dardanelles should be opened permanently.

CLASH IS IMMINENT

Parties in Russia Prepare for Struggle.

SHARP RIVALRY DISCLOSED

Bolsheviki Accused of Trying to Prevent Decision at Polls—Party of Trotsky and Lenin Feels Secure.

PETROGRAD, Feb. 1, via London, Feb. 7.—(Special.)—The question of Russia, which has not been raised in power since the Bolsheviki consolidated their position two months ago, has again been brought forward by the Minshéviki, who are asking the re-election of delegates to the Workers' and Soldiers' Councils. They evidently hope to gain votes.

The Minshéviki have started the rumor that the Bolsheviki are preventing a re-election, which the Bolsheviki officially deny. Some factories are now re-electing delegates, but there is no chance of the Bolsheviki losing many votes.

Political Rivalry Disclosed.

This move by the Minshéviki is important only as showing political rivalry. The Bolsheviki know their hands, but do not intend that it shall form the basis for the passing of their control. In fact, they feel more solid than ever.

The Soviet form of government permits quick re-elections, thus showing the pulse of popular sentiment. No government can remain in power once it loses the confidence of the people, except by force of arms. No such possibility is imminent.

Agrarian Committee Meets.

The only body outside the Soviets is the assembly of the agrarian committee, which is now meeting here. It is composed of civilian peasants largely, in contrast to the peasant assembly, which is made up mostly of peasants from the armies.

The agrarian committee thus has a somewhat different attitude, and is interesting itself only with the division of lands. It is not greatly interested in the program of the Socialist programme.

Soldiers Return to Villages.

The construction of a Socialist state is more the affair of the soldiers and workmen, many of whom, however, are returning to the villages for the division of lands and others waiting the reopening of the factories.

FINANCE BILL IS URGED

McADOO, HARDING AND WARBURG MAKE AGREEMENTS.

Senate Committee Assured That Proposed Legislation Will Not Result in Inflation.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—Enactment of the war finance corporation bill to strengthen the country's financial and industrial conditions for war was urged before the Senate finance committee today by Secretary McAdoo, with the support of W. P. G. Harding, governor, and Paul M. Warburg, vice-governor of the Federal Reserve Board.

Secretary McAdoo said the legislation not only would not cause inflation but would serve to prevent it. He outlined in detail the plan under which, with a capital of \$500,000,000 and authority to issue \$4,000,000,000 in bonds to finance essential industries, the Government would control all security issues during the war. He will be recalled Monday when he will be questioned by the committee regarding the bill.
