

UNIFIED EFFORT IS RED CROSS SCHEME

School Children's Patriotic Labors to Be Directed Into One Channel.

ENROLLMENT IN PROGRESS

Junior Membership Campaign Makes Rapid Progress in Oregon Under Direction of Mrs. King. President Supports Move.

Plans have been made and soon will be in operation the direction of the patriotic activities of all the school children of the United States into one channel—the junior membership of the American Red Cross.

Beginning yesterday, Lincoln's birthday, and continuing until February 22, Washington's birthday, enrollment work will be carried on to bring all the children in the 369,000 schools of the country into the Red Cross junior membership.

President Wilson, who is vitally interested, has declared in a letter to H. P. Davidson, chairman of the War Council of the American Red Cross:

"Nothing in the Red Cross movement has ever been started as important as the junior membership, and that alone from the standpoint of the American people."

The junior memberships will work through school auxiliaries, of which there are now in the country 154,111, the total membership of which is 178,741. It is expected that this number will leap to 100,000 auxiliaries in the next 10 days.

All over Oregon the campaign is making rapid progress. In Multnomah, Yamhill, Clackamas, Washington, Columbia and Tillamook counties a rapid campaign is being made under an influential committee headed by Mrs. J. C. Elliott King.

Portland is in Van.

Thirty schools in that district have already enrolled, of which 25 are in Portland. In the other counties work began only last Saturday, following organization in Portland.

The movement to combine, in the junior membership of the American Red Cross, the patriotic activities of all school children, has the support of the leading educators of America. Not only this, but the Federal Department of Education, the National Education Association, the Department of Agriculture, the Department of Commerce and the Food Administration sent representatives to a recent conference at Washington, at which plans were outlined.

Cardinal Gibbons is giving the plan his warm support, as are hundreds of others all over the country.

Membership Fee Small.

Membership in the Junior Red Cross in Portland is being pushed vigorously in every school. Membership per pupil costs 25 cents, for which a special button is supplied. Three thousand four hundred and seven articles have already been made for the Red Cross by the juniors. It is probable the manual training departments will make every case, shipped direct to France, that the Portland chapter uses.

"We wish to teach our children in a constructive way to be citizens of America," said Mrs. King. "As all the Governmental activities are one, we believe that the economy of the school programme demands the avoidance of conflicting appeals and duplicating organizations. The Junior Red Cross, which has already won such wide recognition in the schools, is the best organization, and will co-operate to the fullest extent in obtaining a wise economy of the child's time and strength."

POTATO BREADS SHOWN Girls Polytechnic School Exhibits Varieties in Wheat Saving.

Potato breads, cakes and muffins were shown yesterday in an exhibit held in the Girls Polytechnic School. The loaves and cakes were made from recipes that have been evolved after much trying and testing on the part of the teachers, Mrs. Batterson and Miss Laura Riley.

In a contest among the girls to get as many families as possible to use their formulas the seniors reported 114 and the entire school 334 families that have tried the recipes in the last three days. This is the result of the direct influence of the girls of the domestic department.

LUMBER COMPANY IS SUEED Government Would Recover \$65,600 for 6560 Acres in Baker County.

A civil suit was filed in the Federal Court yesterday by Assistant United States attorney Beckman, in which the Government seeks to recover \$65,600 from the Oregon Lumber Company, Joseph Barton, Frederick H. Atkinson and Frank M. Shurtiff for 6560 acres of land alleged to have been illegally acquired by the defendants. In its

complaint the Government alleges that these lands, consisting of 43 timber and stone claims in Baker County, were acquired by the defendants in 1906 as the result of a conspiracy by which employees of the lumber company filed on the land and afterward deeded it to the company.

The Government brought a suit against the lumber company several years ago, seeking to cancel the patents to the lands involved in the pending suit, but the case was decided in favor of the defendants. The statute of limitations had run against the time in which that suit could be prosecuted.
