

VOTERS TOTAL 90,067

Registration in Multnomah County Tabulated.

TWO-THIRDS REPUBLICANS

Thousands of Newcomers Said to Be Unaware of Fact That They May Vote in Oregon After 6 Months' Residence if Registered.

There are now 90,067 registered voters in Multnomah County eligible to vote at the primary election May 17, according to latest tabulations made by County Clerk Beveridge up to February 13.

Thousands of persons who have come to Portland during the past year are unaware of the fact that they can become registered voters after six months' residence here.

Interesting Side-Lights Appear. The figures give some interesting side-lights as to the complexion of the voting population.

There are 59,376 male voters registered as against 30,691 females. The total number of voters registered within the city limits of Portland is 83,046, while 69,111 voters are registered in the outlying precincts.

Women Register Much as Men. The figures further show there are 24,455 women registered as Republicans and 19,294 of the gentler sex listed as Democrats.

County Clerk Beveridge yesterday completed his final list of judges and clerks of elections, which has been approved by the County Board.
