NEW CONTRACTS LIKELY

GOVERNMENT MAY ORDER MORE LUMBER IN NORTHWEST.

Lumbermen Meet in Seattle and Hold Secret Session; 8-Hour Day and Labor Bidding Discussed.

SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 15.—Directed by Colonel Bruce Dique, U. S. A., in charge of lumber production in this territory for the Government, officers and members of the Protective League of the West Coast Lumbermen's Association at a called meeting at the New Washington Friday refused to disclose the nature of any of the business transactions. About 200 lumbermen from Washington and Oregon points were present.

It was ascertained from round-about sources, however, that the subject of bidding for labor as between one mill to another was taken up and severely criticized.

It was stated that the subject of the eight-hour measure for Washington and Oregon mills was widely discussed. Information was furnished at the meeting that the Government is likely to award 25,000,000 additional feet of lumber contracts to West Coast manufacturers because of the satisfactory manner in which delivery of lumber has been made by mills in this territory. This order will be composed principally of special cuttings for wooden ships, it was announced.

GOOD THINGS IN THE MARKET

THE run of smelt is still light. Those wise in such matters, however, deplore that it was the 15th of February last year before the fish entered the Cowlitz River, Washington, that tributary of the Columbia which evidently is their favorite stamping ground hereabouts.

They are retailing now at 8 and 10 cents a pound; two pounds 15 cents and three pounds for a quarter.

Very possibly before this time next week the floodgates will have opened and smelt have reached the "dipping-up" stage.

Sturgeon, in limited quantity, is in the market, and, in consequence, is held at 20 cents a pound.

Lake Superior white fish, another delicacy, sells at 25 and 30 cents a pound.

Chinook salmon, 20 and 22½ cents a pound.

Steelhead, 25 cents a pound for half or whole fish; 25 for center cut.

Hallibut, 28 and 30 cents a pound.

Barracuda and mackerel, 20 cents a pound.

Black cod, frozen, 13, 15 and 17 cents a pound; end cuts, 11 cents.

Fresh black cod, 17½ cents a pound.

Silver smelt, sea catfish, rock cod, sole and red snapper, 15 cents a pound.

Flounders and herring, 8 and 10 cents a pound.

Shrimps, 20 and 25 cents a pound.

Lobsters, 40 cents a pound; crabs, 20 and 25 cents each.

Butter clams, 20 cents a pint; hard-shell, 6 cents a pound.

Mussels, 12½ cents a pound.

Salmon eggs, 10 to 25 cents a roll.
