

RUPERT TO DRAG IN SLAM MAN'S NAME

Sensation Involving Bob Phillips in Liberty Bond Theft to Be Sprung Today.

GERMAN IS IMPLICATED

Ex-Police Sergeant and Multnomah Club Athlete Indicates That He Will Contend That Late Deputy and He Acted for Teuton.

Bob Phillips, ex-Chief Deputy Sheriff, who was murdered by an escaped maniac on the night of November 22, will be named as one of two persons with whom Clyde J. (Doc) Rupert is alleged to have conspired in the sale of \$5000 in liberty bonds stolen from the Northwestern National Bank.

This was indicated yesterday by questions put to prospective jurors by Floyd Stett, counsel for Rupert, during his examination of talesmen before Circuit Judge Belt.

The other mysterious person, it is understood, is a German, whose name Rupert will disclose when he takes the witness chair in his own defense. The whereabouts of this German is known at the present time, it is understood.

Report Causes Sensation.

When it became known that the name of the late Deputy Sheriff would be brought out at the trial in an effort by the defense to show that Rupert is not responsible for the theft of the liberty bonds, the Courtroom was thrown into a state of consternation. Just what part Bob Phillips is supposed to have taken, if any, or to what extent he had negotiated, if at all, was not indicated either by Rupert or by his attorney, Mr. Stett.

It was learned, however, that the defense will charge that Bob Phillips at one time had the bonds in his possession as agent for the mysterious German. He is alleged to have transferred the bonds to Rupert, who is said to have acted as agent for Alfred S. Rix, who ultimately purchased the bonds, or a part of them.

In fact, it is rumored about the Courtroom that a well-known business man will testify in behalf of Rupert to the effect that he had at different times seen Rupert and Bob Phillips conversing in the corridors of the Northwestern National Bank, where Rupert was employed as a special policeman at the time he was arrested for the theft of the bonds.

Probable Defense Outlined.

This business man, whose name could not be learned, the defense says, will testify that on one occasion he saw Bob Phillips pass over a heavy envelope to Rupert. It is on this occasion, Rupert will testify, that the bonds were given to him by Phillips, and later transferred by him to Rix in exchange for stock in a shipbuilding plant.

Rupert, it became known, will not endeavor to connect the dead Deputy Sheriff with the theft of the bonds in any manner, but he will contend from the witness stand that he and Phillips were simply acting as agents between the mysterious German and Rix. According to information, which seems authentic, Rupert will tell a story of how Bob Phillips had come to him and told him of a German who had purchased liberty bonds and wanted to dispose of them. Rupert will contend that he then interested Rix in the purchase of the bonds, and just before the deal was consummated obtained the bonds from Phillips to transfer to Rix. He will deny that he has any knowledge of how this mysterious German obtained possession of the missing bonds which are known to have been stolen from the Northwestern National Bank.

Sensation Not Unexpected.

It became apparent from the outset of the trial yesterday morning that a sensation would be sprung when Rupert's long-continued silence should be broken. From the date of his arrest he has insisted that he would disclose the name of some mysterious third person when his case should come up for trial, and from the fact that the name of Bob Phillips was brought out at the outset of the case it became practically certain that the murdered Deputy Sheriff is the person to whom Rupert has been repeatedly referring as one of the mysterious persons connected with the bond negotiations.

Because of the mystery thrown about the case in bringing forth the name of Bob Phillips, Circuit Judge Belt, at 5 o'clock last night, ordered the jurors locked up for the night. The court announced that the jurors would be

kept locked up until the case is concluded. He cautioned the jurors against speaking about the case to any person, even while going to and from their meals under the guard of the two bailiffs.

The jury was obtained shortly after 4 o'clock in the afternoon, and the opening statement of Deputy District Attorney Hammersley was given just before court adjourned for the day.

State Outlines Case.

Hammersley declared that the state's evidence would show conclusively that Rupert alone is responsible for the theft of the \$5000 in liberty bonds, which are a part of \$15,000 in bonds he is alleged to have stolen. He said the state's evidence would show that Rupert for several days had been negotiating the sale of bonds to A. S. Rix; that he told Rix that he had received a legacy from an estate and that this legacy consisted of liberty bonds. He said the evidence further would show that another \$1000 in bonds was sold to an attorney for shipbuilding stock. Rix, he said, gave Rupert a check for \$5000 in exchange for the \$1000 in the liberty bonds.

Sheriff Hurlburt last night declared that no breath of suspicion could be attached to Bob Phillips. He expressed confidence that the name of Bob Phillips easily could be cleared of any imputations which might be cast by Rupert.

CHEFS PREPARING CHOICE WAR BITS

Experiments of Leading Hotel Men Result in Entirely New Substitutes.

ECONOMY IS WATCHWORD

Palatableness and Conservation of Food Sought by Culinary Experts in Perfecting Dishes. Recipes Given to Public.

The housewives' campaign for food conservation conducted under the auspices of the Food Administration, with Mrs. F. S. Myers as chief campaigner, has reached the homes of thousands of citizens and is being taken up by the chefs of the leading hotels.

In their desire to co-operate with the housewives the chefs are experimenting with substitutes and with foods that economize and save the fat, meat, sugar and wheat flour.

Further to demonstrate their loyalty, the chefs have contributed some of their pet recipes, as follows:

One Pound Mashed Potatoes Baked with One-half Pound Cooked Fish (left-over fish or freshly cooked); salt, pepper, a little nutmeg, and chopped parsley. Fry brown. Turn over platter and serve with poached egg on top; also with fruit apples and corn fritters at the side. Corn oil can be used for frying.

Robbing Squash (Scotch Dish).

Take one head of squash, one pound in half gallon of broth, mostly corn beef broth. Six carrots, medium size, six onions, three turnips and two small rutabagas, one turnip, one cauliflower. Boil thoroughly, until the broth is mostly condensed and vegetables begin to break. Add to this a little butter, about one and one-half ounces, spice to suit taste. Grate two raw potatoes and mix in this puree. Mash it up good. Put it in a dish, pudding form, with a little grated cheese over it and bake in slow oven for about 30 minutes. This can be prepared by going through a little different process for a loaf of bread, and it will cut like a real loaf.

Liberty Pudding for 25 People.

One and one-half pounds bread crumbs, one-half pound corn meal, one pound raisins, three apples sliced, one pound raisins, 10 ounces sugar, one glass molasses (six ounces), five pint milk, five pint water, one pint oil, one pint soda, three tablespoons baking powder. Bake or steam—11, Oda, chef, Imperial Hotel.

Rolls.

This recipe should make 10 rolls: One pint water, one pint milk, three ounces sugar, two ounces salt, five ounces yeast (shortening), three eggs, one ounce yeast, pinch of mace, one pound four ounces lard and corn flour, two pounds 12 ounces wheat flour. Dissolve the yeast in one-half the milk, start the other half with the lard and mix thoroughly, then add the flour. When the dough is well mixed let stand three hours to rise, then work the rolls in pan and let rise one-half hour before baking.

CONSCRIPTION IS FEARED

BRITISH-CANADIAN RECRUITING OFFICE REPORTS BUSY WEEK.

Young Englishman Confesses to Having Been "Bit of Slacker," But Says No One Shall Call Him Conscript.

"The busiest week since we opened in Portland," was the statement made at the British and Canadian recruiting office, Third and Oak streets, yesterday. Now that conscription rolls and subjects in the United States are assured in the agreement are availing themselves of the opportunity of selecting the branch of the service they prefer while there still is time.

"What branch can I get into?" said a young Englishman, who admitted he had been a bit of a slacker, but nobody is going to call me a conscript."

This remark is almost general of men coming forward now.

Notification was received by wire yesterday that men can now be accepted in the Canadian army for the Railroad Construction Corps, and skilled railroad men of all classes can be accepted for this branch.

The Canadian cavalry and Canadian artillery are also open for a limited period to accept recruits, and men wishing to get into these popular branches of the service are urged to make application immediately.

In order to accommodate those whose business prevents them from calling at the recruiting office during the day, the office will be open during the evenings from 8 till 10 o'clock.

The play to be given Thursday night at the Auditorium by the Mallory Company is "Thrill," a vital drama of present-day problems and conditions.

On Saturday night the brilliant Welsh orator, Dr. Arthur Walwyn Evans, nephew of David Lloyd, Premier of England, will give his lecture at the Auditorium, "What America Means to Me," as the seventh number of the course.

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PEAK-LOAD BOTHERS

Rush Hour Car Service Under Discussion at Hearing.

COMPANY LACKING FUNDS

President Griffith Tells Public Service Commission Switches to Expedite Limited Service Cannot Be Installed.

Testimony regarding the peak-load problems of the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company was heard yesterday afternoon before the Public Service Commission in session to consider a report on traffic conditions and to hear complaints.

Though agitation against prevailing service has been rife, none of the complainants appeared before the commission to offer testimony, aside from the presentation of a petition, signed by 30 residents of Union avenue, asking that fewer limited and more local cars be used.

Limited Cars Blocked.

Mayor Baker, addressing the commission, said that no-stop cars are of little value when forced to follow local cars, and suggested that service might be speeded up by the installation of switches to accommodate local cars while the limited cars passed them.

Replying to this, President Griffith, of the street railway company, admitted that the matter had been under consideration for some time, but declared that the present financial straits of the company is inadequate to defray
