Witness Testifies That Nurse Regarded Mrs. Faling as Crazy and Often Was Forced to Struggle With Screaming Patient.

"If you had arrived five minutes "If you had arrived five minutes seener you would have seen them break a big plank over my back," is a statement made by Mrs. Xarifa Jane Faling to Mrs. Belle Thompson, now of San Jose, Cal. according to the deposition of Mrs. Thompson, which was read yesterday before County Judge Taxwell when the \$400,000 will case was resumed.

"It was nothing for Mrs. Faling to lie on the floor and scream at the top of her voice while her nurse wrestled with her," testified Captain Burley. The first time I heard these screams I hurried over to her apartments, thinking she might be in discress.


