PENDLETON, Or., March L-(Special.) With bariey quoted at \$800 a ton, Umattila County farmers are speculating as to whether it is not a more satisfactory crop to plant the Spring than wheat. At the ruing price wheat will bring about \$60 a ton.

That there will be some increase in the acreage of bariey in this part of the country is certain. Whether that increase will amount to much is a question that will be answered only when time comes for Spring sowing, but many farmers have been figuring on the change, it is known.

There is a considerable area of farm land in this country to be planted to Spring grain. The yield of bariey in this section is altogether satisfactory for the reason that it matures more rapidly than wheat and is more likely to be beyond the danger point when the hot winds of late Summer arrive.

The question of feeding bariey in preference to wheat also is interessing the ranchers. At present prices, wheat held for seed is a much better investment as feed than is the bariey that is now being fed and there is possibility that the bariey will be held as need and the wheat used by farmers who are feeding stock.
