LADY BUG HARVEST IS ON

Government Experts Gather Unique

Crop in California. GRASS VALLEY, Cal., Feb. 16 .- One of the most peculiar harvests in the world is taking place in the foothills below here at the present time—that below here at the present time—that of lady bugs. The state of California, through its insectary department, is doing the harvesting, and the crop is estimated at from 69,000,000 to 75,000,000 bugs.

The bugs are found under light cover in sunny nooks in only a few places in Nevada and Placer counties. They are gathered into cases each holding a quart, or about 33,000 bugs, and sent

Agents of the insectary department watch the lady bugs in their hibernating places during the Fall and early Winter, and at the proper time the harvest is commenced and completed
