

GERMAN HATRED GROWS INTENSE

Kaiser Refuses to See Ambassador Because of Shipments of Arms to Allies.

VON JAGOW MOST BITTER

Fight Against Chancellor Leads Gerard to Remark That Germans Can Hate Each Other Thoroughly and Scientifically.

GERMAN PEOPLE WANT PEACE.

ARTICLE XIII.

(Diary of August, 1918, Continued.)
Saw summaries of the news published by the general staff and given to the Emperor to read. He gets only German-American news from America and no bad news from anywhere. On the Lusitania case there is a disposition to think, because we were wrong over Mexico, we will stand anything. The Kaiser will not see me because of the delivery of arms by Americans to the allies, and has so stated.
There is no shortage of food supply. I was told yesterday they did not need our Polish relief committee for German Poland, as Germany can take care of this alone. The hate of Americans is intense. But this hate can be turned off and on by the government. The people believe everything they see in the papers. The monetary situation is not bad. All the money for war supplies has been spent in Germany, except perhaps for a few horses, etc. from Scandinavia.

Poland Must Furnish Troops.

The Chancellor and Von Jagow have been in Vienna. Von Jagow told me only one current business, but this was a diplomatic statement. I believe they went to settle the fate of Poland. I hear Prussia wants an independent Poland and Austria wants to make it part of the Austrian empire. In any event, I think Prussia will secure the organizing of the army which will soon be raised. A prominent Pole told me two days ago that the Kaiser was codded by Russia, whose motto in Poland was "divide et impera," and that they will violently resist being drafted into the Prussian army. The bitter attacks on the Chancellor continue. At a recent meeting in Bavaria resolutions were passed that the first objective of the war was to get rid of the Chancellor and the second to "clean out the Anglophile foreign press," which prevented Germany from winning the war.

As a son-in-law of a high official told me today, the break between the military and navy on one side and the civil government on the other has widened almost into civil war. The same man told me that the Kaiser had lately become quite apathetic and let events take their course.

Starvation Is Dream.

One of my attaches has broken down completely, cries when spoken to; living in a fiery hostile atmosphere is not agreeable, and I wonder how long the rest of us can hold out.
The harvest is very good, but does not provide fat, and yet meat. But the starving-out business I have at all ways said was an "iridescent" dream.
New men, \$6,000 in this vicinity alone, are being sent to the front.

Every one here is getting more on razor edge, prisoners are treated more roughly and get worse food. Bavaria is getting restless and dissatisfied. This will not amount to anything definite, but it is a sign of the times.

I went to Herringsdorf for a few days of swimming. At a concert in the evening a man recited a poem he said he had written about "having blood enough." He was vehemently applauded. "Quite a cobweb in the days when the best actors in Germany were not ashamed to spout the 'Hymn of Hate'."

Germany Fed Too Much Meat.

The military people use the censorship even against papers friendly to the Chancellor, and German papers can hate each other as thoroughly and scientifically as they do most other nations. Dr. Alois Taylor thinks that in peace times some one fed this nation too much meat.

The newspapers are preparing the people for the entry of Roumania.

Professor — a school friend of Tisa's and Burian's, who was recently in Austria, saw Burian and says Burian is ready and anxious to make an arbitration treaty with America and also send an ambassador in Dumbah's place to Washington. This is out of my jurisdiction. He says that tomorrow or next day there will be an interpellation in the Hungarian Chamber about sending an ambassador to America.

The National Liberals probably will unite with the Conservatives and demand a strong hold on Belgium, if not actual possession of the country, as one of the objects of the war.

This Union of National Liberals and Conservatives is dangerous and may mean a resumption of unrestricted submarine warfare.

The entry of Roumania took every one by surprise. Beidman, the Roumanian Minister here, was visiting the reigning Prince of Hohenzollern-Sigmaringen, brother of the Roumanian King, and apparently knew nothing of the danger of a break.

NATIONALS TAKE UP PROHIBITION BURDEN

Platform Also Calls for Equal Suffrage, Laws Favoring Farmers and Labor.

PREAMBLE CAUSES DEBATE

About \$50,000 Pledged for Campaign Fund—Mrs. Howard Gould One of Those Who Promises to Make Large Contribution.

CHICAGO, March 7.—Equal suffrage, Nation-wide prohibition and radical legislation favoring farmers and laborers are the chief planks of the platform of the National party, adopted here today at a convention attended by about 200 delegates, 100 of whom are bolters from the prohibition party.
The platform, after several hours of debate on the negro voting question and various points of the law favoring laborers, was first adopted by a unanimous vote of the delegates.
A summary of it follows:
In regard to suffrage, the right of men and women to vote on all questions and enforcement of the laws enfranchising negroes and others regardless of color or race is demanded.
The prohibition plank pledges the party to work for Nation-wide prohibition and for immediate ratification of the constitutional amendment.
Extension of the Federal loan law is the most important plank concerning farmers which is advocated.
Limitation of immigration, shortening of working hours, Governmental insurance, more rigorous inspection of factories and working places, adequate enforcement of child labor laws are some of the things urged in the labor plank.

It is also advocated that the Government forbid interstate shipments of articles made by children, women employed more than eight hours a day or six days a week, convicts under private contract or persons employed in un-inspected factories or mines. Abolition of contract prison labor, and the establishment of the honor system, in prisons, are advocated.

Much of the platform is devoted to the question of international democracy. The platform declares that the world is the goal for international political development and that the world of secret diplomacy, freedom of the seas and abolition of prohibitive or discriminatory tariffs or taxes upon trade and commerce.

Foreign investments must bear their own risks, another plank demands. Other conditions advocated are freedom of speech both by word of mouth and by printed matter, short ballot in state and municipal elections, right of absent citizens to vote by affidavit, public ownership of public utilities and extension of the postal system and parcel post system.

Theological Issue Raised.
Considerable argument was heard as to whether the preamble to the platform should read: "The National party accepting the guidance of God" or "of God and his son, Jesus Christ." After prayers on various denominations had been read.

discussed that point for about an hour it was decided to leave out "Jesus Christ." A telegram was sent to the British labor party congratulating them upon their work.

A manifesto amplifying the party's platform was approved at the night session, and copies of it will be sent to the labor parties of foreign countries. Besides explaining the purpose of the party, it says:

"Labor will win the war, and the organization of labor forces is a paramount condition to the winning of the war. Labor is gaining a ruling position in all fields of society, and this position must be strengthened until labor controls society. This must be done through unions and farmer organizations."

It also demands that labor representatives be included in any council discussing terms of peace and urges that the housing commission, authorized by Congress, be empowered to continue its work after the war so as to care for the "millions of returning soldiers who will be without means of earning a livelihood."

The report of the committee of organization calling for appointment of a national committee and various state committees was adopted unanimously. The report declared that the party had shown a remarkable growth since it was first organized by the Socialists who bolted from the St. Louis convention, although it did not mention figures, declared that many state candidates on the national ticket would be elected at the next elections and that the party "probably would elect several United States Congressmen."

In addition to the prohibitionists who joined the National party many progressives are coming in, the report added.

Approximately \$50,000—\$20,000 in cash and \$30,000 in pledges—was raised within 40 days—was raised as a campaign fund at the convention.

Subscriptions of \$5,000 each were made by J. A. H. Hopkins, of New Jersey, former National treasurer of the Progressive party; Mrs. Howard Gould, of New York, and William Cochran, of Maryland. California delegates pledged \$10,000 from that state and Massachusetts \$2,000. Hopkins, Cochran and Mrs. Gould agreed to double their subscriptions if the party raised \$85,000 within 90 days.

The convention they adjourned until tomorrow, when National officers will be elected.

WILSON IS LAUDED
Earl Reading Pays High Tribute to President.

MESSAGES CHEER BRITAIN

No Man Better Fitted to Speak for High Ideals for Which Allied Nations Are Fighting, Says Ambassador.

NEW YORK, March 7.—A high tribute to President Wilson was paid by Earl Reading, Great Britain's special Ambassador to the United States, in an address which he made here today.

Asserting that he doubted whether it was realized in Europe how signal was the moral force in this country in the prosecution of war for liberty and "a higher moral elevation for humanity," Earl Reading declared of the President:

"No human being has the faculty of stating in better language the true nature of those ideals than your President, who speaks for you. We in Europe have learned to look to those words of his and to cherish them as representing to us the unalterable determination of America, once it has commenced to war in vindication of right, never to sheath the sword until it has conquered. We know that the words spoken by your President are words upon which we can build. We do. They are messages of hope and comfort to us."

Earl Reading, in his remarks, dwelt upon the bond of sympathy which had been established between the United States and Great Britain. He told, with evident emotion, of the great sacrifices already made by the British people, and asserted that the United States "apart from all its great resources and the moral inspiration it has been to the allies, has clarified our vision for us."

"Every man that you send over is more than one American," he continued. "He is more than one soldier going to the trenches; he is a message from you to us, over there, to be of good cheer, to remember that, after all, there is a population of 110,000,000 behind him. We realize that this war may not be, even from now, a short war. I am not venturing to prophesy. I am only speaking, after all, with the same judgment which you can form when you read the news of the day."

Alluding to the entrance of the United States into the arena as a great world power, the Ambassador said:

"Once again you have attained the high ideal; you will have taken this time a place amongst the nations which, possibly, many of you never thought would happen, but you will have done it holding on high the banner of liberty, calling to all to follow that banner—pointing out that when America does fight it is not for aggression, not for territory, not for conquest, not for vanity or for any dynasty, but for liberty and for humanity."
