When Oregon field forces begin the campaign for the third liberty loan they will be equipped with facilities for securing the most complete information ever obtained in any of the previous pairiotic drives of the state. Through the medium of liberty loan questionnaires, small individual cards, which will furnish the basis for an index and filing system, the record of every resident of the state, not only in this liberty loan, but in the two prior drives, will be secured. will be secured.

Every solicitor for the third liberty loan in Portland and Oregon will begin the work with his collection of individual cards, representative of the house-noiders in the district to which he is assigned. Information will be secured regarding the amounts previously subscribed, the amount subscribed to the third hean, the reasons for non-subscriptions and various other data pertinent the record.

Under the supervision of the Polk Directory Company, 50 volunteer women workers are now engaged in filling out the names and addresses on 150,000 questionnaire cards for Portland and Multnemah County. These will be retained

as permanent Government records after the campaign, The state questionnaire differs slightly from that employed in Portland and Multhomah and is now being issued from state headquarters to the county chairmen of Oregon. More than 150,000 such cards will be distributed to solicitors of the county organisations.
