

MOTHER AND SISTER CLAIM "JACK" DUNN

Belief Held That Youth Who
Tried to Enlist in Marine
Corps Is Aphasiac.

WHEREABOUTS NOT KNOWN

Father Left Family 16 Years Ago.
Right Name of Young Man De-
clared by Mrs. Hilma Diamond
to Be Tracy Ellsworth Dunn.

That Tracy Ellsworth "Jack" Dunn is suffering from aphasia, or loss of memory, is the belief of his sister, Mrs. Hilma Diamond, 166 East Thirty-seventh street, who notified Sheriff Hurlburt yesterday that the young man, who appeared to the Sheriff in an effort to learn the name of his parents and the place of his birth, is her brother.

Mrs. Diamond telephoned to Sheriff Hurlburt yesterday after reading in The Oregonian the story which her brother had told. She said the boy's mother is now visiting at Troutdale and is expected in Portland today. She does not know where his father is, as the father and mother separated 16 years ago.

Mrs. Diamond yesterday made an effort to locate her brother, but without avail. It is believed he has gone to Salem, as he told the officials he was going to the penitentiary in an effort to see if Lee Dunn, who, he said, was his foster parent, was confined there for safe-keeping. The officials are now assisting Mrs. Diamond in locating her brother, and a reunion will be brought about today, if possible.

"I can't understand why he should tell such a strange story unless he is suffering from loss of memory of some sort," said Mrs. Diamond yesterday. "My mother and I have not heard from him for five or six years, and did not know where he was until I read the account in The Oregonian."

"His right name is Tracy Ellsworth Dunn and he will be 24 years old next December. I don't know why he has taken the name Jack. Nor can I understand why he thinks that Lee Dunn is in prison any place, as Lee Dunn is the name of our father. We have an uncle named Dunn, who was in some trouble of that sort years ago, and it may be that Tracy's twisted memory refers to the uncle."

Mrs. Diamond said if her brother's mental condition is in every way satisfactory, except for the apparent loss of memory, it will be an easy matter for him to give the date and place of his birth if he desires to enlist in the marine corps.

The young man came to Portland this week from Weiser, Idaho, and sought to enlist in the marine corps. He told Sheriff Hurlburt he had been refused because he could not give the names of his parents nor the date and place of his birth. He told a strange story and sought the assistance of local officials in helping him to trace down his history in order that he might enlist and see his country.

"The young man appeared in every way normal mentally, so far as I could observe," said Sheriff Hurlburt yesterday. "But now that his sister and mother have been found, it is certainly apparent that the boy is suffering from some mental disorder, so far as his memory is concerned."

U. S. GARDEN ARMY PROJECTED

Five Million Children to Enlist for Home and Country.

WASHINGTON, March 7.—Formation of the "United States Garden Army," with a membership of 5,000,000 children and having for its purpose the supplying of the family of each member with vegetables, small fruits and eggs during the summer and fall, was announced today by the Department of the Interior. The department is organizing the children in cities, towns, villages and suburban homes, while the Department of Agriculture is doing the same work with the children of the farming districts.

The children will be in charge of 40,000 teachers and there will be four or five general superintendents in charge of the districts in which the campaign is to be conducted. The campaign will be marked by competitions and honors, prizes and distinctions will be given the winners. Members will be permitted to display the insignia of the new service, "U. S. G. A."

The announcement says that officials and dignitaries from President Wilson down are taking an interest in the plan. Cardinal Gibbons has answered for the participation of the parochial schools.

It is planned to make the garden army a continuing process. Each generation of children will be brought into the army as soon as they reach a certain age.

"How broad the scope of the enterprise of bringing the children into their country's service is may be gauged from the rough estimates of what they will accomplish," says the announcement. "The food they will produce, translated into terms of money, would duplicate our airship programme or, on the Navy side, it would reproduce all the destroyers and submarine chasers we are sending to put the U-boats out of commission. Railroads to Offer No Inducements to Travelers This Summer.

There will be no trips back to the dear old Eastern home this Summer, according to advices received by Pacific Coast lines from the Transcontinental Passenger Association, of which all are members. However dear to the heart may be the scenes of childhood, fond recollection alone will present

them to view unless one is willing to pay full fare. Wartime conditions are responsible, say local railroad officials, and the order annulling special excursion rates from the Pacific Coast to Eastern points is in line with the director-general's policy of avoiding all save necessary traffic. Consequently the customary Summer fares will not obtain, and nothing save the regular round-trip and one-way rates will be offered.
