

CONSTRUCTION OF TEMPLE TO BEGIN

Cornerstone of Liberty Edifice to Be Laid at Noon Today With Ceremony.

MANY VOLUNTEER TO HELP

Work on Building to Begin at Day-break Tomorrow and Structure is Expected to Be Completed by Night—Workmen Volunteer.

In Liberty Place at noon today will be laid the cornerstone of Liberty Temple—the edifice that is to house the city organization through the third liberty loan campaign and that is to remain indefinitely as the meeting place for patriotic activities.

Portland will turn toward that space that lies between Morrison and Yamhill, on Sixth street, when the clock hands near the noon hour. That space is dedicated to the temple and tomorrow the structure will rise with almost Aladdin-like rapidity, as the volunteer workmen ply hammer and saw and level.

The cornerstone to be laid today was given by the William Penn Stone Company. Figuratively it will bear the responsibility for Portland's quota, for it is the pledge of bond labor organizations and business men that the drive shall not fall of its goal.

Mayor Baker, as master of ceremonies, will introduce E. L. Pennington, orator of the occasion. Patriotic music will be furnished by a band of many pieces, assembled from the members of the musicians' union of the city. Film photos will be taken to appear in the news picture of the temple's construction, which will be shown throughout the Nation.

Labor Volunteers Help.
Both H. A. Whitney, of Sutton & Whitney, architects of the temple, and Julius E. Meier, chairman of the committee in charge, are loud in their praise of the manner in which labor organizations have answered the call and matched the contributions of material with those of their skill at craftsmanship.

"It is safe to say that we have at least 1,000 applications from patriotic men who wished to work in the building of the temple," said Mr. Meier yesterday. "Our force is recruited to full capacity and is working, and it was with regret that we told hundreds that their generosity could not be given outlet. The attitude of Portland's workmen throughout has been inspiring. It is a good omen, I have no doubt, of the manner in which the city will carry on its drive."

Temple to Go Up in Day.
Mr. Whitney expressed himself as gratified at the number of volunteers and their excellence as workmen. While some preliminary work has been done, it is tomorrow that has been officially fixed for the raising of Liberty Temple, and Mr. Whitney expresses confidence that the structure will be completed by nightfall. Work will begin at day-break.

Several of the workmen are from the plants of the Foundation company and the Supply & Baling company, but the bulk and file are drawn from the Carpenters' Union. Requests to be numbered among those who will share the pride of building Liberty Temple were wide and various. One carpenter telephoned his application from Gresham.

Yesterday forenoon, at Liberty loan headquarters, a voice on the telephone entreated some share in the work, and the headquarters staff missed up his line in seeking a solution, before informing her, with deep regret, that there really wasn't anything left for women to do.

"Couldn't I carry water or coffee to the carpenters?" she asked.

Zuehl, of Boston, Mass., the noted organist who recently gave the first recital on the pipe organ in the Public Auditorium, in a letter to a Portland friend received a few days ago said: "More than once this cold, bleak winter I wished I was in Portland, where the warmth of friends, mates and of the hearts of its people contrast sharply with those of Boston. I understand you are to have E. A. Kraft of Cleveland, give some recitals on the pipe organ. Let me assure you that you have a treat in store for you—for he is a great artist on the pipe organ. I say this without the slightest tinge of professional jealousy, though the splendor of his work may dim whatever good impression I may have left with you."
