Another Blunder Charged.

The military consorable in France has been committing another serious blunder in suppressing the names of soldiers who distinguish themselves. There have been stories about some Bergeant or some Lieutenant, and in one instance a Colonel, who performed particularly brave acts, but the names have always been cut out by the opening.

With a million men training to go to France and probably other millions to follow them, this policy of suppressing news—personal news about soldiers who perform acts of gallantry—is having a deterrent effect. The traffed man who is helps. drafted man who is being prepared to fight reads the papers, and he sees that no matter what distinguished service he may perform in France, he will get no credit through the news-

The military censor has been proceeding on the theory that this war is to be won entirely by the officers. England learned differently and so did France. 
