Aggies' Military Instructor Commands in Battle.

REPORT MADE FROM FRONT

American Flag Goes Over Top With McAlexander's Regiment, Side by Side with French Tri-Color.

That Colonel U. G. McAlexander (of several years of military instructor at Oregon Agricultural College, was in command of the first regiment of American troops to "go over the top" in France, and that he carried the first American flag into action, alongside the French tricolor, was information received yesterday by Dr. Harry F. Meyer.

Colonel McAlexander was called to his command from the Oregon Agricultural College at the time of the Mexican border mobilization. Since then the family home has been at Santa Monica, Cal., where Mrs. McAlexander resides.

Photographs of the battle banner have been received by Mrs. McAlexander, and the record of its memorable entrance into the fray is attested by the signature of Colonel E. M. Lillard, commander of the 77th French Infantry, who fought by the side of Colonel McAlexander's command. The date of the engagement is given as November 19, 1917.
