

HUNS TO BE HUNTED

Reports of German Gatherings for Gloating Heard.

INTERNMENT IS PENALTY

Federal Authorities Are Making Thorough Investigation—Disloyal Celebrators Will Be Sternly Dealt With.

Federal authorities are making a thorough investigation of reports which reached the United States attorney's office yesterday that different groups of Germans in this city have been assembling behind closed doors and celebrating the progress of the Prussian drive on the west front. It is stated that the certain penalty of all such disloyal celebrators if apprehended.

It has been reported that a number of such gatherings have taken place in Portland, said United States Attorney Hancy, "and each report is being investigated by the Department of Justice. Where proof of such conduct is established the pro-German sympathizer will be sternly dealt with."

Among the Germans whose names are being held here for investigation is Joseph Herzog, an employe of the Electric Foundry Company, Twenty-first and York streets, who is charged with having expressed gratification with the fact that the Germans in their recent drive took 25,000 prisoners and hoped "they will take 25,000 more."

Fritz Gustav Schiller, 28, who, by his own admission, deserted from a ship in a United States port nine years ago and is unlawfully in this country, was arrested by the United States Marshall's office yesterday. Schiller claims to have registered, but his record will be inquired into. He boasted of a membership in the I. W. W. and proudly exhibited a card of that organization, which he joined two years ago. He also had a quantity of I. W. W. literature in his possession when arrested. He will probably be interned.

German alien enemies have no business belonging to the I. W. W. in these times, anyway," declared Assistant United States Attorney Goldstein, who questioned Herzog.

WAR STAMPS

Eleven per cent of the people of our county are enlisted in the Junior Rainbow Regiment, members of which have all sold \$5 or more worth of war savings stamps. The recent house-to-house canvass resulted in big returns and stimulated interest among all the people.

"War stamp work, with headquarters at Dallas, is well organized and Polk County will not be found wanting when the final accounting is made."

An report of the state-wide canvass comes to there is increasing indication that a vast amount of good was accomplished by the 18,000 or more volunteer workers who made it their business for one whole week to carry the message of thrift and thrift stamps and war savings stamps into every home in the state.

BANKERS WILL MOVE

Morris Bros. Inc., Lease Property on Stark Street.

CONSIDERATION IS \$100,000

Three-Story Building Near Federal Reserve Bank to Be Remodeled for Use of Concern—Business of Company Grows.

Morris Bros. Inc., bankers and bond brokers, yesterday obtained a 99-year lease on the 50-foot property adjoining the Federal Reserve Bank in the north side of Stark street, between Fifth and Sixth streets.

The property is improved with a three-story brick building.

This building is to be remodeled and used exclusively by Morris Bros. in their banking and bond business. They will also build a safety deposit vault in the rear end of the building on the first floor.

The present tenants of the building are expected to vacate by the end of April, so the remodeling operations may begin on May 1. The work will not be completed until about August 1, on which date Morris Bros. Inc., will leave their present quarters in the Railway Exchange building and take possession.

The entire first floor of the remodeled building will be used for the banking and bond business of the company.
