

SENATOR BINGHAM DIES OF PNEUMONIA

Light Attack of Bronchitis
While at National Capital
Has Fatal Result.

NEWS KEPT FROM FRIENDS

Patient Expresses Supreme Confidence in Recovery and Tells His Nurse Half Hour Before Death—He Would Soon Be Well.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, March 28.—State Senator Isaac H. Bingham, formerly of Eugene and recently of Portland, died unexpectedly of bronchial pneumonia at Sibley Hospital in this city at 7:45 this evening.

Senator Bingham has been in Washington for six weeks or more, representing the International Shipbuilding Company, of St. Helena, and during his stay has been in frequent touch with members of the Oregon delegation.

Last week he was confined to his room at the Dewey with what was supposed to be a light attack of bronchitis.

Two days ago he became seriously ill and was removed to Sibley Hospital, but gave instructions that none of his friends should be informed of his removal, and not until today did it become known that his condition was critical.

A consultation of physicians was held this afternoon, when Senator Bingham showed signs of collapse, and oxygen was administered to revive him. Even supreme confidence that his rugged physique would pull him through, and half an hour before he died told his nurse he would soon be well and out again.

Senator Bingham lapsed into unconsciousness shortly after this and passed away while asleep.

Representative McArthur tonight telegraphed relatives and friends of Senator Bingham advising of his death and asking what funeral arrangements to make.

SCHEDULE IS CHANGED

OREGON ELECTRIC ARRANGES NEW TIME CARD.

Changes in Trains Become Effective Sunday, March 31—Many New Stops to Be Made.

Complete change in the schedule of its trains, the first to be made for some years, was announced yesterday by the Oregon Electric Railway, effective on and after Sunday, March 31. New folders will soon be off the press and will be distributed through the company's agencies. The new schedule is as follows:

No. 63, now leaving Portland 10:15 A. M. for Tualatin. Special leaving 4:35 P. M. for Garden Home.
No. 54, arriving Portland 12:30 P. M. from Tualatin.

Trains Leaving Portland.
No. 35, now leaving 10:25 A. M. for Forest Grove, will make local stops between Portland and Garden Home.
No. 7, leaving 10:15 A. M., will stop at Pine Knot and Tualatin about five minutes earlier than before.

No. 8, leaving at 2:40 P. M. for Eugene, will stop at Seaside.
No. 28, will leave at 4 P. M. instead of 2:30 for Forest Grove, making local stops between Portland and Garden Home and Forest Grove 9:15 instead of 9:00.

No. 27, will leave at 4:20 P. M. instead of 4:10, arriving Tualatin 5:15 instead of 4:25.
No. 13, will leave at 4:45 P. M. instead of 4:40, arriving Salem and points south at 5:30.

No. 38, leaving at 5 P. M., will not stop at View Point, Fulton Park, Holaday, Capital Hill, Ryan Place, arriving Garden Home and Tualatin five minutes earlier than now.

HERDS ARE HEALTHY

Scab Practically Eradicated, Says State Board.

NO SHEEP DIP THIS YEAR

Resolution Adopted Asking Congress to Pass Law Conscribing Labor for Farm Work and Livestock Husbandry.

Due to the scarcity of labor and the further fact that scab has been practically eradicated from Oregon herds, the State Livestock Sanitary Board at a meeting in this city yesterday voted to dispense with the annual dipping of sheep for 1918. The only exception to the order of the board were in the case of sheep in Eastern Benton and Western Linn counties, where some scab is reported.

The general condition of Oregon livestock is better this year than it has been in five years, said Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian and secretary of the board. "Stock is comparatively disease-free, which, with the scarcity of labor, moved the board indisputably with sheep dipping this year."

Formal notice that all sheep must be dipped next year was served on sheepmen by the adoption of a resolution to that effect. The board will give the sheepmen of Eastern Oregon an opportunity to rebuild their dipping vats which have been in use for 10 years.

Labor Conscription Urged.
Another resolution was adopted asking Congress to pass a law conscribing able-bodied men between 18 and 60 for farm work and livestock husbandry. A similar resolution was recently adopted by the stockmen of Idaho, who also asked that road-building and other construction work not really emergent be suspended during the harvest season.

The board also arranged with the railroad companies the matter of providing dipping vats at Vale and Huntington, the principal entrance points for bringing breeding sheep into the state. As a further precautionary measure against the spread of scab among sheep, arrangements were made with the various stockyard companies for dipping all sheep at time of shipment.

The financial report submitted yesterday shows that the board's indemnity fund will be exhausted by mid-summer. Of the appropriation of \$45,000 made by the last Legislature for the years 1917-18, disbursements last year aggregated \$32,776.71, leaving a balance of only \$12,223.29 for 1918. It was accordingly decided by the board to discontinue the payment of indemnities decided by the board to discontinue the payment of indemnities on August 1.

Condemning Stock Considered.
In view of the situation the board will take up with the Attorney-General the matter of ascertaining and enforcing under the law to appraise condemned cattle, provide for the sale of the animals and the payment to owners of the difference by the state.

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RULING HELPS FARMERS

IMPORTANT CHANGE MADE IN INTERNAL REVENUE LAW.

Representative Sinnott Wins Appeal for Action Affecting Lands in Western States.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, March 28.—Oregon farmers and other farmers in the West who have acquired title to valuable farms under the homestead or other public land laws will be saved considerable sums by reason of a modification of the internal revenue regulations ordered today, after Representative Sinnott had made a second appeal for relief from an apparent injustice of present regulations.

Mr. Sinnott called to the attention of Commissioner Roper section 207 of the war profits tax law, a section the Commissioner had previously overlooked in preparing regulations for assessment of excess profits against farmers.

Immediately this section was considered along with Mr. Sinnott's argument, following which the Commissioner dictated the following statement: "Land, which prior to January 1, 1914, has been acquired by a farmer by homesteading, pre-emption, public entry or similar transaction, will, for the purpose of determining invested capital, be considered as tangible property paid into the business, and may be included at its value as of January 1, 1914, if adequate evidence of such value is furnished by the taxpayer."

Mr. Sinnott urged that the farmer who bought land now valuable, but for which he paid \$5 and \$10 an acre, should also have the benefit of this ruling.

This point was not definitely settled, but the Commissioner thought it might be covered by the words "similar transaction."

SKIRTS TO BE SHORTER
Latest Fashion Edict Prescribes Abbreviated Clothes for Women.

WASHINGTON, March 21.—They'll soon be wearing 'em higher, not lower, in Hawaii, but in the United States, if woolen manufacturers' suggestions to the government for shorter skirts to conserve wool are accepted.

And the skirt will part company with the shoe tops, anyhow, for the Council of National Defense is co-operating with shoe makers to make shoes lower, and only in black, tan and suede.

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
