

PRESIDENT ASKS LIFE FOR MOONEY

California Executive Appealed To in Behalf of Man Convicted of Bomb Murders.

DOUBT OF GUILT ARISES

Labor Mediation Commission's Special Report One of Reasons Believed to Have Caused Mr. Wilson's Action.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., March 29.—President Wilson has telegraphed Governor William D. Stephens, of California, asking executive clemency for Thomas L. Mooney, now under death sentence.

Mooney was convicted of murder in connection with a bomb explosion in San Francisco in a preparedness parade July 27, 1916, which caused the death of 19 persons and injured 40 others.

Executive clemency was Mooney's only hope, the State Supreme Court, which is confined to questions of law in reviewing murder cases, having recently rejected his appeal for a new trial.

Special Report Made to President. President Wilson received a special report on the Mooney case from the labor mediation commission, which investigated it while on the Pacific coast, and reported, among other things, that while the official record of the trial might be flawless, as the State Supreme Court afterward found, the testimony of witnesses for the state had been changed from trial to trial as the various defendants in the case were arraigned and for this reason doubt was cast on the validity of their evidence.

Other factors in the case were an appeal, outside the record, to the State Supreme Court, backed by the trial judge and the Attorney General of the state, the latter declaring that a "miscarriage of justice has occurred." The court finds it had no jurisdiction in the appeal.

Fame of the case reached to Petrograd, in the first days of the revolution, and a demonstration against Mooney's execution was made in the streets.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., March 29.—Governor Stephens, upon his arrival at Camp Kearny, said: "I have nothing to say. I have received a message from President Wilson, but at present the Mooney case is not in my hands; it is in the hands of the Supreme Court. Later I may make a statement."

SAN FRANCISCO, March 29.—President Wilson's telegram to Governor Stephens, requesting that executive clemency be extended to Thomas L. Mooney, will have no effect on the appeal to be made for executive clemency by Mooney's counsel, it was said today by Attorney Maxwell McNutt.

DUTCH SAFE FOR MONTHS

Food Supply on Hand Will Last Until September.

AMSTERDAM, March 29.—It is estimated officially that the supply of cereals in Holland is sufficient to meet the demand for about five months longer.

Figures issued today covering the country's resources of food are as follows: Wheat, 67,750; rye, 67,900; stocks of flour, 18,900; potato flour, 6,700; stocks of flour mills, 16,900.

These aggregates, 181,550. To them will be added the remainder of the home crop yet to be delivered and estimated to be 17,900 tons of wheat and 45,500 tons of rye.

NINE MORE HOTELS UP

REJECTION OF LICENSES CAUSES KEEPERS TO PROTEST.

Council Arranges Session for Thursday, When Remonstrators Will Have Another Hearing.

Because of complaints made yesterday by several of the proprietors in the list of 49 hotels, lodging-houses and rooming-houses, decided on by the City Council as unfit to have licenses to continue in business, the City Council arranged to allow the complainants formally to present their cases to the Council Thursday morning at 10 o'clock.

While the Council has decided by unanimous vote to refuse licenses to the 49 places in question, the decisions are subject to reconsideration if the persons involved can make satisfactory showing. It was reported yesterday that the majority of the proprietors whose applications were rejected will not protest, but will dispose of their holdings.
