TRAFFIC CONGESTION BEFORE MAYOR.—Plans for relieving the traffic congestion at Sixth and Morrison streets, caused by the Liberty Temple in Sixth street, are being made by Mayor Baker. Reports indicate that during the day time there is an almost continuous congestion of vehicles at the intersection. An effort will be made to station policemen in neighborhood streets to divert as much traffic as possible away from this particular intersection. This can be accomplished, the Mayor says, by having machines turn out of Sixth street at Alder, Washington or Stark and off Morrison street either at Fifth or Broadway.

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SMELT SCOOPED OUT

Thousands of Fishermen Go to Sandy River.

RAOD TO GROUNDS JAMMED

State Fishing Law Is Set Aside by Governor With View to Making Smelt Big Factor in Food Conservation.

The big annual smelt run is on in Sandy River near Troutdale. Thousands of pounds of the tasty little silver-sided fish were scooped up yesterday by thousands of people, who lined the banks of the river from early morning until late last night.

Never before was there such a rush to the fishing grounds as yesterday. The congestion of traffic along the Lumber River Highway became so great that Deputy Sheriffs had to take charge and direct the scolding mass of machines in and out for a distance of a mile or more. The jam became so great that for part of the day it was impossible to find a parking spot for a car anywhere within a half-mile of the fishing ground.

Fish Simply Shoveled Out.

The fishermen used nets, scoops and anything that could be used in dipping up the fish, which were so thick in the river that it appeared to be a river of smelt rather than a river of water. Automobiles returning to the city brought the fish in sacks, boxes, buckets and packages of all kinds.

It was no trick at all to scoop up a big supply of the fish after a few minutes' effort. Thousands of people lined the banks and toiled with their improvised fishing equipment. As one fisherman got his fill he moved out and another stepped in. Some people were fortunate enough to have long poles with nets attached, while others had short nets and waded into the water to reach the fish. Still others stood on planks extended out into the water between rocks.

Governor Sets Law Aside.

Although the state law prohibits fishing such as that yesterday, this law has been set aside by Governor Winant, left Saturday for Camp Lewis. PORTLAND HATTEL MEN WILL COMPLY WITH HOOVER'S REQUEST.

Among the conferees who met with Mr. Hoover was H. W. EX-WIFE'S LEAP FUTILE

CLAD IN BATHROBE, MRS. IDA PRICE TRIES TO ESCAPE POLICE.

Ex-Husband and Two Patrolmen Arrest Woman and Soldier Early in Morning at Woman's Home.

By jumping out of her bedroom window garbed in a bathrobe, Mrs. Ida Price, divorced wife of G. C. Price, endeavored to make her escape from her home, 284 Clay street, at 3:30 o'clock yesterday morning, when her divorced husband, Patrolman Travis, and Myers to the home. The police, however, caught her as she ran through the yard, and arrested her and Albert King, a soldier from Vancouver, B. C., on a charge of disorderly conduct.

Price and his wife and King were central figures in a divorce suit two months ago before Circuit Judge Gatens. Price sought a divorce on charges of infidelity, naming King as co-respondent. Mrs. Price, however, won the divorce after both sides of the sordid domestic war had been told.

Price, it was brought out during the divorce hearing, had employed detectives to shadow his wife for several months. He was unable to obtain damaging evidence. But, even after his wife won the divorce, Price is said to have been playing detective, and it was because of his slouching that he learned that his divorced wife was entertaining King at her home during the early hours of yesterday and called in the police to assist him.

Price told the police that the woman is still his wife, although the Circuit Court records show that she obtained a divorce from him more than two months ago.

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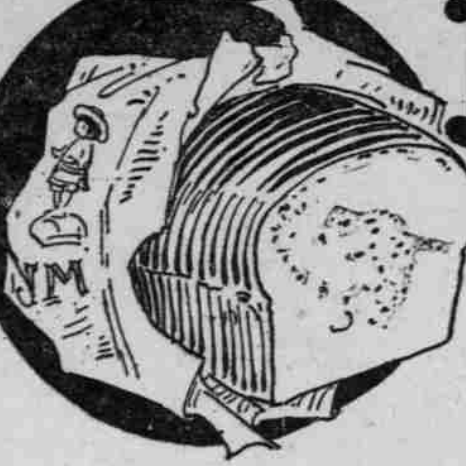

Chief of Police Johnston yesterday asked that the people of Portland assist in selecting a name for the home, which is being constructed as a war emergency measure. It will take the place of the present temporary home for women at the county farm. One of the women are under medical care. The new home will be ready for occupancy by May 15. It is being erected at a cost of about \$25,000. The women who are to be confined there will have useful employment during their incarceration.
