

BIG GERMAN ARMY LANDS IN FINLAND

Sasnitz Disembarks at Hango With 40,000 Troops to Help Put Down Rebels.

ANTI-SEMITIC RIOTS START

Many Jews Killed at Kikand and Kiev—Armenian Army Corps Reported to Have Recaptured City of Erzerum From Turks.

LONDON, April 4.—The force landed by the Germans at Hango, Finland, reported in a Berlin official statement yesterday, comprises 40,000 men under General Sasnitz, according to the Central News correspondent at Copenhagen, telegraphing Wednesday.

The artillery equipment of the force is 200 guns with 2000 machine guns.

PETROGRAD, April 3.—(By the Associated Press.)—Thirty German transports with troops have arrived at Hango, on the southern coast of Finland, southeast of Helsinki.

The Bolshevik commissary for Finnish affairs reports that M. D'Estrees, the Belgian Minister to Russia, has been wounded by White Guards of government troops, while attempting to pass into the rebel lines.

An official statement from Berlin received in Amsterdam Wednesday announced that German troops had landed at Hango to give help in Finland. The Germans will assist the Finnish troops in putting down the rebels.

PETROGRAD, April 4.—(By the Associated Press.)—Several Russian warships, including four submarines, in the harbor of Hango, were blown up by their commanders, who feared capture by the Germans.

The Mayor of Sukhum-Kale reports that the Black Sea fleet torpedo boats are bombarding and looting towns along the coast.

STOCKHOLM, April 4.—According to a dispatch from Vasa, dated yesterday, the White Guards captured the eastern part of Vasa yesterday morning, notwithstanding desperate resistance, and captured a thousand prisoners and a quantity of locomotives, weapons and provisions.

The reports from Swedish correspondents contain stories of terrible atrocities committed by Red Guards. Red Guards also accuse the White Guards of atrocities.

Red Guards Executed. Correspondents with General Mannerheim's army admit that the Red leaders are regarded as murderers and were shot when captured.

MOSCOW, Wednesday, April 3.—(By the Associated Press.)—In order to insure possession of the Kiev-Vorobzha Railway, the Germans have occupied Putil, 10 miles north of the railroad in Kursk government.

An energetic defense is being organized at Kharkov and Ekaterinoslav, but, owing to the insufficiency of the forces, it is believed the Germans will continue hostilities until they have occupied Chelm, Volhynia, Podolia and other provinces claimed as belonging to Ukraine.

LONDON, April 4.—Since the occupation by the Germans of Paltava, 70 miles southwest of Kharkov, the position of the Bolshevik detachments opposing them has become more serious, Reuters Moscow correspondent cables.

Kharkov Under Attack. The Germans are conducting an offensive against Kharkov from Paltava and Vorobzha, employing large detachments which have already occupied Gloutchky, 10 miles from Kharkov.

The correspondent also says the Germans have seized at Paltava \$1,000 tons of grain, which they are exporting to Germany.

MOSCOW, Tuesday, April 2.—(By the Associated Press.)—Anti-Jewish riots have occurred in Turkestan. In Kokand 300 persons were killed and most property destroyed, according to the Ramsey-Cutts.

Anti-Semitic agitation in Kiev, it adds, is assuming acute form. When that city was captured by the Ukrainians, most of the inhabitants they shot were Jews.

LONDON, April 4.—Erzerum, the principal city of Turkish Armenia, is reported in an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Moscow to have been recaptured from the Turks by an Armenian corps, aided by a detachment of Armenian volunteers.

The Armenians also are reported to be holding other territories in the Erzerum district.

After the conclusion of peace with Turkey, Russia evacuated Turkish Armenia, which the Turks recaptured. They began a fresh series of massacres and the Armenians undertook the organization of an army to defend themselves.

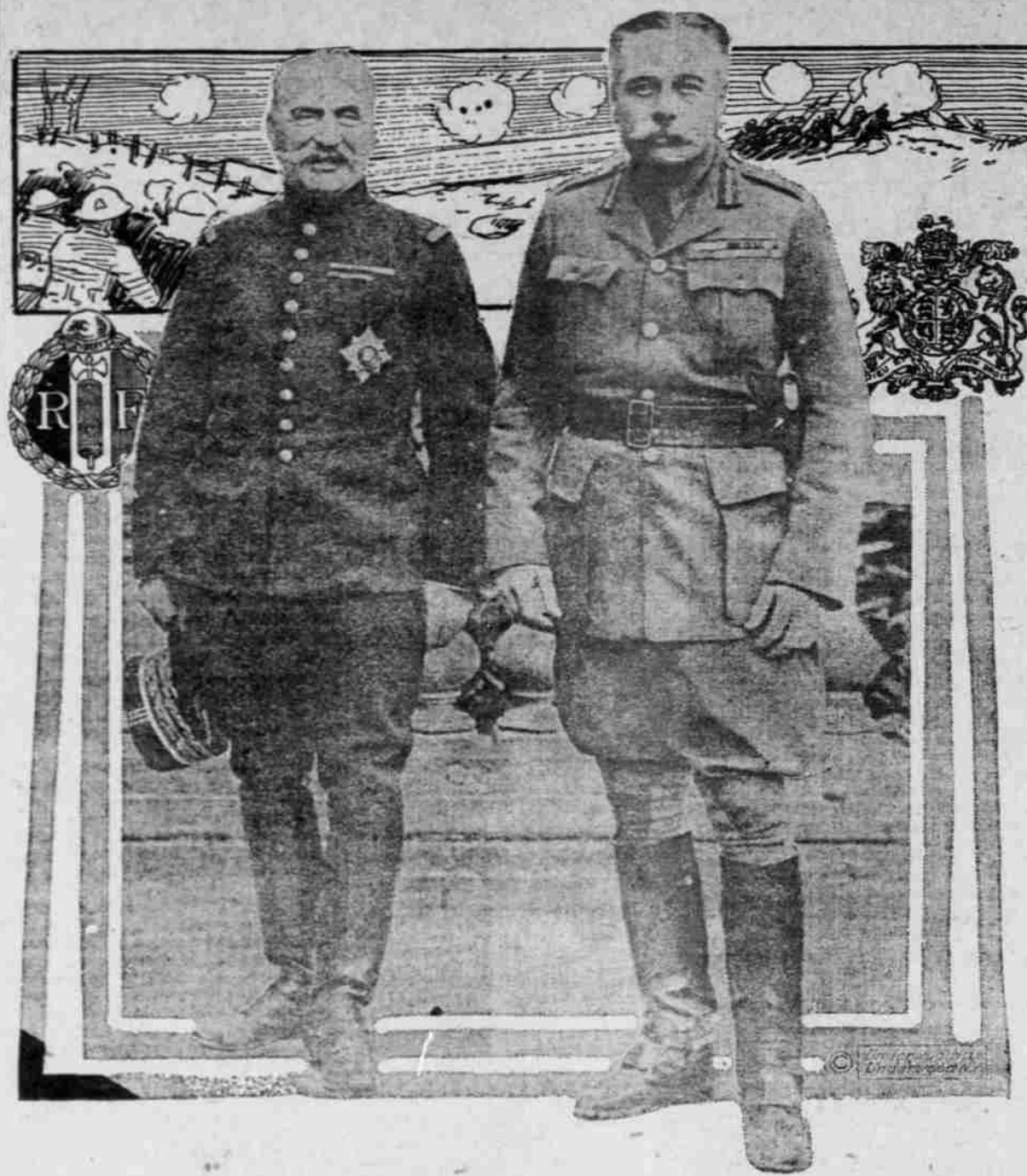

Leaving Portland last Saturday in company with Manicourt, ex-Cashier of Telegraph Company Gets as Far as San Jose, Cal.

SAN JOSE, Cal., April 4.—Frank R. Cross, ex-cashier of the Western Union Telegraph Company at Portland, Or., alleged to have fled that city with \$2500 of the company's funds, was arrested by the police here today.

Cross is said to have made a complete confession to the police, and to have directed them to his rooms to recover \$800 of the funds.

According to the police Cross fled first to Sacramento, where he purchased an automobile.

The police said that Cross had confessed bringing a Portland woman to this city with him.

Cross said today that he was a relative of V. H. Bope, who, he said, is a vice-president of the Carnegie Steel Company at Pittsburgh.

Frank R. Cross, ex-cashier of the Portland branch of the Western Union Telegraph Company, who is wanted for the embezzlement of funds of the company, left Portland accompanied by Miss Hazel Steure, a manicurist, on whom he is said to have lavished money for several months.

About the time Cross was arrested in San Jose, W. A. Robb, manager of the Portland office of the company, swore to a complaint charging him with larceny by embezzlement. Between \$2000 and \$2500 is said to have been embezzled.

Cross disappeared from Portland last Saturday, presumably in company with Manicourt.
