

POLICE RAID I. W. W.; 27 HELD FOR TRIAL

Day's Roundup in Spokane by
City and County Officials
Nets Total of 94.

SEVERAL LATER RELEASED

Nineteen of Number, on Examination,
Are Charged With Vagrancy.
Quantities of Significant
Circulars Are Found.

SPOKANE, Wash., April 5.—As the result of wholesale arrests by members of the Spokane police force today of alleged Industrial Workers of the World, 25 men and one woman, taken in raids on district headquarters of the organization and looting places of members, are held by the police tonight for trial in Municipal or Federal court.

The raids by the police today followed a conference of City Commissioners yesterday, at which Governor Lister had offered to take over the police and Sheriff's forces of the city and county and curb the activities of the Industrial Workers here, but had refused to send soldiers, as the city and county officials had requested him to do.

Many Taken at Headquarters.

The greatest number of the prisoners were arrested at the district headquarters of Architects in the Industrial Union, No. 400, where 75 were taken into custody. Only five were taken from the district headquarters of Lumber Workers' Union, No. 500, and 13 others were arrested in a poolhall frequented by members of the organization. A quantity of I. W. W. literature and records were seized.

Participating in the examination of the prisoners this afternoon were Chief of Police W. C. Weir, Detective Captain Martin Burns, City Prosecuting Attorney Arthur Hooper and other police department officials and Immigration Inspector A. W. Richardson.

Circulars were found calling upon all members of the organization to furnish information concerning I. W. W. who were in any way assisting with the National war program. These, it is said, will be closely investigated by the Federal authorities.

"SEATTLE DEFENSE COMMITTEE."

Monette Issues Statement.
John Monette, acting in defense of the I. W. W. when asked for a statement, wrote the following:
"I am elected to represent and help in the defense of the members in jail, also representing George F. Vandervort, chief counsel of the Chicago defense."

This conversation took place when Detective Mason began to seize the records.

"Are you going to take all that defense stuff?" Monette demanded.

"We're going to take it all; every bit of it," the detective replied.

"Don't you know it is against the law to take matters for the defense of prisoners?"

"We're going to take it all, but anything that does not pertain to the organization you can have back," Monette answered, and Monette subsided.

The officers are in a position to make wholesale arrests, and even raids, if they deem that necessary. The places are under surveillance and smaller raids are expected to follow.

More possession of an I. W. W. card or other literature is being taken as sufficient ground for an arrest.

CONSCRIPT KEEPS WORD

ABERDEEN MAN TRAVELS FROM
ALASKA TO ANSWER DRAFT.

Elmer Hemrick, of German Parentage,
Pushes Through Snow and Lives
on Porcupine to Reach Seward.

ABERDEEN, Wash., April 5.—(Special.)—Elmer Hemrick, manager of the Surf Packing Company, of this city, rushed his way 500 miles in Alaska in order to return to Aberdeen and keep a promise with the local draft board to report April 1. On the trip he lost 25 pounds and, with his fellow travelers, hauled their sled by hand. The three men in the party, J. W. Walker and H. W. Short, of this city, being the others, ran out of provisions during the journey and part of the time lived on porcupine which they killed on the trail.

Hemrick had gone to Alaska to build a cannery. He was not called in the first draft, but promised to be back April 1 to go in the second draft if it was called by that time. He is of German parentage.

The 450-mile trip of the men was made from Inner Shinn Bay to Seward. The men were on the trail for 51 days. Soft snow made progress difficult and after that rain and hail held up the party for eight days and by that time their provisions were gone. Porcupine and alms were the only food they could procure. Tea once was made by burning bear fat and the handles of the sled.

NEED INCREASES TO MUZZLE SECTION

Senate Neglects All Other
Business to Expedite
Urgent Legislation.

MOB LAW NEW DANGER

Lawmakers Plan to Curb Violations
of Espionage Act and at Same
Time Seek to Avoid Abridg-
ing Individual Liberties.

WASHINGTON, April 5.—All other business was laid aside by the Senate today for denunciation of disloyalty, sedition, German spies and the Industrial Workers of the World and discussion of how the espionage act should be extended so as to curb these evils and avoid mob law without abridging the fundamental liberties of American citizens.

While the Senate debated the pending section bill, carrying severe penalties for disloyal utterances and attempts to obstruct the draft or liberty loans, President Wilson and the Cabinet gave attention to reports of the lynching of Robert Praeger, a German, at Collinsville, Ill., last night.

Members of the Cabinet said afterward the deplorable incident emphasized the necessity for immediate legislation that would enable the Government to deal with disloyalty and enemy agitation, so that the people would not be tempted to take the law into their own hands.

Passage Expected Today.
Administration leaders in the Senate hope to pass the section bill tomorrow, the anniversary of America's entrance into the war. An agreement for a vote tomorrow, sought tonight by Senator Overman, of North Carolina, in charge of the measure, was blocked by Senator Reed, of Missouri.

The Missouri Senator said he was in sympathy with the general purposes of the legislation, but thought it should not be hastily considered.

When Senator Overman said that the Attorney-General had urged passage of the bill today because its provisions would be needed during the liberty loan campaign, Senator Reed said that was "utter nonsense."

Several efforts to widen the scope of the bill were made today, though there were criticisms that its prohibitions against disloyal and seditious utterances are already too broad.

Senator Lodge, of Massachusetts, introduced an amendment prohibiting transmission through the mails of any matter printed in the German language, and Senator Lewis, of Illinois, one which would forfeit the citizenship and property of persons adjudged disloyal by a jury.

During the discussion the attitude of Victor L. Berger, Socialist candidate for the Senate in the recent Wisconsin election, was denounced by Senator Borah, of Idaho, and Senator Lodge as disloyal and verging on treason.

Restrictions Held Too Broad.
Senator Lodge, while urging the death penalty for spies and German agents who destroy property in this country, said the bill's restrictions upon free speech were too broad and could be used to suppress legitimate peace discussion.

Senator Hawdick, of Georgia, suggested that they might prevent peace talk later when such discussion might be proper.

Senator Lodge objected to wide powers now being exercised by the Postmaster-General as to the use of the mails.

Senator King, of Utah, declared these powers had been an effective weapon in the hands of the Government in stamping out the propaganda of the I. W. W. and similar organizations, and added that in any case in which Mr. Burleson had acted his judgment had been vindicated.

Senator Lodge replied that he preferred to insert a provision in the bill excluding certain publications instead of "leaving it to a Cabinet member."

Powers Held Too Broad.
"I am not attacking the Postmaster-General," he added, "but I do too broad powers to trust to one man."

A conference agreement on the bill to punish sabotage was presented to the House today by Chairman Webb, of the judiciary committee.

The measure prescribes a maximum penalty of 30 years' imprisonment for conviction of damaging any war material or any building, group, mine, or other places where war materials are produced, manufactured, repaired, stored and distributed, or any forts, arsenals, Navy yards, camps, prisons or any other military or naval establishments or any railroads, canals, wharves, vehicles, aqueducts, water and gas mains and telephone and telegraph lines.

STEEL SHORTAGES END

UNIFIED DIRECTION OF DELIVERY
DECIDED ON.

War Industries Board Takes Action
That Is Expected to Result Favorably
to Shipbuilding.

WASHINGTON, April 5.—Unified direction of steel deliveries has been decided on by the War Industries Board as a preventive of future shortages in shipbuilding or any other essential line of work.

Representatives of the Army and Navy, who have been stationed at each mill heretofore to speed the output of war orders, will be withdrawn and replaced by a single representative of the War Industries Board, who will be governed by the requirements division as to priorities and will see that deliveries are made before there is danger of any stoppage of work.
