

DIVORCE DECREES ILLEGAL

Affidavit Must Be Made Defendants Not in Military Service.

Anxious to legalize divorce decrees granted to them during the past month, four plaintiffs who won decrees since March 8, last, yesterday filed affidavits in the Circuit Court setting forth that the defendants are not now in the military service of the United States. military service of the United States.
This action was taken in view of the announcement by Presiding Judge Morrow that a Federal act approved March s forbids the granting of default decrees unless the plaintiffs first file affidavits that the defendants are not in the military service. The act further provides that if the plaintiffs cannot make this affidavit they must file artmake this affidavit they must flie suf-ficient bonds to protect the defendants in case further litigation is started.
