Circuit Clouts Contributed by Lee and Peterson—Teck Gets Four Hits and Scores Four Runs for Portland Team.

TRAINING CAMP, Pendleton, Or., April 14.—(Special.)—In the face of a blinding dust storm which drew only a handful of fans to Roundup Park today the Portland recruits gave the youngsters from Walla Walla a beautiful mat of whitewash. Score, 16 to 0.

Curse Halls Totally Unknown. The Walla Walla hurlers were more youngsters with nothing but a fast ball right down the alleyway and the Portland recruits picked their offerings at will.

Dick Mitchell, who was knocked senseless with a line drive Saturday, opened on the mound for Portland and allowed three hits in a like number of innings. Carl Clow, from Bend, finished the game and had a scoreless inning, striking out 13 batters in six innings and allowing one hit. Not a Walla Walla player reached third base during the game.

Portland started the cannoning in the first inning, when Holbecher and Teck walked and scored when Lee cleared the centerfield with a home run. Four runs were scored in the third. Teck singled and took second on a wild throw. Lee was safe on a fielder's choice and both scored when Fisher doubled. Peterson leaned against the post for a home run, scoring Fisher.

Heavers Nipper in Fourth. Teck scored the first Portland tally in the fourth, when he reached first on an error, took second on a wild pitch and scored on Fisher's single. Dempsey singled to center in the fifth, took second on Penabaz's single and scored when Teck singled through short. Lee was passed in the sixth, took second on a wild pitch and scored on Fisher's line drive to center. Fisher taking second on the throw in and scoring when Peterson singled to right.

Portland gathered four more runs in the seventh on three singles and two errors. Fisher's recruits run the curtain down in the ninth with the final tally when Clow singled and scored on Teck's triple.

Outfielder Sullivan was out of the game with an injured foot. Pitcher Shoup arrived today from Cleveland, but did not don a uniform.

DILLON BOUND FOR WEST

WELL-KNOWN FIGHTER TO MAKE HEADQUARTERS IN PORTLAND. Battle to Be Under Direction of Bobby Evans Unless Letter is Called to Camp Lewis Soon.

Jack Dillon, the Hoosier Bearcat and at one time considered to be the only man in the world who stood a chance with Jess Willard, despite the fact that he is only about five feet tall, 130 pounds and weighs 170 pounds, will be in Portland in a few weeks.

Diamond Bob Evans, Portland boxing promoter and manager, has arranged a number of bouts for Dillon on the Pacific Coast and is bringing the "fight killer" here. Dillon will make Portland his headquarters while in the West. His first bout will be with Frank Farmer in Tacoma May 2. Evans also has booked him to appear in Seattle, Portland, San Diego and other Coast cities.

Evans may not be on hand to greet his battler at the hand of Uncle Sam next year.

Evans, whose real name is A. C. Ardis, has been placed twenty-seventh on the list of drafted men eligible to be called to division 2. Twenty-five men have been called from that division and two of the 25 cannot be located. In case that they are not found Evans will don the khaki and shoulder a rifle for Uncle Sam, and he cannot get to camp fast enough to suit him.

Evans tried to enlist three times last year and was turned down on each occasion. However, Bobby has been doing a little work now and then and when he came up for examination under the draft he passed A-1, which is his pleasure. He is now waiting for the call and is ready to go at a moment's notice. Evans said yesterday that he would like to stage another show for the Portland fight fans before he leaves but that there are no big things in this world at present than boxing shows and that Uncle Sam comes first with him.

Regardless of whether he is called to the colors or not within the next few weeks, Jack Dillon will come West to fulfill his engagements. Dillon enlisted in the Naval Reserve some time ago and also is ready to serve his country, although he has several dependents, including an aged mother.

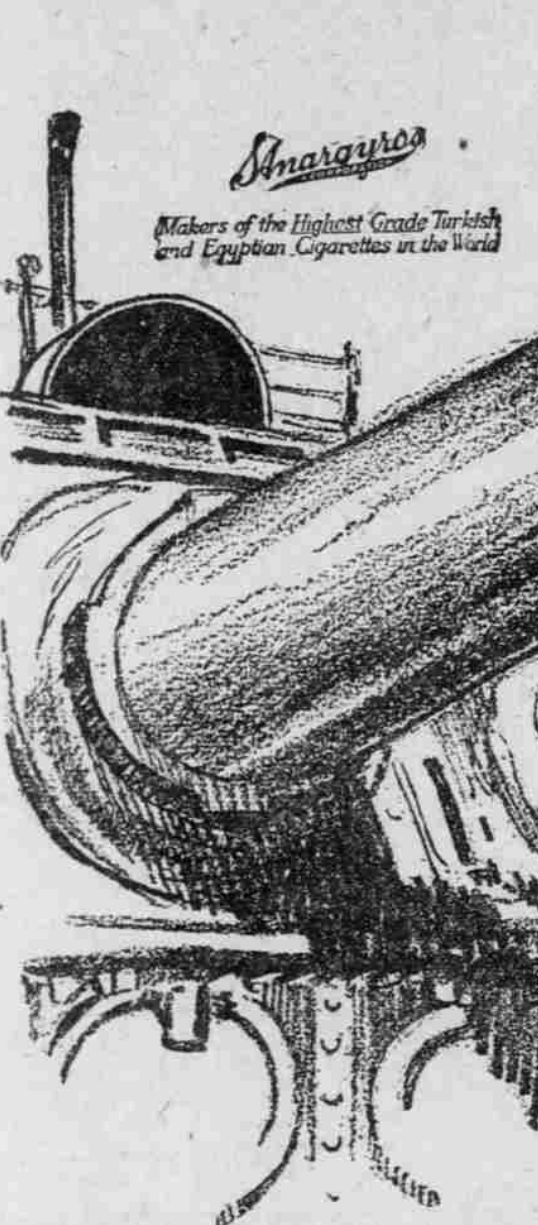

FINLAND'S FINISH IS NEAR

German Sea and Land Forces Closing on Helsingfors.

STOCKHOLM, April 14.—The closing scenes of the Finnish revolution may soon be enacted, according to indications in the latest reports from the German fleet now lying in Helsingfors harbor and German troops, which have been landed, have taken Hyving, which is the railway junction south from Helsinki. This covers the communication of the Red Guard in Helsingfors with Viborg.

The Germans also are closing in on Helsingfors from other quarters and now are within 12 miles of the city at one point.

American Steamer Burned. SYDNEY, N. S., April 14.—The agent of the Marine Department here was notified today that an American steamer was burned off the Nova Scotia coast Saturday night and that the crew had been transferred to a United States warship which came to her assistance. The name of the vessel was not mentioned.
