Charlie Chaplin at Liberty.

CHARLES SPENCER CHAPLIN, or Charlie Chaplin, as he is known to the "movie millions," million-dollar comedian, king of slapstickers, golden clown of the ages, world's greatest harlequin, etc., makes his 1918 film debut at the Liberty Theater on Sunday. A three-reeler, "A Dog's Life," is the first of the Chaplin pictures under the new contract which guarantees Charlie \$1,000,000 for eight pictures during the year.

From the days of Keystone comedies, at less than \$100 a week, to a million-dollar-a-year man is a huge financial leap, but Chaplin holds that record. FLOUR GIFTS ASKED

Freewill Offering of Excess Stocks Is Requested.

MEN OVERSEAS NEED GRAIN

Donations Will Be Resold Locally, Releasing Equal Amount at Seaboard Points for Shipment to Allies and Troops.

Altruistic families and manufacturing users of flour of the Northwest—some of them—age confronted with the privilege of contributing directly in the feeding of those fighting men bearing the brunt of Hun onslaughts. Representatives of the Food Administration of Washington, Idaho and Oregon yesterday issued a call to every flour user who happens to have an excess above immediate needs to turn that amount over to feed the men of the Army and Navy and those of the allies.

Under the novel plan evolved not much of the flour turned back to the Government will be forwarded for shipment overseas. For the most part it will be resold locally, while an equal amount is released at some point nearer seaboard for dispatch to the valiant warriors.

The self-explanatory announcement made by the Federal agents follows: "Mr. Hoover has wired all Federal Food Administrators that the excess stocks of flour held by public eating places, bakers, dealers and consumers may be voluntarily surrendered for the use of the Army and Navy and the allies."

This practical method of handling such returned flour will be through the local merchant, who is hereby requested to receive all such flour and pay the holding consumer the actual cost of same, and then re-distribute it without any additional charge to the ultimate consumer. Where merchants accumulate more than their 20 days' supply and all hotels, bakers, etc., that have an excess amount that cannot be disposed of locally, they should immediately communicate with M. H. Houser, Grain Commissioner of the Food Administration, Board of Trade building, Portland, and he will arrange for the transportation to the seaboard. All flour returned to the merchant that is resold to the consumer should be reported to Mr. Houser in order that an equal amount may be released for shipment to the allies.

The whole object of the above arrangement is to provide a channel through which all excess quantities of flour may reach the Army and Navy or the allied armies as a voluntary offering of the people of this country. In a letter with which State Administrator Ayer accompanied copies of the call sent to all county administrators, attention is called to the difficulty grocers may encounter in accepting and paying for flour that may be returned. It is suggested that all questions of price and other adjustments be referred directly to Mr. Houser.

U. S. FOREST TIMBER SOLD

Price Paid Is High in Oregon and Low in Washington State.

Ewing Bros., of New Bridge, Or., were the highest bidders on 440,000 board feet of yellow pine and 200,000 board feet of Douglas fir located on Summit Creek watershed on the Minam National Forest, in Baker County. District Forester George H. Cecil awarded the sale to them yesterday at \$2.75

per thousand for the yellow pine and \$1.50 a thousand feet for the other species.

Sale of 610,000 board feet of yellow pine at \$1.75 a thousand and 220,000 board feet of Douglas fir and other species at 50 cents, located on Iceyle Creek watershed on the Wenatchee National Forest, was awarded to the Leavenworth Box Company, of Leavenworth, Or., the highest bidder.

T. T. Munger, forest examiner, in charge of timber sales in the Oregon National forests, left last night for a 10-day trip in the Siskiyou Forest, near Grants Pass. He will inspect the situation in sales, and the progress made on timber already awarded.
