Portland Magnate Watches Regulars Subdue Yannigans in Hard-Fought Game.

BUCKAROOS TO BE NAME

McCrede Officially Selects Title for Team in Appreciation of Treatment Received at Hands of Round-Up City—Home Series Planned.

TRAINING CAMP, Pendleton, Or., April 19.—(Special.)—The arrival of Judge McCrede in training camp today infused a world of "jazz" into the work of the Portland players and they dashed out another one of those hard-fought contests, the regulars winning from the Yannigans, score 5 to 4.

Clow, McKimley and McGarrigle pitched for the regulars, with Rapp and Mitchell hurrying for the Yannigans. Arthur Ritter was the hitting star of the day, with three hits out of three trips to the plate, one being a double. He pitched a base and fielded perfectly. Manager Fisher was among those who gathered more than one hit. Fisher cracked two doubles out of three times at bat.

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, April 19.—(Special.)—With the Aggies leading in the eighth, 2 to 0, with two men out, Wilson on third and Grebe on second, it remained for Oregon's lanky first sacker, to plant a straight drive to right field for a home run, scoring three tallies and winning the first of eight games in the Oregon-Aggies series today, 3 to 2.
