Eastman was editor-in-chief, and the other defendants were associated with him in publishing the magazine.

Although Rogers admitted having written the pamphlets soliciting subscriptions, he disclaimed any connection with the editorial management of the publication.

Rogers Alleges Approval. A statement that George Creel, chair

A statement that George Creel, chairman of the committee en public information, approved the publication of one issue of the Masses, a copy of which is in evidence and is aliesed to contain matter found objectionable by the Government, was made by Rogers.

This statement was contained in a letter which Rogers identified as having been written by him last June to a local news company.

"I can easily imagine that you might be worried regarding the matter which our magazine contains in these hectifies," continued the latter. "but I can assure you that we have gone over the whole proposition pretty carefully with George Creel, head of the censorahip board at Washington, and are taking no chances."

"While in his (Creeks) presence I submitted the whole magazine," said Rogers. "He looked it over and said while he thought the advertisement of Mrs. Cram was a foolish thing to do, and did not see fit to suppress it, nor did he see anything objectionable in the magazine."

More Than 8,000,000 Feet Being

Shipped Weekly From Bay Points. NORTH BEND, Or., April 22 .- (Spe cial.)—The heaviest rail shipments of lumber ever made in the history of

lumber ever made in the history of Coos Bay are now being sent out by the mills of North Bend and Marshfield. An average of eight carloads a day, aggregating over 300,000 feet, are being shipped to Middle West and Eastern points.

In addition to the heavy rail shipments from four to six vessel loads, totaling between 3,000,000 and 4,000,000 feet, are being dispatched weekly to California points. It is estimated that the total shipments of lumber now being made by rail and boat from Coos County will exceed \$,000,000 weekly.
