

BUCKAROOS READY TO 'LET 'ER BUCK'

Portland Players Arrive in Great Shape to Start 1918 Pennant Race.

EXHIBITION GAME IS TODAY

Locals to Tangle With Vancouver Soldiers on Vaughn-Street Lot in First of Three Contest Series. 17 Players on Roster.

With a million dollars' worth of "pep" and all rarin' to go, Manager Bill Fisher and his Buckaroos arrived last night from the training camp at Pendleton and will start their first exhibition game on the Vaughn-street lot this afternoon with the Vancouver soldiers, starting at 3 o'clock.

The players were all tanned up the weather encountered in the Roundup camp having put the boys in great shape for their race during the coming season. Jack Kibble, third baseman, arrived yesterday morning from Montana, and was waiting for the balance of the squad when they arrived at the Seward Hotel last night.

Kibble played with the Portland Colts a few seasons ago. During the last couple of years he played third for Evansville in the Central League until that circuit hit the rocks.

The Buckaroo roster consists of Catchers Peterson and Cox; Pitchers Rapp, Shoup, Kirwin, McKinley, Clow and Mitchell; Infielders Fisher, Haney, Ritter and Kibble; and Outfielders Lee, Sullivan, Dempsey, Feuerborn and Teck.

Cox May Don Mask. With the arrival of Kibble to hold down the third sack, it is most likely that Fisher will start Dick Cox as catcher. He likes the "pep" Cox puts into his work, and says the Pasadena youth will make a corking good backstop.

The pitcher staff is what worries Fisher. Rapp, southpaw, and Shoup and Kirwin, right-handers, are the three experienced men on the Buckaroo hurling staff. Rapp and Shoup showed a lot of stuff in training camp, and Fisher is satisfied with their work.

Clow is "Iron Man." Clow, the La Pine youngster, is the iron man of the Buckaroo pitching staff. They raised this Buckaroo baby on the best that Central Oregon produces in the "cut" line until he is of such husky proportions that he does not know his own strength.

The Vancouver soldiers, who play the Buckaroos today, have a number of former professional stars on their roster. Frank Jacobs, who pitched for Muskogee in the Western Association, and Ewart, who twirled for Wheeling in the Central League, are the two hurlers who promise to make the Buckaroos step lively in the three games the soldiers have scheduled with the Portland warriors.

The soldiers will probably line up for today's game as follows: Jacobs, Ewart and Bodley, pitchers; Mullen and Holmes, catchers; Steadman and Dunn, first base; Holland, second base; Cohen, third base; Weigant, shortstop; Kelly, Altman, Jordan and Johns, outfielders.

Fisher will start Feuerborn behind the bat today and use Cox at third base until Jack Kibble's arm gets in shape. Fisher will give all of his players a chance to show off before the Portland fans in the exhibition games scheduled before the opening game of the championship season next Tuesday.

The Portland team will line up as follows: Kibble or Teck, right field; Haney, second base; Sullivan, center field; Lee, left field; Fisher, what happens; first base; Cox, third base; Feuerborn, catcher; Ritter, shortstop; Clow, Rapp, Shoup and McKinley, pitchers.
