

INDUCTIVE SHOWS SIGNS OF CONFLICT

**Captain Carpenter, Wounded
in Fight, Recounts Tale
of Daring Raid.**

CRUISER DRAWS HUN FIRE

**Attacking Ship Forced to Receive
Shells From Teuton 11-Inch Guns
Only 300 Yards Distant—British
Crews Lose Heavily.**

**ABOARD H. M. S. VINDICTIVE IN
DOVER HARBOR, April 25.**—A correspondent of the Associated Press visited the cruiser Vindictive today as the guest of Captain Alfred P. Carpenter, who commanded in the expedition last Tuesday against the German submarine base at Zebrugge, on the Belgian coast.

Captain Tells of Exploit.
Captain Carpenter received the correspondent with him in a saloon from a shell splinter wound. The ship showed innumerable signs of conflict. The commander, according to the plan at the end of the bridge in a small steel box, or cabin, which has been especially constructed to house a flame-thrower. Captain Carpenter, in his account of the part taken by the Vindictive in the raid, said to the Associated Press:

"Our chief purpose in the expedition was to distract the attention of the battery while the block ships ran in, especially the battery of 11-inch guns, which occupied a commanding position at the tip of the mole. Our ship was elaborately prepared for the business of landing soldiers on the mole, which is of some 40 feet high and 15 feet above the Vindictive's top deck at the state of the tide when the attack took place.

Vindictive Reaches Mole.
"We had a special superstructure over the upper deck and three long gangways, or 'brows,' which were designed to take the men up to the level of the mole as soon as we got alongside. Exactly according to the plan, we ran alongside the mole, approaching it on the port side, where we were equipped with especially built buffers of wood two feet wide.

"As there was nothing for us to tie to we merely dropped anchor there while the Daffodil kept up against the mole with her nose against the opposite side of our ship. In the fairly heavy sea two of our three gangways were smashed, but the third held and 500 men swarmed up this onto the mole. This gangway was two feet wide and 30 feet long.

"The men who went up it included 300 marines and 150 storming seamen from the Vindictive and 50 or so from the Daffodil. They swarmed up the steel gangway, carrying hand grenades and Lewis guns. The Germans succeeded in approaching the gangway, but a hard hand-to-hand fight took place about 200 yards up the mole toward the shore.

Enemy Fire Is Heavy.
"The Vindictive's bow was pointed toward the shore, so the bridge got the full effect of enemy fire from the shore batteries. One shell exploded against the pilot house, killing nearly all of its 10 occupants. Another burst in the fighting top, killing a lieutenant and eight men, who were doing excellent work with two pom-poms and four machine guns.

"The battery of 11-inch guns at the end of the mole was only 300 yards away and it kept trying to hit the shore batteries. The shore batteries were very accurate. One shell hit our hull, but only a few German shells hit our hull. Because it was well protected by the wall of the mole, but the upper structure, masts, stacks and ventilators showed above the wall and were riddled. A considerable proportion of our casualties were caused by splinters from these upper works.

"Meanwhile, the Daffodil continued to push us against the wall as if no battle was on. The Daffodil had a half a dozen of the members of the landing party would have been able to return to the ship.

Ships Block Canal.
"Twenty-five minutes after the Vindictive had reached the mole the first block ship passed in and headed for the canal. Two others followed in leisurely fashion, while we kept up the fight on the mole. One of the block ships, stranded outside of the canal, but the two others got two or three hundred yards inside, where they were successfully sunk across the entrance.

"One difficulty we had in preparing this expedition was that we could not have open ports, but the upper works were contemplated doing for fear the enemy might get information of the plan.

"All the men were tuned up to a high pitch, and it was very anxious hearts that we waited for every day to strike, knowing that every day we waited there was a greater change of our secret leaking out.

"Fifteen minutes after the Vindictive arrived alongside the mole our submarine exploded under the viaduct, meeting the mole with the mainland. The Germans had sent a considerable force to this viaduct as soon as the submarine arrived, and the men were gathered on the viaduct attacking our submarine with machine guns. When the explosion occurred the viaduct and Germans were blown up together. The crew of the submarine, consisting of six men, escaped on board a dingy to a motor launch.

"Early in the fighting a German shell knocked out our howitzer, which had been getting in some good shots on a big German seaplane station on the mole half a mile away. This is the largest seaplane station in Belgium. Unfortunately our other guns could not be brought to bear effectively upon it. The shell which disabled the

OFFICIAL WAR REPORTS

French.
PARIS, April 25.—The War Office tonight issued the following report:

"There was great activity on the part of both armies today in the region of Hangard and on both banks of the Avre, but no infantry action. The battle continued with violence around the village of Hangard, on which the Germans concentrated their efforts during the night. French troops resisted valiantly and counter-attacked several times with success. The village was lost, then retaken by the French and finally remained in the hands of the Germans at the cost of heavy losses. The French are holding the immediate outskirts of Hangard and the Germans have not been able to debouch from the town in spite of repeated efforts.

"In the Woivre, after a violent bombardment the Germans delivered an attack in the Requinville sector. Our troops ejected the enemy from some advanced elements where he had gained a footing and completely re-established the line.

"The French made several successful raids, especially west of Lassigny, south of Coucy le Chateau and in Lorraine. We took a certain number of prisoners.

"On the banks of the Avre the artillery fighting continued with violence. The artillery fighting was quite spirited on the left bank of the Meuse and in the Vosges.

"On April 22 and 23 seven German airplanes and a captive balloon were brought down by our pilots. Ten other machines, badly damaged, fell inside their own lines.

"It is confirmed that two enemy airplanes, reported as damaged April 20, were in reality brought down. Five other German machines and a captive balloon likewise were destroyed April 21, 22 and 24. Five thousand kilograms of projectiles were dropped by our heavy bombers on the railway stations at Nesle, Roye and Chaulnes. Our airplanes have carried out numerous machine-gun attacks on enemy concentrations.

"Eastern theater, April 25.—Late reports confirm the full success of the reconnoitering operation yesterday on the northern bank of the Devol River. In the course of their advance our troops established that the enemy had suffered very serious losses before abandoning the ground."

German.
BERLIN, via London, April 25.—The official statement issued by the War Office today reads:

"On the last battlefield a strong French counter attack against the height of Viueghelthek failed with heavy losses. There were local engagements in the area of the mole. The German fire was very hot all the time we lay alongside the mole. At times the German guns reached as high as 4000 feet. During the hottest part of the fighting I left my station in the flame house and went all around the ship and saw the changes were going. The spirit of the men was excellent. All they asked was 'Are we winning?'

Whistle Summons Men Back.
"Half an hour after the block ships went in we received the signal to withdraw. The Vindictive's siren was blown and the men returned from all parts of the mole and thronged down the gangway. We put off after having laid alongside just about an hour. The Germans made no effort to interfere with our get-away other than to continue their heavy firing."

"The heaviest casualties of the expedition appear to have been inflicted on the personnel of the Iris, many on board being killed by a shell which burst on the bridge. Of the casualties on this vessel more than a third were killed.

"Funeral services for the men who were killed were held here tomorrow. A memorial service for Captain H. O. Hallahan, who commanded the seamen's storming party was held today.

PORTLAND BOY MARTYR
HOWARD L. CUDAHY DIES IN EXPLOSION IN FRANCE.

**Fifth Trip Overseas Made on Ill-Fated
Ammunition Ship Florence H.
Destroyed April 17.**

Word was received yesterday by J. W. Cudahy of the Western Union Company, that his son, Howard L. Cudahy, had been killed as a result of the blowing up of the ship Florence H. at a French port April 17.

Howard Cudahy was 19 years of age. He was born in Grand Rapids, Mich., but was educated in the Portland schools. He attended the St. Stephen's grammar school and later went to the

Lincoln High School, in the Spring of 1915 he went to New York, where he attended the New York State Nautical School of New York City. He was graduated from there in October, 1917, and in addition to his diploma, he received a silver medal for efficiency in seamanship.

In November, 1917, he entered the service and his first trip overseas was on the Mongolia. Three more trips overseas were taken by him on various boats. On March 21, he sailed from a point near Philadelphia on the Florence H., which carried a cargo of ammunition.

"North of Villers-Bretonneux-St. Quentin road, the enemy three times attacked our positions and on each occasion was repulsed with loss. During this fighting, the enemy made use of a few tanks.

"Late yesterday evening, the enemy also attacked French positions northeast of Bailluel and was repulsed. Early this morning, the enemy renewed his attack in this sector and on British positions along the Bailluel-Wyschaete line.

"A raid attempted by the enemy during the night in the neighborhood of Bucquoy was repulsed. The enemy has been active during the night in the Festubert and Robecq sectors."

by the enemy, but this has not been confirmed.

That only slight gains have been made anywhere along the two fronts which have been subjected to attack is proof that the allies are prepared to defend their positions. In the past three weeks the Germans have hurried up heavy cannon to the Somme battlefield and have marched many fresh divisions to the point where they have been held for the moment of attack. Their failure to do more than gain a few insignificant bits of ground is one of the most encouraging features of the fighting that is now going on and which may be looked upon as the third phase of the great German offensive.

Sending operations are reported along the French lines east of Montdidier. It is officially announced at The Hague that the negotiations between Germany and Holland, "are not progressing satisfactorily." The Dutch Foreign Minister has declined to give the details of the situation between the two countries, which is admittedly quite delicate.

WORK OF PRESS PRAISED
DANIELS, BAKER AND HUGHES ADDRESS PUBLISHERS.

Editor Lauzanne, of Paris Matin, One of Speakers at Annual Banquet of Association.

NEW YORK, April 25.—Joseph Daniels, Secretary of the Navy; Newton D. Baker, Secretary of War; Charles E. Hughes, former Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States, and Stephane Lauzanne, editor of the Paris Matin, were the principal speakers at the annual banquet of the American Newspaper Publishers' Association.

Secretary Daniels gave unstinted praise to the newspapers generally for the work they have done and are doing to win the war.

M. Lauzanne, who spoke on behalf of M. Jusserand, the French Ambassador, said he brought a message of deep affection and friendship to Americans from the people of France.

Mr. Hughes said that freedom of speech and of the press was a relative of freedom and that the effective prosecution of the war "involves of necessity certain restrictions in our accustomed freedom." He added that there was a field for honest criticism which cannot be surrendered without impairing the essentials of liberty and the preservation of the Nation itself, and declared in this connection that "our officers of government are not a privileged class."

Secretary Baker declared that the ambition of the Hohenzollern family was the cause of the war.
