

## ORDER FOR STRIKE MAY BE RECALLED

Seattle Labor Leaders Act  
in Accordance With  
Mooney's Request.

### COUNCILS CALL MEETINGS

Indications Are That Threatened  
Walkout Called as Protest  
Against Conviction Will  
Not Take Place.

SEATTLE, Wash., April 29.—(Special.)—At the earnest request of Thomas J. Mooney, the San Francisco labor leader convicted of complicity in the Preparedness day murders in that city in 1916, all Seattle labor organizations which voted to walk out as a protest against Mooney's conviction and sentence, May 1 being named as the day, are holding or will hold special meetings for the purpose of rescinding the previous action, and indications are that there will be no walkout at industrial plants Wednesday.

Mooney's telegram came to the local labor leaders this afternoon, and at the hour this edition goes to press the Machinists' Union, which twice voted in favor of the "Mooney strike," and the Metal Trades Council are holding special meetings for the purpose of recalling the strike order.

A similar meeting has been called by the Central Labor Council for Tuesday night, at which similar action rescinding the endorsement of the one-day strike authorized by that organization among all the trades of Seattle is expected.

James A. Duncan, secretary of the Central Labor Council, last night confirmed the Mooney request, and expressed the belief that organized labor would adhere to it by rescinding all previous action calling the sympathetic one-day strike.

Copies of the Mooney telegram were at once submitted to various labor organizations, with the result that special meetings were immediately called to reconsider previous action by those unions which favored the May-day demonstration.

That the labor organizations will accede to the Mooney request seems assured, since the leaders of several of them, after having read the Mooney message, assured various employers, including the shipyard managers, that the pending strike would be called off at once.

**MOONEY APPEALS TO UNIONS**  
Condemned Man Tells Wilson He Is Trying to Stop Strikes.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 29.—Thomas J. Mooney today sent a telegram to President Wilson telling him that he has made every effort to stop the proposed general strikes planned in his behalf on May 1.

Mooney, who is under sentence of death for murder in connection with the Preparedness day parade bomb explosion here, notified the President that he had telegraphed various unions not to call the strike, and that he was the National work on which they are engaged.

At the same time Mooney made public the text of a letter he sent to the unions. In this message he asked them to do nothing which might make it appear that they were bringing pressure on the courts in which Mooney's case is pending.

Mooney's telegram to President Wilson follows:

"As you have taken an interest in justice being done in my case, I wish to assure you that no attempt will be made, with my consent, to interfere by calling strikes on May 1. I have telegraphed the labor organizations reported to have called protest strikes for May 1 asking them to call off their dogs and to continue with the National work on which they are engaged."

"I have read your letter to Governor Stephens and shall do nothing to allow anything to be done in my behalf which will weaken the force of your appeal."

The telegram to the labor organizations follows:

"Please call off any protest strike for May 1 that you may have been planning in my behalf. I am grateful for the interest your organization and other labor organizations have taken in my case, but I have nothing to do which would appear like an attempt to bring pressure upon the courts, where my case is still pending, or which would interfere with the important National activities now going on."

"I need only a fair trial in order to prove my innocence, and I am certain that the attitude of President Wilson, of labor and of the public in general will secure this for me."

**ALIMONY DODGERS CAUGHT**  
Men Who Neglect to Support Families Go Into Class 1.

CHICAGO, April 29.—Alimony dodgers will be drafted into the Army according to a decision today by the exemption appeal board of the city.

A man who has been given a deferred classification on grounds of supporting a family and who is found to have deserted that family and refused to pay alimony will be put in Class 1, it was decided.

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### APPLICATIONS TO CAMP DUE

Civilians Not to Be Accepted for Officers' Training School.

This is the last day on which civilians have opportunity to apply for admission to the officers' training camps to be opened at a score of Army posts over the United States May 15. Quite a number of Oregon men have written to the Army recruiting station for information and application blanks, but the officers have no way of knowing what proportion of these have actually filed applications.

Eligibility for civilians is closely restricted. Only college graduates who have had at least one year of military training since graduation or under direction of an Army officer while in school will be accepted. Enlistment must be for the period of the war, the applicant remaining in the service even though he might be dropped from the training camp or fail to win a commission.

**Timber Operator Arrested.**
