

S. B. HUSTON'S NAME OFF MAY BALLOTS

Clerk Beveridge's Lead May Be Followed by Other County Clerks.

LAW OF 1915 AUTHORITY

Removal of Name and Ballot Number of Senatorial Candidate Makes Contemplated Mandamus Suit Unnecessary.

On the official ballot of Multnomah County, at least, the name of S. B. Huston, as a candidate for the Republican nomination for United States Senator will not appear.

ately determined yesterday by County Clerk Beveridge, after a conference with county officials.

Although he has not been officially notified by Secretary of State Olcott of the withdrawal of Mr. Huston as a Senatorial candidate, except for a telegram received yesterday, Mr. Beveridge has a letter of withdrawal from Mr. Huston, and, in accordance with an act passed at the 1915 Legislature, he decided that Mr. Huston's requested withdrawal from the official ballot should be granted.

Law Permits Withdrawal.

Mr. Beveridge bases his action on the following: "Upon the proper filing of notice of candidacy, accompanied by the required fee, said candidacy shall be deemed complete, and, unless the candidate shall withdraw and state his or her reasons for withdrawal under oath and file the same with the proper official, Secretary of State, County Clerk or City Auditor or Clerk, as the case may be, such candidacy must remain upon the ballot."

Had not Mr. Beveridge arrived at the decision yesterday to remove Mr. Huston's name from the ballot, he and District Attorney Evans had agreed that a friendly mandamus proceeding be started in the Circuit Court this morning in order that an early judicial opinion might be received.

Secretary Olcott Silent.

In another part of the Oregon election law it is provided that the Secretary of State, not more than 25 days before a primary, and after not less than 25 days, must certify up with the seal of his office the name of every candidate on the election ticket, and must transmit these names to every County Clerk of the state.

"At least five County Clerks of Oregon have telephoned me regarding the Huston name on the ballot, and I have told them all that I was going to remove both his name and his election number," said Mr. Beveridge yesterday.

"The other County Clerks agreed with me that they would do likewise. If it becomes generally known about the state that this action is being taken, I believe that every County Clerk will follow our example."

That the withdrawal of Mr. Huston would cause some little confusion on election day was indicated yesterday when the County Clerk of Douglas County notified Mr. Beveridge that he had removed Mr. Huston's name from the ballot and had likewise changed all of the ballot numbers of the candidates.

In Multnomah County and in other counties which have decided to take Mr. Huston's name from the ballot, it has also been decided to remove his ballot number of "17."

No Time Limit Placed. The law clearly provides that a candidate may withdraw from the race and inasmuch as no time limit is placed on his withdrawal and because of the further fact that Mr. Huston has notified me of his resignation, I feel that the only thing I can do is to remove his name from the ballot."

The telegram received yesterday by Mr. Beveridge from Secretary of State Olcott was in answer to several urgent telephonic and telegraphic requests for some official confirmation that Mr. Huston had actually filed his withdrawal affidavit with the Secretary of State.

This telegram reads: "Huston filed affidavit requesting withdrawal of his name for United States Senate and stating the reasons, April 27."

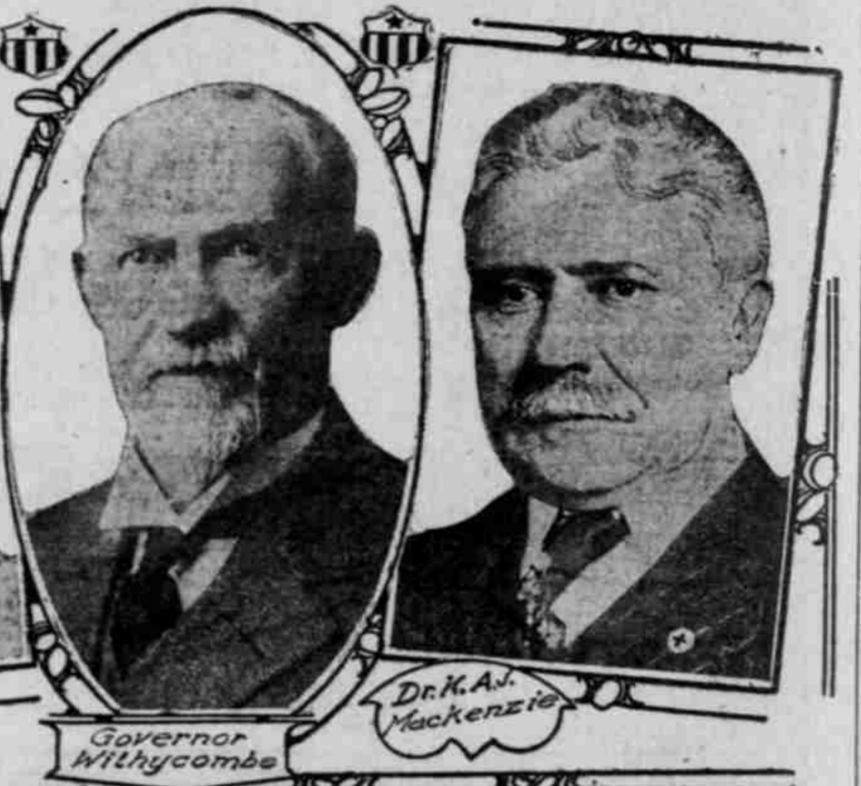
