MOVEMENT OF RECRUITS AT CAMP LEWIS STARTED.

Men Put Through Examination Simi lar to That Given by Local Boards to Test Hearts.

CAMP LEWIS, Tacoma, May 1.-Movement of recruits in the April draft through the mustering office has begun. When the men come from the examination, they know whether or not they are to be members of the National Army and either are paid off and dis-charged or sent back to their straining battalions. Out of more than 400 ex-amined yesterday only three were dis-charged as physically unfit.

The men are put through an examination similar to that given by their local boards to test their hearts and lungs, disclose physical defects and weakness of the eye and car. The reports of the board of medical experts is compared with the report of this examination is determined the recording amination in determining the recruit's

Men destined to be soldiers are passed into the second building, where the personal record of each man is taken, his papers made out and an occupational census taken for the guidance of officers who assign men from the depet brigade to other Army units. As far as possible, the assignment is made to give the Government the best use of the soldiers' experience in civil life. To avoid mistakes in making out pa-pers, they are checked over and num-bered before the men leave the building. Not more than one mistake in a thousand has been found since the thecking system was adopted.
