

BLOOD FLOWS IN SLOVENIAN REVOLT

Disaffected Austrian Subjects Reported to Have Clashed With Germans.

SPIRIT OF MUTINY SPREADS

How Roumania Was Brutally Crushed by Central Powers Through Czerin Told by Red Cross Mission.

LONDON, May 6.—Unrest in the Slovenian districts of Austria is growing daily and mutiny is spreading with great rapidity. Reuter's Limited announced today it had learned from a Serbian source.

A recent conflict between Germans and Slovenians ended in bloodshed.

Count Czerin's visit was known only to the German Foreign Minister, paid a secret visit to Jassy in the latter part of February and delivered in person a verbal ultimatum of the most drastic sort from the central powers to King Ferdinand, of Roumania. It has become known with the arrival here of the American Red Cross mission to Roumania.

Count Czerin's visit was known only in the highest official circles, and the fact that it was made in person for the first time through a correspondent of the Associated Press who accompanied the mission.

The reason for the visit was that the Germans and Austrians had determined to bring to a speedy conclusion the negotiations with Roumania and had decided that a threat delivered in person by the head of the Austro-Hungarian foreign office would be more effective than means of documents.

Czerin's Conduct Ruthless.

So Count Czerin was sent on the errand. He arrived in Jassy about February 25 and went straight to the King. His manner was stern, unbending, ruthless. He told the King bluntly that Roumania must conclude peace on Germany's terms and demands. There must be no further delays, and unless Roumania consented to this programme the central powers would have no choice but to depose the Roumanian royal house and dividing the entire country between Austria and Bulgaria.

The Roumanian King saw no way out, and a week later the formal peace negotiations began.

AMSTERDAM, May 6.—A sensation was caused in the Reichstag last week by Gustav Noske, an anti-government Socialist, when he read a circular denouncing the democratic parties in the Reichstag, which has been circulated in the army. The circular says:

"There is nothing more intolerable than the democracy of the democratic parties of the Reichstag who wish to enforce peace in renunciation by provoking strikes and secret demonstrations."

Democracy in Bad Repute.

"In democratic countries money plays the chief role. Today anyone who does not do his utmost to nip the democratic movement in the bud is working for the enemy. He is not working for true freedom and equality, but in the interests of a gang of international rascals."

"July 19, 1917, the date of the Reichstag's notorious peace resolution, will live for all time as a paragon of German small-mindedness."

The semi-official Cologne Gazette, says the pamphlet, has been circulated only among the forces of the army.

The government-controlled Lokai Anzeiger on April 28 printed a photograph showing Austro-Hungarian troops manning a machine gun on the front of a locomotive drawn by a trainload of soldiers engaged in forcing Ukrainians to surrender their stores of food.

to execute the promises made to the German nation when the offensive was started, must come soon.

The great activity of the enemy along the Ypres sector is possibly a prelude to the opening of a new German rush there, or is intended to distract attention from a formidable attack elsewhere.

Below to Make Move.

There is indeed a widespread view that the next move must come from the German armies concentrated under General von Below near Arras. Some of its divisions were borrowed by other German armies for attacks to the north and the south, but these have since been replaced by others, and the force gathered there is very powerful.

From the Arras sector, in the unlikely event of German success, it could turn either toward the coast or toward Amiens, but it appears most likely that the more natural operation would be chosen in an attempt to separate the main French and British forces.

The continued bombardment of Amiens is possibly merely a blind to cover the preparation of this scheme.

Since the breakdown, however, of the first German rush by the heroic stand of the French and British troops, the allies have had time to strengthen their positions in order to meet any fresh onslaughts.

Tenton Positions Unstable.

The unity of command which fused all the allied armies into one and the terrible losses suffered by the enemy without the achievement of any success which counts seem to have caused the Germans to hesitate, but it is impossible for them to content themselves with the present positions, which are

of the most unfavorable character for defensive tactics. Another factor in compelling them to seek a rapid decision is the transparent fear of the ever-increasing strength of the American forces, displayed in the present deluge of German propaganda decrying the American effort. These forces, they foresee, may become a powerful instrument in bringing about their defeat before long, and they are certain to seek success before the trans-Atlantic Army becomes formidable.

CANADIAN ARMY HEADQUARTERS IN FRANCE, May 6.—(By Canadian Press, Limited.)—The Canadian army has taken over trenches in the vicinity of Neuville-Vitasse, Mermet and Boisseux-St. Mare, in addition to its front from Hill 70 to Gavrelle. In their new quarters, as well as north of the Scarpe, they have been keeping the enemy constantly on the alert. Prominent in the operations in this area was the raid last Friday morning, when the Saskatchewan troops, under the cover of artillery and machine gun barrages, penetrated the enemy outpost line on a 600-yard front to a depth of 400 yards.

Machine Guns Captured. The raid, which was carried out on the Arras road, north of the Colnet River, was conducted at only light cost, but both sides of the road were marked with enemy dead. His casualties could not be less than 100 and we captured seven prisoners and four machine guns. On the extreme right of the Canadian attack the enemy offered very little resistance, but heavy fighting took place on the left.

Again on the morning of April 29 a very successful raid was carried out by Ontario troops against enemy positions in the vicinity of Neuville-Vitasse. They captured 10 prisoners and four machine guns. The Canadians remained in the enemy line 25 minutes, inflicting numerous casualties on the foe, who, in places, offered stubborn resistance. Despite the hand-to-hand fighting, the Canadians returned to their lines with only nine killed or missing.

Men Take to Heels.

Another feature of the minor activity of the Canadian forces in this sector was the assistance rendered English troops, who had been attacked by hostile raiders. An Ontario company of officers, acting on his initiative, organized a counter attack and cleared half the trench, while English forces, operating from the south, completed the clearance. Thrown back upon his own positions in disorder, the enemy later attempted an attack in some force. It failed completely, being broken up by artillery, rifle and machine gun fire.

LONDON, May 6, via Ottawa.—Correspondents in France state that the British gunfire in Flanders during the past three days has completely prevented any enemy movement on the British front. The French have been attacking which was undoubtedly being prepared on their front by attacking first.

Experts emphasize the difficulty of the enemy finding the target, which is to take the allies by surprise. Certain points of importance are carefully watched and if other points are attacked the allied reserves reach the battlefield as quickly as the German reserves.

Allies May Retake Kemmel.

The experts are confident that Mount Kemmel can be recovered if the enemy fails to advance his line in this region.

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY IN FRANCE, May 6.—(By the Associated Press.)—German aviators are resorting to unorthodox tricks in an endeavor to outwit American fliers. The trickiness of the German soldiers' foot is simulated by enemy airmen who are marking their machines to make them look as much like allied markings as possible.

The Germans have taken to rounding off the corners of the crosses on the wings of their planes to make them look like allied badges. The game of the German airmen is to play around in a shot if he can and then run. American fliers, for fear of attacking a probable friend, must get up close to an enemy machine, usually with considerable maneuvering, before opening a fight.

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY IN FRANCE, May 6.—(By the Associated Press.)—Low visibility prevailed over Lunerville and Toul sectors, as well as south of Verdun, today, restricting operations by both sides. There was virtually no activity during the daylight hours, but during the night the enemy heavily bombarded the lines in the direction of Selcheprey and those northwest of Toul, while south of Verdun the Germans displayed great nervousness, throwing up many flares.

Germans Come From Flanders.

It has been established that the troops in that section came recently from Flanders. Along the lines near Lunerville the American patrols have been active and have penetrated the enemy lines once more. They found that the enemy had not reoccupied raided portions of their positions and that the town of Anservillers, with the exception of one stone house, had been completely demolished by the American artillery fire.

Many German dugouts under the buildings have been made useless. Prisoners captured from an observation post divulged much useful information and said they had just come to this front from Russia.

LONDON, May 6.—The British have withdrawn their troops from Es-Salt, east of the Jordan, in Palestine, the war office announced. Nearly 1000 Germans and Turks and 29 machine guns have been captured in the last few days.

PARIS, May 6.—After an intense bombardment the Germans last night attempted to carry out a local attack near Anchin Farm, southeast of Amiens. Today's official statement says the enemy was repulsed completely.

Berlin, Sunday, May 5, via London.

May 6.—Repulse of Anglo-French attacks on the Flanders battlefield reported in the official announcement by the war office today. More than 300 prisoners are reported captured in the fighting. Increased artillery activity south of the Somme is announced in the statement.

He will await orders here.

VICE-CONSUL OF JAPAN ARRESTED

Slavs Take Two Officials as Military Spies—Seizures Made at Irkutsk.

TEUTONS INCITE BOLSHEVIK

Official Washington Believes Germans Taking Advantage of Situation at Vladivostok to Stir Trouble.

LONDON, May 6.—A Reuter dispatch from Tokio says that the Russian authorities at Irkutsk have arrested the Japanese Vice-Consul and another prominent official on the charge of being military spies.

WASHINGTON, May 6.—The demand made on the entire representative and Ambassador Francis at Vladivostok reached the State Department today from Ambassador Francis. A determination to force recognition of the Bolshevik government, officials believe, is the principal underlying purpose of the move.

Teuton Activities Plain.

It is believed also the soviet governments are aiming at the withdrawal of the Japanese and British marines who were landed at the Siberian seaport and at the taking over of the large store of military supplies at Vladivostok. Officials realize that German influence is at work to use the Vladivostok incident as a means of causing trouble between the allies and the Bolshevik government, and expect there have been indications of growing friendliness for the entente, and especially for America.

MOSCOW, Sunday, April 28.—(By the Associated Press.)

Official denial has been made by Japanese Consul Uryeda to the Russian Foreign Office that the Japanese are placing machine guns in Vladivostok and are arranging to increase their forces there.

Allied Envoy's Visit.

Bolshevik demands that the American and French Consuls at Vladivostok be recalled have brought no official statement from Ambassador Francis and French Ambassador de la Motte.

The definite demands made by Foreign Minister Tchitcherine were coincident with the arrival of Count von Mirbach, the German Ambassador, in Moscow.

Regardless of the strong pressure put on the entente embassies in the last few weeks to recognize the soviet government, which is making full use of the Siberian incident, the position of the embassies remains unchanged.

Recognition Issue Raised.

Ambassador Francis has sent a communication to the Bolshevik government regarding the alleged participation of Americans in the revolution in a Siberian counter-revolution plot in connection with the question of the recognition of their government.

The American Embassy, the note says, carefully scrutinized the documents submitted by the Russian government, in the American view, the documents failed to show any connection of American officials in these plots.

The American Embassy, the Ambassador continues, interprets the documents to show only that persons planning a counter-revolution were asking the assistance of Consul Caldwell, Admiral Knight and the representatives of the allies in Pekin, including the American Minister, but failed to show either the consummation of the hopes of the revolutionaries in this direction or that the Americans participated or promised aid.

OIL RELIEF BILL APPROVED

Coast Interests Confer With Secretary of Navy and Requa.

WASHINGTON, May 6.—Representatives of the oil interests on the Pacific Coast in conference today with Secretary Daniels and Mark L. Requa, oil controller for the Fuel Administration, approved the bill now before Congress under which the Navy Department, by Presidential proclamation, will take over and operate all oil and gas wells in the naval oil reserves in California. This action is expected to pave the way for relief from the threatened oil famine in the Pacific Coast district.

Pendleton Overseas Subscribes \$83,550.

PENDLETON, Or., May 6.—(Special.)—Pendleton has over-subscribed the third liberty loan quota by \$83,550, according to the bank statements today. The total subscriptions in this city aggregated \$832,550. The quota was \$750,000. The city went over the top after two days of soliciting and, after that time, no further effort was made to increase the amount because of very heavy drain on the banks caused by the income tax payments and the needs of the coming harvest season.
