SOLDIERS' TRAINING SCHOOL WILL BE OPENED JUNE 15.

Government Will Have 300 Men Take Instruction for Two Months Under Contract Just Signed.

After approval by Captain Eugene Renoist and Frank H. Shepherd, dis trict educational director of the War Department committee on education and special training, the contract for

the use of the Benson Polytechnic School was signed yesterday and sent to Washington, D. C., for final action of the War Department. On June 15, the day after school closes, the Benson High School will be transformed into a soldiers' training school. Three hundred men will report at the school on that day and will be emilisted there, given uniforms and arms, and started on a two months'
