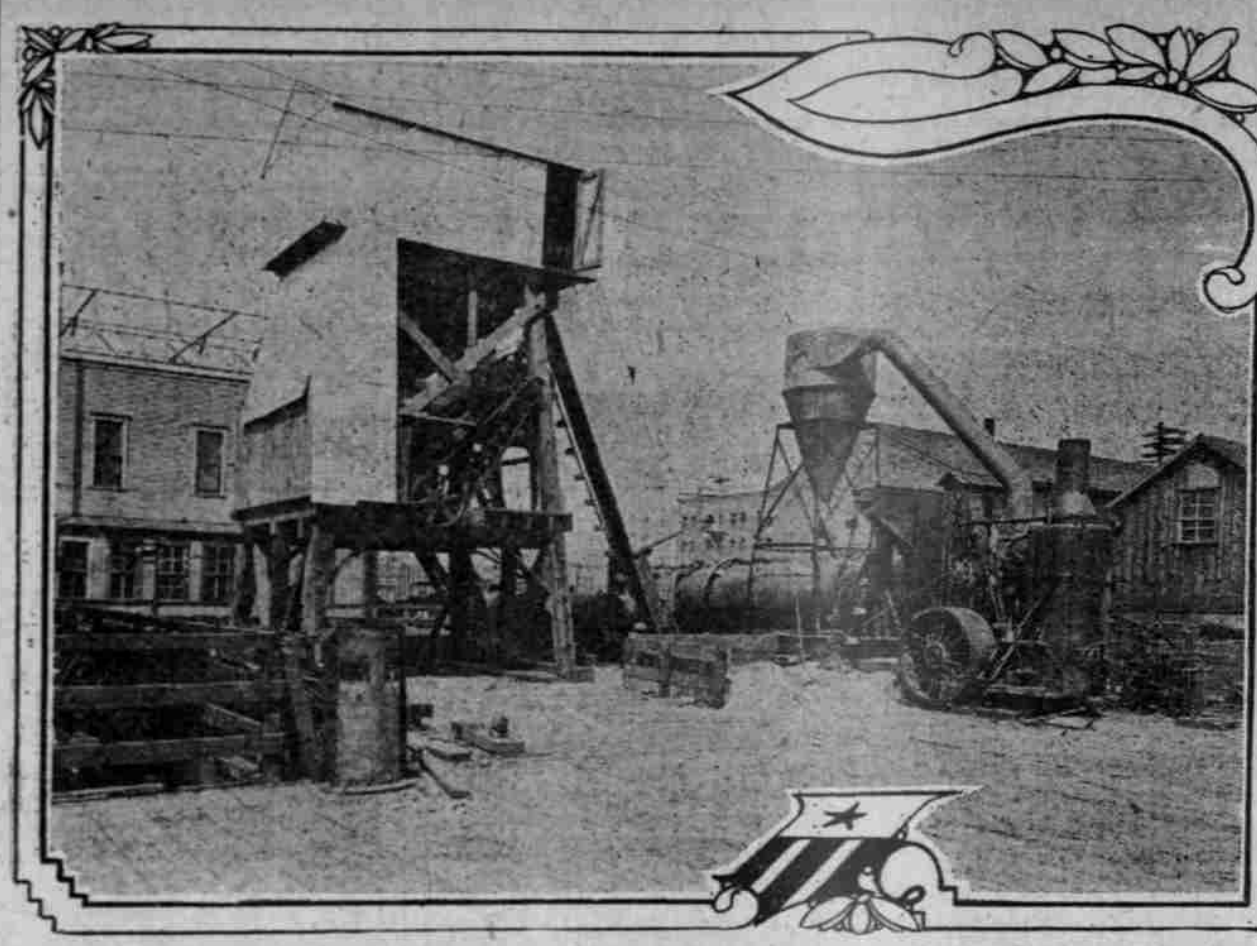


VIEW OF CITY'S NEW MUNICIPAL PAVING PLANT, WHICH HAS JUST BEEN COMPLETED.

Reed College Reconstruction Course Proves Popular. Applications from states throughout the territory west of the Mississippi for the Reed College summer course and second training course for reconstruction aides have been flooding the college office since the announcements were made a comparatively short time ago.

The eagerness of well qualified women in western states to enter the Summer school and reconstruction work has made it necessary to limit the number admitted to the latter course. For the second course in training aides to rehabilitate disabled soldiers, beginning June 24, 64 women have already been admitted. Out of this list of candidates, Oregon and Washington have the largest number.
