

U. S. MAIL MAKES FIRST AIR JOURNEY

New York-Washington Service Starts—735 Post Parcels Delivered.

ONE AVIATOR HAS MISHAP

Machine Forced to Land, but Success of Project Seems Established by Results of Initial Trip.

WASHINGTON, May 15.—Aerial mail service in the United States today became an accomplished fact. Piloted by Army aviators, airplanes carried consignments of mail from New York and Philadelphia to Washington and from Philadelphia to New York. A plane that started from the National capital for Philadelphia in the presence of President Wilson and other high Government officials was forced to land at Waldorf, Maryland, 30 miles away, because of a broken propeller.

Daily Service Planned. With the exception of Sunday, daily trips from each end of the New York-Washington air mail route are planned by the Postoffice Department.

Each machine will fly only half the lap of the journey, the mail being transferred to different planes at Philadelphia.

The mail on the machine which was forced down today will be sent out from Washington on the plane making tomorrow's regular trip.

Three hours and twenty minutes after a machine piloted by Lieutenant Ford H. Webb left the Belmont flying field near New York today, the mail it carried was landed in Washington.

Boy Scouts Deliver Mail. Within 35 minutes Boy Scouts had completed delivery of the 735 parcels consigned to Washington, including 19 pieces for the White House, one for Vice-President Marshall and a number for Postmaster-General Burleson.

One of the letters was from Governor Whitman, of New York, addressed to President Wilson and pleading New York to do its part in the American Red Cross drive for a \$100,000,000 war fund which begins next Monday.

Besides the President and Mrs. Wilson, Postmaster-General Burleson, Secretary Daniels, Assistant Secretary of the Navy Roosevelt, Assistant Postmaster-General Fraeger and Dockery, and Postmaster-General Kamara, of Japan, witnessed the departure of the mail from Washington.

Wilson Autographs Stamp. The President cancelled and autographed the aerial mail stamp on a letter from Postmaster-General Burleson to Postmaster Patten, of New York, and the stamp will be auctioned off in New York for the benefit of the Red Cross.

Lieutenant George Boyle, formerly a Washington newspaper man, piloted the machine which carried 350 pounds of mail in a special compartment in the fuselage.

The plane got away amid the applause of a big crowd which surrounded the field, gracefully circled around Potomac Park and then headed for Philadelphia.

Disabled Plane Lands. The mishap occurred a short time afterwards, but Lieutenant Boyle brought the plane down successfully. The mail airplanes are Curtiss military training machines and Army aviators piloting them are assigned to the work for experience in cross-country flying.

Postoffice officials said today that as the flyers become familiar with the air route the service will be speeded up and they expect the trip to be made in less than three hours.

POWER BILL CONSIDERED

SECRETARIES BAKER AND HOUSTON GIVE THEIR VIEWS.

Extensive Developments for Energy and Irrigation Purposes in Western States Urged.

WASHINGTON, May 15.—Water-power legislation as a construction step was urged today by Secretaries Baker and Houston before the House waterways committee, which is considering the Administration bill proposing extensive developments for power and irrigation purposes.

Secretary Houston proposed making more specific references to compensation to private corporations when water power plants are taken over by the Government.

A feature urged by Mr. Baker concerns the fixing of a definite period for homing corporations and for having a definite provision as to the taking over by the Government of enterprises at the end of the period of license. A period of 50 years has been tentatively suggested.

Secretary Houston, replying to Representative Baker, of California, said he could see no reason for exempting from the bill the Grand Canyon of the Colorado, and held that the canyon's power possibilities should be developed. It has been suggested that the Grand Canyon be eliminated from the bill until the Government determined whether its development by public enterprise should proceed.

Committee Amends Measure. The expenditures committee, by a vote of 3 to 2, amended the resolution by striking out reference to the conduct of the war and adding a proviso specifically limiting the scope of the committee's activities.

If the Senate refused to adopt the resolution as amended, Senator Chamberlain indicated, he would drop the investigations planned.

Administration leaders were of the opinion tonight, however, that the amendment would be acceptable at the White House and that the resolution

would be passed. If so, the military committee will proceed independently of the Department of Justice's inquiry.

Borglum Charges Basis of Move. Preparations for the department's investigation order recently by the President as a result of sensational charges based largely upon statements by Gutzon Borglum, the sculptor, already are proceeding under the direction of Assistant Attorney-General William L. Frierson.

Frierson now is examining documents furnished by the War Department showing how contracts for airplanes, engines and parts were let, and giving other information on the airplane manufacturing programme. He also has the report to the President of the investigating committee headed by H. Snowden Marshall and that of Mr. Borglum.

General Inquiry Opposed. At a conference of Democratic Senators during the day it was agreed and that the Administration forces would oppose adoption of a resolution in the form which might be considered to authorize an inquiry into general conduct of the war and also to oppose authorization of experts and assistants for the committee.

The choice of Mr. Hughes to act with the Attorney-General was met with expressions of satisfaction on all sides at the Capitol. Some Republican Senators voiced surprise but there was not a suggestion of disapproval.

OREGONIANS AT HELM

MANY MEN OF THIS STATE HOLD OFFICES IN HAWAII.

Chief Justice, Treasurer of Territory, Secretary to Governor and Others Are Included in List.

HONOLULU, T. H., May 6.—(Special.)—The state of Oregon bids fair to take over the burden of power in the territory of Hawaii. With James L. Coke, of Coos Bay, Chief Justice of Hawaii; Delbert E. Metzger, of Baker, Treasurer of the territory; Allen Burdick, of Oregon Agricultural College, assistant superintendent of the public works department; and John F. Stone, of Athens, secretary to the new Governor of Hawaii, it looks as if Oregonianness are the rulers of the Hawaiian Islands. The newly appointed Governor, Charles J. McCarthy, today announced the new officials.

His private secretary, John F. Stone, was born in Athens 28 years ago. He was principal of the John Day School for one year and came to Honolulu five years ago. By his appointment the old tradition of newspapermen being favored as secretaries to Governors of this territory is maintained. Mr. Burdick is a graduate of Oregon Agricultural College, while Mr. Metzger is well known as a mining man in Baker, Or.

SHIP PLANT IS DAMAGED

FIRE LOSS AT VANCOUVER, B. C., PLACED AT \$1,500,000.

One Fireman Killed; Steamer War Charlot, About Two-Thirds Completed, Virtually Destroyed.

VANCOUVER, B. C., May 15.—Fire broke out in the boiler room of the J. Coughlan & Sons shipyard here at 2:30 o'clock this morning and did damage estimated at \$1,500,000. One fireman was killed and several injured.

The blaze was completely extinguished at about 6 o'clock.

The steel steamer War Charlot, about two-thirds completed, was engulfed in flames. The ways, which are built on piles, fell through, and the hull, twisted by the heat, is now half submerged in the water beneath. The hull of the War Charlot, on adjoining ways, still stands, but the plates are badly buckled by the heat. The steamers War Camp and Alaska, already launched and being equipped, were towed into the stream and anchored safely.

The fitting-out wharf, the boiler-shop, draughtmen's quarters and various other departments are completely destroyed. The buildings saved include the blacksmith shop, the plate shop, the moulding loft and the rolls. Two ways, on which only portions of keels had been laid, were saved.

Father Kills Daughter and Self. LOS ANGELES, Cal., May 15.—Annie McCollum, 16 years old, was shot through the head and killed instantly today as she lay in bed in her home in Glendale and her father, J. A. McCollum, was found dead with a revolver beside him after two shots attracted a nurse caring for Mrs. McCollum. Despondency over his wife's long illness was said by the police to have shown itself strongly recently in McCollum's behavior.

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ARRESTS FOLLOW BIG DEPORTATION

Many Prominent Arizonans Are in Custody on Federal Charge of Conspiracy.

DRAFT EVASION INVOLVED

Sweeping Indictments of Mining and Business Result From Expulsion of 1200 Alleged I. W. W. Last July.

TUCSON, Ariz., May 15.—Twenty-one of the leading mine company officials, employees and business men of the Warren district were arrested at Bisbee this morning on indictments returned by the Federal grand jury which last week completed an investigation of the deportation last July of nearly 1200 alleged members of the Industrial Workers of the World.

The warrants charge "conspiracy to deprive a citizen of the United States of his rights in violation of section 19, penal code."

In the absence of United States Commissioner J. D. Taylor, who now is in Chicago, the arrested men appeared before Justice of the Peace M. C. High, acting commissioner, who fixed their bonds and set their arraignment for May 28 in Tucson.

Grant H. Dowell, general manager of the Copper Queen Consolidated Mining Company at Bisbee, was the first man arrested. The warrant was served by United States Marshal Dillon. Bonds were fixed at \$5000 each by the United States Commissioner.

Draft Obstruction Involved. Judge Sawtelle in his charge to the jury last week instructed that not only should the charge of conspiracy to deprive citizens of their rights be considered, but that the question of the obstruction of the draft in deporting a large number of registered men also should be taken up.

More Indictments Returned. The Federal grand jury investigation of the deportations began in Tucson May 6. George B. Wilcox, one of those indicted as a member of the grand jury panel, but was excused when it was represented to Judge Sawtelle that he might become an important witness or a defendant.

It is reported a number of other indictments have been returned in addition to those revealed in arrests today.

Sheriff Harry Wheeler, who was in charge of the deportations, is now a Captain in the American expeditionary forces in France.

James E. Douglas, one of the leading officials of the Phelps-Dodge Corporation interests and chief owner of the Verde Extension Mine, is also in France in Red Cross work and has with him as assistant W. H. Brophy, manager of the Phelps-Dodge Mercantile interests.

Wilcox Former Rough Rider. George B. Wilcox, one of those arrested today, has been ordered to appear for examination for a Major's commission in the Army. He served as a Lieutenant in the Rough Riders in the Spanish-American war.

Snodgrass, who was arrested, is daily expecting orders to join the Red Cross in France, having tendered his services and offered to pay his expenses.

Bisbee, Ariz., May 15. The deportation of the 1186 men in connection with which the Federal grand jury returned indictments took place from here July 12, 1917, when armed citizens led by Sheriff Harry Wheeler rounded up the

men and loaded them on a special train of 24 cattle and boxcars.

The train, guarded by armed members of the citizen posse, then was started for the state line. The Government went to the aid of the expelled crowd and provided a camp for them near Columbus, N. M.

The deportation followed a strike which had been called in the mines about Bisbee and other parts of Arizona two weeks before. Two men were killed during the deportations.

News Censorship Attempted. While the deportation was in progress a mining company official put a news censorship in effect. The operator in charge of the Western Union Telegraph office said he mistook the official for an Army officer, as the officer wore similar garb.

However, the censorship was blocked here and at Douglas by the Associated Press, which relayed the first news of the deportation from Douglas by telephone to an outside telegraph office.

Carranza Advises Governor. BROWNSVILLE, Tex., May 15.—Andres Osuna, director-general of education in President Carranza's cabinet, has been recommended and confirmed by the Mexican Senate for Governor of Tamaulipas. It became known here today. The office was recently declared vacant because of a rebellion against General Luis Caballero, then Governor. Governor Osuna is a native of Tamaulipas.
