H. H. URDAHL TO LECTURE.—Halv H. Urdahl, author, student and Portland business man, will enter the lecture field on Sunday, May 19, when he will speak at the Sunnyside Methodist Episcopal Church, East Thirty-fifth and Yamhill streets, his theme being "The Key of Knowledge." The lecture, announces Mr. Urdahl, will consider Christian principles and issues of the great war from the viewpoint of scientific philosophy—a simple explanation of the forces of nature and the process of thought. "What would happen in America if Germany should win? Is one of the questions that Mr. Urdahl will face.

Kuykendall, of Eugene, who won his commission as Second Lieutenant at the first officers' training camp at the Presidio, has been promoted to First Lieutenant of Artillery, at Camp Lewis. BURNED AREA REPORTED.—Julius Kummel, of the district forester's office, has just returned from a trip to the Still Creek district of the Oregon National Forest, where he has been engaged in superintending the planting of several thousand acres which were burned over by forest fires several years ago. The forest department is planting 385 acres of the burned-over area with Douglas fir and white pine trees. A crew of 18 men has been at work there for nearly five weeks and has the job about completed. One man can plant 1000 trees a day, or a little better than one acre's planting.

HEARING IS CALLED

Closing of Columbia Slough to Be Discussed.

8000 ACRES RECLAIMABLE

All Facts Pertaining to Projected Improvement to Be Aired at Public Meeting Announced by Council May 20.

A public hearing for the general discussion of the plan to close the Columbia slough for the purpose of reclaiming 8000 acres in Multnomah drainage district No. 1 will be held by the City Council Monday morning, May 20, at 10 o'clock.

Recently the city forwarded protests to the War Department against the drying of the slough on the ground that such action might prevent the deepening of the channel for commercial purposes in the future. The city

also plans to use the slough as an outlet for the sewage of the Peninsula district, which would be impossible with the waterway permanently blocked.

Since action was taken by the Council city officials and officials of the drainage district have conferred with Colonel George A. Zinn, Corps of Engineers, U. S. A., representing the War Department in Portland, and have reached an agreement whereby the plan for reclaiming the land in the district may be carried to success and at the same time protect the city's rights.

The drainage district officials have agreed to condemn all slough channels within the limits of the district below the five-foot elevation and above low water and plat these on their official plan of reclamation, provided the City Council withdraw its objections to the project now on file with the War Department.

The drainage district officials also agree that when the city is ready to proceed with the excavation of Columbia slough channels to convey its right of way to the city for use in containing the widening and deepening of the slough for commercial purposes and as an outlet for sewer drainage.

The hearing Monday was in order that all interested parties might have an opportunity to present their views before the Council took final action on the ratification of the tentative agreement arranged by Deputy City Attorney Tomlinson and City Engineer Laurgaard.

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WAR BREAD IS HEALTHY

RUMORS THAT MATERIALS CAUSE SKIN RASH DENIED.

City Bacteriologist Says Coarse Breads Will Prove Great Blessing to People of United States.

Rumors that the material used in making coarse breads cause constitutional disturbances and result in a breaking out of rash on the bodies of persons who are located or organized under the military department of the state as a militia company, they will not be recognized by the Adjutant-General as a part of the state defense.

Adjutant-General Williams issued orders to this effect to the Sheriffs of the state Tuesday. Nearly one-fourth of the 4000 men in Oregon now in home guard organizations have no military standing as far as the state authorities are concerned, and if they are to have any legal status they must ally themselves either with the Sheriffs or with the militia.

U. S. Loans \$2,000,000 to Serbia.—WASHINGTON, May 15.—Serbia received another credit of \$2,000,000 from the Treasury today, making her total indebtedness to the United States \$9,000,000 and the total of all the allies \$2,284,350,000.
