JACOB KAHN DIES AT 82 PORTLAND MAN RESIDENT OF OREGON FOR 53 YEARS. Funeral Today From Home of Nephews, Felix and Charles Kahn, Dr. Wise Officiating.

Jacob Kahn, one of the founders of the hides and wool firm of Kahn Bros., and widely known in Oregon, died Wednesday at the home of his nephews, Felix and Charles Kahn, 131 Sixteenth street, at the age of 82.

Mr. Kahn came to Oregon in 1865, having been preceded by his late brother, Edward and Moses Kahn, who came in the historic pioneer party of 1851 and 1852. Mr. Kahn had lived in Wisconsin, after arriving in this country at the age of 15, until he started West.

Prior to the building of railroads in Oregon Mr. Kahn made many stage trips to the Coos Bay region, and he is remembered by many of the old-timers along the Coast. He dealt largely in the Coos Bay region, and in that section is especially well known as “Uncle Jake.”

Mr. Kahn was a bachelor, a member of Temple Beth Israel, and of the Wisconsin Society, in which he was active. Besides his nephews, Charles, Milton and Felix Kahn, he is survived by Mrs. D. Sells Cohen, Mrs. Gertie Baer and Mrs. S. M. Blumauer, nieces, all of Portland, and relatives in Seattle, Wash., and Milwaukee, Wis.

The funeral will be held this afternoon at 2 o'clock from the home, Dr. Joseph B. Wise officiating.
