

BOLSHEVIKI DRIVE TURKS FROM BAKU

Caspian Sea Port Falls and
Russians Continue Attack
on Turks.

ODESSA HAS MARTIAL LAW

Street Fighting in Progress in Slav
City—Thousands of Persons
Reported in Flight
From Kiev.

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 17.—(via. Amsterdam.)—Russian Bolshevik troops, reinforced from Turkestan and Astrakhan, have recaptured the port of Baku on the Caspian Sea.

The Bolshevik forces crossed the Caspian Sea on Russian gunboats and attacked the Musselmans, who, owing to lack of means of defense, were forced to abandon the town. The Bolshevik troops are vigorously continuing their attacks.

LONDON, May 16.—Martial law has been proclaimed at Odessa by the Austrians, according to the request of the Germans, according to the request of the Austrians.

At Kiev, Austrian patrols are in the streets day and night and thousands of persons are fleeing from the city.

Berlin expects to receive 150,000 sheep and 50,000 pigs shortly from Roumania and 100,000 tons of cereals in July or August.

AMSTERDAM, May 17.—Under the peace treaty with Roumania, says the Reichspost of Vienna, Germany has assured herself of possession of the telegraph lines, cables and wireless installations on the Roumanian coast. The purpose is said to be to carry on an intelligence service on a large scale after the war, particularly by use of wireless.

HARBIN, Manchuria, May 14.—(By the Associated Press.)—The advance into Siberia of General Semenov, the anti-Bolshevik commander, has given the movement which he heads a new impetus, and he has received substantial reinforcements of Cossacks and Buriats. The whole of the starving Trans-Baikal population is reported welcoming him as a deliverer.

The Chinese Eastern Railway has agreed to take over the political administration and the operation of the Trans-Siberian Railway in General Semenov's wake and General Zurbatoff, former chief of the Baikal Railway at Irkutsk, is in charge of the construction and repair work.

Army Mobilizes at Nikolai. Vice-Admiral Kolchak, former commander of the Russian Black Sea fleet, who was recently elected a director of the Chinese Eastern Railway, and Colonel Orloff are collecting forces at Nikolai, near Vladivostok, to proceed northward to Tsaritsyn, in an effort to free the eastern section of the railway from the Bolsheviks.

PEKING, May 13.—(By the Associated Press.)—It is stated on apparently good authority that the management of the Chinese Eastern Railway has mortgaged the section of the railroad between Chang Chun and Harbin within Manchuria to Japanese bankers. The amount of the mortgage is not yet ascertained. The length of road between Chang Chun and Harbin is about 150 miles.

LONDON, May 17.—General Mannerheim, commander of the Finnish White Guard, entered Helsinki on Thursday at the head of 12,000 men, an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Copenhagen reports. Until that time the capital had been occupied by German troops.

The Russian Bolshevik government has declined to intervene at Helsinki on behalf of the Finnish republic, according to a telegram from Helsinki.

All Ally Envoys May Depart. If the French Ambassador to Russia, Joseph Nolens, is compelled to leave the country, the other representatives of the allies may follow him, says an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Moscow. In Soviet circles, the message continues, it is expected that Nolens will be recalled soon, but if France refuses to do so, he will be declared to be a private citizen.

LONDON, May 17.—An urgent plea for allied intervention in Russia to resist German aggression there is made by the Daily Chronicle. TOKIO, May 13.—(By the Associated Press.)—Important negotiations between the Japanese and Chinese governments for a military understanding are making progress. The fundamental ideal is to reach a military agreement to act in common in the event of the extension of German influence eastward menacing the peace of Asia.

ITALIAN FLYER IS KILLED

CAPTAIN RESNATI FALLS WHILE
TESTING YANKEE CRAFT.

Aviator Had Brilliant Military Record,
Participated in Seven Battles and
Sustained Five Wounds.

NEW YORK, May 17.—Captain Antonio Silvio Resnati, of the Royal Italian Flying Corps, who piloted the ten-passenger Caproni biplane from Washington to New York and back again recently, was killed at noon today at the Hempstead flying field.

Resnati, one of the most famous Italian military aviators, met his death while testing an American-built Caproni plane of the bombing type, recently authorized for purchase by the United States Government.

Flying alone and carrying a cargo of 50 bombs, Captain Resnati left the flying field on what was to have been the first test of the new type of biplane. The machine rose only 100 feet when one of the planes crumpled and it fell backwards. Captain Resnati, strapped to his seat, was unable to release himself in time and one of the three heavy engines crushed him to death.

The accident was due, it is said, to the fact that, apparently forgetting his usual caution, Resnati attempted to turn and rise while the heavy machine was still too near the earth, an error that always results fatally.

Captain Resnati was 25 years old. His military record was as brilliant as his aviation achievements. He took part in seven battles on the Italian front and was wounded five times.

NEBRASKAN GIVES ALL

FARMER SELLS 240-ACRE TRACT
AND THEN JOINS ARMY.

Linn F. Hanson Receives Letter From
President Wilson Commending
Patriotism of Action.

WASHINGTON, May 17.—Linn F. Hanson, a young Nebraska farmer who decided his country needed him and therefore sold his property, bought liberty bonds, gave to the Red Cross and joined the Army, has received a commendatory letter from President Wilson.

Hanson had 240 acres near Wayne, Neb. Selling that and all his goods, he bought \$2000 to the Red Cross and \$1000 worth of liberty bonds. He then joined the military service and now is a member of an infantry regiment stationed at Pensacola, Fla. During the recent third liberty loan campaign he took \$4500 worth of bonds.

President Wilson has written to Hanson as follows:

"Indirectly through a friend I have learned of all the circumstances of your joining the military forces of the United States and I want to send you this brief line to express my admiration of the spirit which prompts your action and prompts your whole course in connection with leaving your farm and throwing in your fortunes entirely and unreservedly with the great country we all love and seek to serve."

SONS GET PALMER RICHES

Potter and Honore to Divide Estate
as Result of Mother's Death.

CHICAGO, May 17.—The personal property left by "Mr. Potter Palmer, the society leader who died last week in Florida, was \$1,600,000. This is exclusive of the trust estate left by Mrs. Palmer's husband, which 12 years ago was estimated at \$3,000,000. Mrs. Palmer's will was filed today.

The value of the trust estate is now stated at between \$20,000,000 and \$25,000,000. The income from it, by Mrs. Palmer's death, now goes to the two sons, Potter and Honore. The will makes several important charitable bequests as follows:

To sons, to be used for philanthropy, \$400,000; to United Charities of Chicago, \$100,000; to Art Institute, Chicago, art works worth \$100,000. Many bequests are made to relatives and faithful employees of Mrs. Palmer's household and Florida estate. H. H. Edmonds, of Los Angeles, Cal., is given \$10,000.

GOOD ROADS BEING BUILT

Vancouver Reports Progress in
Highway Improvement.

VANCOUVER, Wash., May 17.—(Special.)—The road between Vancouver and Camas is now in good condition. The city street department is repairing the river road from Vancouver Barracks to the city limits, a mile in length, and this now is a good thoroughfare.

The road will be paved for about four miles from Fishers to Camas this year. Plans for the paving have been approved by the Highway Commission's office. An effort is being made to have the road paved from Vancouver to Washougal, under the Donohue law, which assures part of the cost of adjoining property and gives owners a term of years in which to pay for the improvement.

AUSTRIA FACES RISING OF CZECHS

Deputy Stonek Said to Have
Conveyed Threat of Bloody
Revolution to Come.

JUGO-SLAVS GET READY

Premier Wexlerie, in Address to
Parliament, Says New Alliance
With Germany Improves
Mutual Relations.

WASHINGTON, May 17.—According to an official dispatch from Paris today, a telegram to the Matin from Zurich, it is asserted that the Czech delegation in Vienna, through their leader, Deputy Stonek, has declared that if the Austrian government proceeds to establish German districts in Bohemia, the Czech nation will answer with a bloody revolution. The dispatch says Jugo-Slav circles are preparing for a struggle.

AMSTERDAM, May 17.—"The new alliance between Austria-Hungary and Germany will make for better mutual relations," said Premier Wexlerie, of Austria, in an address to the lower house of Parliament. "It can in no wise be taken as a hindrance to relations which might be established eventually with other peoples in the economic domain."

War Aims Not Discussed. "War aims were not discussed," the Premier declared, "for there can be no question of 'war aims.' The alliance aims only at the maintenance of peace in all directions."

"Neither will the alliance be a hindrance to eventual union of the so-called league of nations," the Premier added. "The guarantee of this lies in the fact that we have arranged a purely defensive alliance."

Extension of the Austro-German alliance which, after long years of peace, has tested the test of difficult times and has taken deep hold on the minds of the people, corresponds with what has become an historic necessity," said Baron Burian, Austro-Hungarian Foreign Minister, in an interview with the Vienna correspondent of the Associated Press.

Peace Declared Aim. "It is necessary, owing to the fact that Austria-Hungary and Germany are surrounded by a ring of enemies. The new alliance will be defensive and will serve to bring about peace."

It will show the world that Austria-Hungary and Germany are not to be beaten, and will convert our opponents to peace by the strength of our will for peace."

AMSTERDAM, May 16.—There is a remarkable disparity between advice from Berlin and Vienna regarding the scope of the projected extension of the Austro-German alliance.

Whereas the Berlin version of the pact according to the Cologne Gazette, denies that the alliance is to be embodied in the constitutions of the allied empires, direct advices from Vienna on the same day affirm the contrary. The latter, declaring such embodiment to be a part of the programme.

BERNE, Switzerland, May 17.—Austrian newspapers are exhibiting concern at what they call the feminization of the army. It appears that 36,000 women and girls now are employed in the auxiliary service as clerks, servants, etc., and that others are being enlisted at the rate of 150,000 a month. They are being enrolled at Vienna and sent into the field.
