

FEW EARS ARE DEAF TO RED CROSS CALL

Northwestern Division Raises
\$1,155,884—Oregon Has
Subscribed \$245,000.

MULTNOMAH ALONE LAGS

Official Figures of \$62,000 Raised,
However, Really Include Only
Two Hours of Actual Work of
Red and White Rose Teams.

It had not been officially reported. Unofficial reports from industrial plants indicate that these are alive to the call, and it is obvious that the shipbuilding, fir and kindred industries are endeavoring to make a record of one day's pay per cent.

It was pointed out that but two hours' real work was included in the official local figure of \$62,000, which even includes \$15,000 from the "flying squadron," in addition to the work of the team captains. There is hope and resolve that today will bring better results.

State Has Less Than \$100,000 to Get.

The total at an early hour last night in the state at large was \$262,443, with less than \$100,000 remaining before the state attained its quota.

The following counties have entirely made their quotas: Deschutes, Douglas, Hood River, Josephine, Lake, Lincoln, Marion, Morrow, Polk, Sherman, Tillamook, Umatilla, Union, Walla and Wasco.

On the morning of such a day as May brings, the Portland campaign set out yesterday in their purposeful crusade throughout the city. In the office buildings and stores of the central section the "Red Rose" and the "White Rose" brigades traveled perpendicular miles from floor to floor in their contest for the cause.

Two "Rose" Brigades Are Close.

At noon they rested from their labors, at luncheon in the Hotel Portland, compared experiences and made reports. The two brigades had gathered \$61,940 in two hours' work, with the "Red Rose" leading by \$1,063, as compared with the "White Rose" total of \$30,877.

For the "White Rose" brigade the standing of the teams yesterday noon was: S. P. Lockwood, \$1300; W. J. Burns, \$5000; A. L. Fish, \$650; R. D. Inman, \$3000; J. A. Fowers, \$2000; L. A. Lewis, \$1450; A. H. Deane, \$1140; H. B. Alinworth, \$4812; Jay Smith, \$1386; Edward Newbegin, \$586.

The "Red Rose" brigade, with their narrow margin of temporary victory, reported these totals: Everett Ames, \$3474; W. L. Brewster, \$375; F. S. Doernbecker, \$4408; H. S. Hirsch, \$2454; Thomas Kerr, \$1722; Drake O'Reilly, \$878; R. L. Sabin, \$1288; W. D. Skinner, \$2655; Nathan Strauss, \$6147; Dr. W. W. Young, \$299.

Meantime the house-to-house division, from 300 precinct centers in the residence districts of the city, went out with similar resolve. Led by Rufus C. Holman and Frank McGriffa, colonels, and W. J. Hofmann and Fred W. Burdard, lieutenant-colonels, summoning housewives to the doors and giving the message of the Red Cross. Everywhere they found the spirit of giving ready and abundant.

Good stories in every patriotic campaign always come back from the industrial plants, and the one that breezed in from the shipyards of the Northwest Steel Company yesterday noon is typical of the camaraderie of the cause.

Sergeant Whittingham Offered Job.

Sergeant Whittingham, of the Victoria Battalion of Canadians, who stopped more than 1000 times at the door of a high-explosive shell and retired from active service, spoke to the shipbuilders. He told them of France and the price that men are paying there for the perpetration of such liberty as America stands for. Sans one leg and with a withered hand, the young Canadian made no plea for sympathy, but urged upon them a realization of the task to which this nation turns.

So the shipbuilders of the Northwest Steel Company appraised him as a good fellow, sought out their superintendents and requested that a place be made for the Canadian sergeant in the company's employment. The answer was as spontaneous as the request, and a position was at once given him.

"If the Canadian government will relieve me, and permit me to accept, you can bet that I'll take the job," declared Sergeant Whittingham.

Selfishness Is Punished.

While one job is offered for loyalty to the cause, another is taken for self-centered selfishness. It was at the plant of the Clark & Wilson Lumber Company yesterday that an employee found him discharge waiting for him when he declined to give to the Red Cross.

Employees of the company, proud of their record of being the first 100 per cent unit of the industrial plants, would not brook the retention of the blunder. In the company's logging camps the men gave \$770, and at the Linnton mill they gave \$834. The company added to these gifts an even \$1000, making a total of \$2604.

Close on this report came one from the Portland Woolen Mills that employees of that plant had attained 100 per cent subscription within a few minutes after hearing the story that Lieutenant MacKinnon, of the Canadian Scouts, was to tell of the war with the men voluntarily doubled their subscriptions. It is a matter of pride with the mill's employees that they have oversubscribed every quota set for them in any patriotic drive.

AMOUNT ASKED IS EXCEEDED

Polk County Gives \$12,030, With
More Expected Before Close.

DALLAS, Or., May 21.—(Special.)—The value of a County Council of Defense has been demonstrated in the second Red Cross war drive in Polk County. Through this organization reports received by Dr. A. B. Starbuck, county chairman, indicate that the county's quota of \$12,000 has been raised in bona fide cash subscriptions. Reports amounting to \$12,030 have been received and several districts have not reported.

MAUDE WILL HELP

Gentlest Donkey in Captivity
to Serve Red Cross.

ANIMAL ALL DRESSED UP

G. D. Williamson Gives Family Pet
to Be Auctioned at Liberty Temple, Proceeds to Be Devoted
to Cause of Mercy.

Her name is "Maude." She is docile, sleek and shod with four twinkling hoofs. Her eyes are mild and amiable, her appetite for sugar is a scandal to Hoover and the tip of her gracie tail is a diminutive bell-shaped whisk. She makes friends with children as readily as children make friends with her.

"Maude" is a donkey, perfect in pace and deportment, and she is but one of many rare articles that will be sold at the Red Cross auction to be held tomorrow, commencing at noon and continuing until night, from the steps of Liberty Temple.

It was Fred Spoerl and E. C. Harris, accounting for war funds for the scarlet emblem, who met "Maude's" master, G. D. Williamson, in feed stables at 248 Front street some time yesterday afternoon. They came for cash and the cause, but they glimpsed the rosy satin sides of the mild-eyed "Maude," and money ceased to trouble them. They asked for the donkey, having in mind the Red Cross auction.

Family Pet Sacrificed.

"Fellows," said Mr. Williamson, "she's your'n. I wouldn't take \$250 for that donkey. She's a family pet. But the Red Cross—that's different."

When "Maude" emerged from a shop where tonsorial work for donkeys is all in a day's affairs—at an address you wouldn't recognize—she was trimmer than ever, and she carried her pretty head as though she knew that the Red Cross had claimed her.

This morning she will take a central city jaunt for the cause, bearing saddlebags in which the beneficent public may toss their silver for the war fund. Her escort will be a detail of members of the Newboys' Club and the adventure, while confidentially expected to defray expenses, will be in the nature of an introduction to thousands of Portland folk—some of whom may own "Maude" before the week draws to a close.

Never was such an auction as this will be. That venerable line of the ancient auction poster, to-wit, "too numerous to mention" comes in handy to the escape from detailed data regarding the hundreds of valuable and curious gifts that are to go under the hammer from the steps of Liberty Temple.

Apocryph of the lemon-bued dicker-bird, it was given to the Red Cross by Mrs. A. C. Smith, of 249 Third street, and evinces a disposition to be friendly—a most fortunate circumstance, for, as everyone knows, a fierce canary bird is a fowl most formidable to encounter.

MARSHFIELD, Or., May 21.—(Special.)—Chairman W. E. Douglas, of the Coos and Curry counties Red Cross drive today expressed himself as well satisfied with reports already received and said the quota is well over half subscribed.

COX ORDERED TO REPORT

BUCKAROO PLAYER DRAFTED INTO
SERVICE OF COUNTRY.

Portland Utility Man Due at Tombstone, Ariz., by May 25—Fisher
Losing Valuable Player.

Elmer Joseph (Dick) Cox, popular Portland baseball player, has been ordered to report at Tombstone, Ariz., for military duty by May 25. Such was the message received in Portland yesterday from Manager Bill Fisher, of the Buckerroos.

A letter received at baseball headquarters Monday addressed to Cox was forwarded to the Buckerroo catcher at Tacoma, where the Portland team is playing this week. Judge McCredie rather expected the massive contained orders requesting Cox to report at Tombstone, Ariz., for duty.

Cox registered for the draft while employed in the mines at Tombstone, and his registration card carried a number which led Cox to believe that he would not be called before next Fall, and planned to enlist at the close of the baseball season. Cox has already served three years in the Navy.

The loss of Cox would leave a big gap for Manager Fisher to fill in the Buckerroo lineup. Cox was an ideal utility

player, being able to capably fill any position on the team. He was a good hitter and possessed a strong arm, with a hard and accurate peg.

Cox was doing the bulk of the catching until he stopped a foul ball with his small right finger and broke the bone. He has been on the disabled list for over two weeks and returned to the game only last Sunday.

FISH FRY TO BE SUNDAY

Jefferson County Annual Gathering
to Be Held at Vanora.

Everybody in the world—except the Kaiser—is invited to the annual Jefferson County fish fry, which will occur Sunday at Cowli's orchard near Vanora, on the bank of the Deschutes River. This event is being prepared for by all the disciples of Isaac Walton in the county and some anglers of Portland will attend, as well.

They have a special way of frying fish at the Jefferson County fry. Large steel plates have been made especially for the purpose and they are used only on this one occasion during the year. There never yet has been a shortage of trout to feed the crowd and the Jefferson fishermen said that there will be plenty on hand Sunday.

R. R. Thompson Estate Sued.

H. F. Bushong, trustee in bankruptcy of the estate of the old Multnomah Ho-

tel Company, a corporation, bankrupt, yesterday filed suit in the United States Court against the R. R. Thompson Estate Company for an accounting involving \$50,469.16. The litigation is the result of business differences between the owners of the hotel property and the original management of the hotel before the present management took the hotel over.

The makeshift distillery raided at 1105 East Yamhill street Monday night by the war emergency squad has turned out hundreds of gallons of grape or raisin brandy, in the opinion of Lieutenant Thatcher, head of the squad, who made further investigation of the case yesterday.

Joe Miller, alleged owner of the plant; J. A. Hill, found in a room upstairs at the time of the raid, and Mrs. D. G. Maxfield, of 29 East Sixth street, said to be an agent for Miller, have been turned over to the Federal authorities for investigation.

It is believed that several more persons are directly connected with the operation of the illicit industry and it is not improbable that some proprietors of soft drink shops will be asked to tell what they know about Miller's alleged activities.
