MOUNT TABOR PARK BIRDS MANY.
 Thirty-one varieties of birds were found within the confines of this city, resident in Mount Tabor Park, by members of the Audubon Society who visited the park on Sunday last, on one of their weekly nature jaunts to nearby points. It is interesting to note, say the members, that Mount Tabor Park was created a bird reserve little more than a year ago and that already the feathered folk appear to realize the protection afforded them and have chosen the park as the site for many a housekeeping venture.

DIVORCE SUITS FILED.—Extreme cruelty is charged by Joseph E. Wands in a suit for divorce filed yesterday in the Circuit Court against Mrs. B. Wands, to whom he was married at Salem in 1905. The complaint was compelled to work most of the time to support herself. In the shortest divorce complaint on record at the Courthouse, Merle Blackall demands a divorce from May Blackall on charges of desertion. They were married in Portland in 1907, and separated in 1911. The divorce complaint contains but 89 words.

D. C. LEWIS GRATEFUL.—D. C. Lewis, who was renominated for State Representative by the Republicans of Multnomah County in the recent primary election, is grateful for that support. "These are war times," said Mr. Lewis yesterday, "and I shall be conservative in all things and lend assistance, in every way possible, to those in authority where such assistance will be a war asset and will work zealously for the welfare of the state and Nation."

ITALIAN HELD FOR HEARING.—Joe Monaco, an Italian, was brought over to the grand jury yesterday by Municipal Judge Rossman on a charge of threatening to kill Mary Spina, an Italian woman. The complaint was brought against Monaco last year, but upon a promise to leave the city permanently, he was not held to the grand jury. Recently he returned to Portland and is said to have made more trouble at the home of the Spina woman.

AUSTRIA MAN BOUND TO JURY.—Archie McNary, who was returned from Austria recently on a charge of issuing a worthless check for \$1024.25, was bound over to the grand jury after a preliminary hearing yesterday before District Judge Bell. He is alleged to have given the check to a local automobile dealer in payment for a car. Because of his peculiar actions he will be examined by an insanity commission.

SPIRITUALIST HELD TO GRAND JURY.—Sam Martin, a spiritualist, living at 201 East Thirty-third street, who was arrested by Officers Thomas and Elliot of the war emergency squad, for carrying concealed weapons, was held to the grand jury yesterday by Municipal Judge Rossman. The complaint against him was made by Miss Minnie Lang, who told the court that Martin had made threats against her life.

GILMAN'S ASSETS. \$2,322.47.—Ernest W. Hardy, receiver of Gilman's Music House, yesterday filed in the Federal bankruptcy court a schedule of the assets of the embarrassed institution, showing an aggregate of \$2,322.47. The amount of accommodation paper not estimated or listed, the liabilities of the concern, according to a statement filed several days ago, amount to \$1,345,328.63.

MAGANAS PLAN MOONLIGHT HIKER.—The Maganas and friends will assemble at Twenty-third and Washington streets at 8:15 P. M. tonight and walk through Washington Park over Arlington Heights following the trail along the right of hill behind the canyon and Barnes road. At a convenient spot a campfire session will be held. Return will be made to the city by the Barnes road. Leader, Mary Oene Smith.

AUTO STEALING IN CHARGE.—Charged with the theft of an automobile from Anna Christensen, Anton Olsen, a shipyard worker, was arrested yesterday by Deputy Constables Glose and Watkins on a warrant charging larceny by bailee. Olsen is alleged to have purchased the car from Miss Christensen and then taken the machine out of the state before he completed his payments.

RAILWAY COMPANY IS SUED.—Suit for \$2000 damages against the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company was started yesterday by Edward H. Savage, who alleged he was seriously injured December 22, 1917, when a street car crashed into an automobile in which he was riding. He sustained a fractured skull and other injuries.

SHIPBUILDING COMPANY.—Max Bergman, formerly employed at the Columbia Shipbuilding Company, yesterday appeared before District Judge Bell and pleaded guilty to a complaint charging him with the theft of a quantity of paint and tools from the company. He was fined \$100 and then served notice of appeal to the Circuit Court.

PATRIOTIC CONCERT SCHEDULED.—There will be a patriotic and Red Cross night at the Men's Resort tonight at 8 o'clock. The Gaiety orchestra of six pieces will play patriotic airs of America and the allies. Mary Ellen Mullin will be soloist and Sergeant Bely, of the Canadian army, will speak. The meeting is open to the public.

DEPENDANT ATTORNEY GIVES VERDICT.—A verdict for the defendant was returned yesterday by a jury in Circuit Judge Gaiety's court in the case brought by Mrs. E. M. Farnham against P. D. Cunningham, as the result of alleged permanent injuries sustained in an automobile accident May 23, last.

AERO LETTER NOVEL

First Missive Sent by Aerial Mail Reaches Portland.

S. R. HEMPHILL RECIPIENT

Route Between Washington, Philadelphia and Chicago Forerunner of Net of Aero Lines to Cover Whole World.

Darius Green's steadfast faith in his flying machine has been justified at last. The widest flights of this third reader hero of other days did not include aeroplane mail delivery on definite schedule. But even that has come to pass.

Monday the first letter to be carried by aerial mail arrived in Portland. It was the first AERO-MAIL LETTER TO ARRIVE IN PORTLAND RECEIVED HERE YESTERDAY.

was mailed in New York and bore one of the new 24-cent Government aero mail stamps, which entitled it to be carried from New York to Washington, D. C., by aeroplane. From there it was sent on its way to Portland by the new route.

S. R. Hemphill, of Hemphill's Trade Schools, Twentieth and Hawthorne streets, was the proud recipient of the aeroplane letter. He was especially selected for the honor because he represents the Aerial League of America in this state.

"The aerial mail route between New York, Washington and Philadelphia is the forerunner of a network of aero mail lines which will cover the entire world within a few years," says the president of the Aerial League of America, who dispatched the letter to Mr. Hemphill. "Within six months we will see the crossing of the Atlantic by air. Several aeroplanes are now under construction which are capable of making the flight, which will lead to the establishment of transatlantic aerial mail lines as well as the delivery of aeroplanes to our allies by air."

"Mail can be sent by aero post to every postoffice in the United States. Letters for all points south and west of Philadelphia may be sent by aero post, if they are marked 'via New York-Philadelphia' or 'via Washington.' The aeroplane permits making quicker train connections. Therefore the delivery of a letter will be advanced a number of hours. For the time being only letters and a limited number of parcels post packages can be sent by aero post. Parcels must be not more than 30 inches in length and length combined and must weigh not over two pounds."

"The aero post affords our aviators much-needed cross-country flying training on schedule time and helps in other ways the building of our aero forces. As soon as the Portland postoffice receives a supply of the new aero stamps letters may be sent to New York and far Eastern points using the aero route between Washington and New York. This would save little in time, but would have the attraction of novelty. Soon routes will be established from one coast to the other and time will be greatly reduced."

BURGLARS BUSY IN CITY

POLICE INVESTIGATING NUMBER OF SMALL CRIMES.

Dwellings and Places of Business Are Ransacked by Thieves, Who Take Money and Valuables.

The police are investigating a series of burglaries that have been committed within the last few days, both in the business district and the East Side residential district.

On Sunday the Buchanan building, on Washington between Fourth and Fifth streets, was the scene of three burglaries. The newspaper offices of the Advocate Publishing Company, the Northwest Hotel News and the Acorn Press were entered and the places ransacked.

ROADS WILL BE PATROLED

All Persons in Machines Will Be Stopped and Asked to Contribute to Organization—Workers Also Will Solicit in Buildings.

BRITISH GIVE MANY EGGS

40,000,000 Donated to Hospital for Wounded Soldiers.

"British poultrymen have donated 40,000,000 eggs to the hospitals for wounded soldiers since the beginning of the war," said Dr. Edward Brown, president of the International Association.

Every automobile on any pleasure boulevard surrounding Portland, as well as in the parks, will be stopped Thursday, Friday and Saturday by "Red Crossettes," who will wave a Red Cross flag at the autoists and request them to stop and deliver—for the society.
