

RYAN STILL LEADS IN TREASURER RACE

Complete Returns From 27 of 36 Counties Show Oregon City Man 175 Ahead.

HOFF SECOND IN CONTEST

Fred Williams Apparently Is Nominated for Commissioner With Lead of 578 Votes Over Frank J. Miller.

With the official returns complete from 27 of the 36 counties of Oregon, and unofficial returns from several counties, Thomas F. Ryan is still shown to be in the lead for the Republican nomination for State Treasurer by 175 votes over O. P. Hoff. This contest has been close throughout most of the count and the result still is in doubt and may not be known until completion of the official count in practically all of the counties.

The total vote shown by returns received by The Oregonian up to the hour of going to press was as follows for the two leading candidates for the nomination for State Treasurer:

Ryan, 17,800.
Hoff, 17,625.
Ryan's lead, 175.
In the contest between Fred A. Williams and Frank J. Miller for the nomination as Republican candidate for Public Service Commissioner the lead was held by Mr. Williams in the additional returns received during the day and giving a slight increase in his lead. The totals are as follows:

Williams' lead, 578.
Will H. Hornbrook, of Albany, former United States Senator, to Sinn, and now editor of the Albany Democrat, has been elected Democratic National Committeeman over J. W. Morrow, of Portland, by a majority shown by the returns received to be 1273. From Albany comes information that Mr. Hornbrook has practically complete returns from every county in the state and claims election by a majority of 1800.

ALBANY EDITOR NOMINATED

Will Hornbrook Leads in State by Approximately 1500 Votes.

ALBANY, Or., May 22.—(Special).—Will H. Hornbrook, editor of the Albany Democrat and Ex-United States Senator, has been elected Democratic National Committeeman from Oregon by a majority of approximately 1500. Mr. Hornbrook has received returns direct from the county clerks of the various counties in the state and this estimate of his majority is based on these returns.

Complete returns from most of the counties and incomplete returns from others show a majority in his favor of 1098. He has no definite returns yet from Douglas, Clatsop and Washington counties, all of which he carried, but estimating the vote in those counties and the complete vote of other counties on the basis of their incomplete returns, it is estimated that his majority will be close to 1500.

WOMAN LEADS IN UMATILLA

Miss Grace Gilliam Receives Republican Nomination for Treasurer.

PENDLETON, Or., May 22.—(Special).—Miss Grace Gilliam, Umatilla County Treasurer, led the Republican county ticket in number of votes, according to the official count, with a vote of 1913. All of the Republican officers who were unopposed received the Democratic endorsement.

The only county candidates nominated by the Democrats were N. Berkeley, Senator from the Nineteenth District, Lou Hodges and Ella Terpening, Representatives, Twenty-third District, T. D. Taylor, Sheriff, and L. J. McIntyre, County Commissioner. Justices of the Peace Joe H. Parkes, of Pendleton, J. L. Miller, of Milton-Freewater, and W. H. Cray, of Echo, received the endorsement of both parties.

Malheur Nominates Woman.

VALE, Or., May 22.—(Special).—Arthur Moody, Democrat incumbent, was renominated for Clerk. V. G. Staples was written in for the Republican nomination. C. C. Mueller, Republican incumbent, was renominated for Treasurer, while Mary Glenn received the Democratic nomination for Sheriff. Deputy Sheriff, received the nomination of both parties for Sheriff.

IRISH FEUD BITER

Breach Between Two Factions Appears Widened.

SINN FEIN GAINS SLIGHT

Nationalists Believe That Revolutionary Tactics Are Unfavorable to Chances of Satisfactory Settlement.

DUBLIN, May 22.—The events of the last few days have not drawn as much support to the Sinn Fein as they expected from the more moderate Irish parties. Indeed, there are indications that the feud between the Sinn Fein and the Nationalists has only grown more bitter.

To sum up the attitude of the two factions it may be said the Nationalists believe in constitutional methods of settling the Irish question, while the Sinn Fein demands revolution and the Nationalists consider that the Sinn Fein party by their revolutionary tactics are spoiling Ireland's best chance of a satisfactory settlement.

Dillon's Attitude Hostile.
If the Sinn Fein expect the arrests of their leaders would draw the Nationalists over to the Sinn Fein they are evidently destined to experience serious disappointment.

John Dillon, an leader of the Nationalists, carefully pointed out in his interview with the Associated Press that he maintains absolute hostility to the Sinn Fein, while indications that the Nationalist party is preparing to repudiate in the most emphatic way the revolutionary spirit of the Sinn Fein party may be found in an editorial in the Evening Telegraph, the official organ of the Nationalist party.

LONDON, May 22.—Mrs. Thomas G. Clark, whose husband was put to death for the part he took in the Irish uprising of 1916, was arrested today.

Thomas Clark, a Dublin storekeeper, was one of the signers of the proclamation announcing the formation of an Irish Republic. He was tried by court-martial and the death sentence was executed in May, 1916.

Indications that the Government has not yet completed all the arrests contemplated by it are seen in the apprehension in Dublin late last night of P. P. Burke, the leading Sinn Fein in the county of Monaghan. Several Sinn Fein leaders in various districts evaded the police after the coup was made in Dublin.

The authorities are directing their attention to all persons who are recognized as suspicious and such men are being stopped in the neighborhood of Dublin and searched.

High-Ups Suspected.
All the best known men of what is regarded as the revolutionary wing of the Sinn Fein are already in custody, but there is a general impression that many influential participants in the alleged conspiracy are persons never heard of by the Irish public.

DUBLIN, May 21.—A further consignment of Sinn Fein prisoners left Dublin today on the way to England. The group consisted of a small number who had been detained at local barracks. Local newspapers say Count Plunkett was the only prominent person in the party.

More Arrests Likely.
The Associated Press correspondent learns that there remains a considerable list of "suspects," who may be taken into custody at any time. Considerable significance is attached to the calling into conference of the military chiefs from Belfast and Cork.

MAGAZINE EXPORT BARRED

June 1 Issue of Saturday Evening Post Has Objectionable Story.

"Collector at New York has denied exportation to South America of June 1 issue of Saturday Evening Post on account of an article ('Last Loophole') Postmaster at New York has been notified. Advise ports in your district."
