

KANSAS, NOT FIRING
LINE, FOR WOOD

General Ordered to Report at
Camp Funston, Fort Riley,
for Duty.

SENATOR DEPLORES MOVE

Johnson of California Regrets Policy
That Prevents Officer From
Accompanying Division to
Front in France.

WASHINGTON, May 31.—(Special.)—Secretary of War Baker announced today that Major-General Leonard Wood will return to his old post at Camp Funston, Fort Riley, Kan., for temporary duty in connection with preparations for the departure of troops of the 89th Division remaining there.

Present indications are that this temporary duty will be extended to keep General Wood at Camp Funston. Another officer will probably be selected for the post of commander of the Western Department at San Francisco, to which General Wood was assigned when relieved of command of the division he had trained just as it was ready to sail for France.

General Wood has gone to New York to arrange to take Mrs. Wood back to Kansas. He had brought his wife to New York and engaged apartments when he expected to go to France in command of his division.

Johnson Expresses Regret.
Senator Hiram Johnson, of California, voiced deep regret in the Senate today that, in this hour when, as President Wilson said in his recent message, "politics is adjourned," the services of Major-General Leonard Wood should not be utilized in France.

"I wish to express my very deep regret," said Senator Johnson, "that in this crisis the services of such a distinguished soldier as General Wood should not be utilized."

"I speak but a personal opinion. I do not know General Wood, except as the Nation knows him as one of our most accomplished, able and intrepid commanders—men officers with a brilliant record whose services to the republic have entitled him to the high esteem, indeed, the affection of our people."

"It was in this day when 'politics is adjourned' I read of this eminent General, pursuant to his orders, arriving with his command at the point of embarkation, only to be met as he was about to take ship for France, with orders sending him back to the Far West."

Men Like Wood Needed.
"We have dire need for such men, dire need for such a soldier and General."

"It is with sadness that I voice my great regret that those across the sea who bear our flag and fight our battles are, particularly in such circumstances, deprived of the ability and aid of General Wood."

General discussion which had been expected of the controversy regarding General Wood's demotion did not materialize.

In the House, Representative Olney, Democrat, of Massachusetts, said he hoped the day was not far distant when General Pershing and General Wood would be fighting side by side in France.

Fifty thousand graduates of the Plattsburg camp, which General Wood established, Mr. Olney said, were "waiting for Wood" to be assigned to an overseas command.

WASHINGTON, May 31.—Orders detailing Brigadier-General Charles G. Treat to duty in Italy were issued by the War Department today.

Orders May Be Revoked.
It was said that the orders might be revoked as they are contingent to some extent on the final assignment of Major-General Leonard Wood, who, though assigned to command the Western Department, probably will be transferred at his own request to a divisional command.

General Treat is now in command of the Western department, with headquarters at San Francisco.

The exact duties intended for General Treat have not been disclosed. Two other general officers of the Army already are in Italy, Brigadier-General George P. Scriven, in Rome as military attaché, and Major-General Eben Swift, heading the special military mission.

The fact that General Scriven was recalled from the retired list to take his present duty led to the belief that his position that he is to be relieved by General Treat.

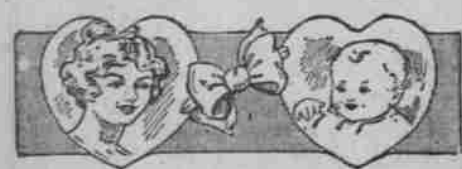

PAVING COST REDUCED

CLIFTON-STREET JOB CHEAPEST
EVER DONE IN CITY.

Work Done by Municipal Repair Plant
at Outlay of \$0.478 per
Square Yard.

Improvement of 348 square yards on Clifton street between Park and West Park streets by the laying of a two-inch asphalt concrete has been completed at a cost of \$327.63, or \$0.478 per square yard. This work was done by the municipal repair plant under the direction of R. S. Dulin.

This price, the lowest charge for any similar job completed in Portland, included not only the cost of quarrying the old macadam roadway, bringing it to uniform grade, but charge of 10 cents per square yard for maintenance and depreciation of the municipal paving repair plant was added.

The lowest charge exacted from the city for similar work by private contractors was \$1.04 per square yard, according to the records in the department of public works. The cost of asphalt is fully one-half greater now than it was three years ago, when the job referred to was completed. The cost of labor has increased at least 33 1/3 per cent.

The Clifton-street job is the second repair work done since the plant began operation. The first work was done on Mulberry street in the latter addition at a cost of less than \$1 per square yard.

U-BOAT IN MID-ATLANTIC
Vessel Reaches Port After Being
Fired Upon by Boche Diver.

AN ATLANTIC PORT, May 31.—Officers of a steamer arriving here today from a foreign port report that the vessel was fired on by a German submarine in mid-ocean and that a torpedo missed the boat by only two feet.

As a warning was shouted by the lookout, who had observed the periscope, the steamer swung about and took a zig-zag course. The next morning a torpedo was seen heading toward the ship, barely missing it.

Before a shot could be fired the submarine dived.
