WOODEN SHOES MAKE THEIR APPEARANCE IN CITY STREETS

Lieutenant Huntington Sends French Sabots Home to His Wife, Who Wears Them in Public.

Mrs. A. J. Huntington, of this city, who set the fashion to lower the high cost of shoes in Portland, Mrs. Huntington, whose husband, Lieutenant Huntington, is with Company F, 162d Infantry, over seas, has received from him a pair of little wooden shoes, sabots, just such as are worn now by many women in Paris. The sabots are painted black.

Yesterday Mrs. Huntington wore her new shoes and went clippety-clap down the main street, her trim little ankles attracting attention and all the children were following and admiring, wishing they had some wooden shoes.

Mrs. Huntington says the new footwear is comfortable and should be used for the kiddies, who would and them durable and at the same time cool for summer and easy to kick off when wading offered an opportunity.

"In any event, we will continue with our efforts to provide free tolls for the soldiers, and if present plans are found to be in every way feasible, these tolls will be eliminated within the next few weeks," Mr. Holman said yesterday.

"This movement is in line with the Government's recent announcement that soldiers' railroad fares hereafter will be one cent a mile. The Government wants to offer every assistance to the men in uniform, and it behooves us of Multnomah County to offer similar aid insofar as we can legally do so."

NEW PLAN IS PROPOSED
 Pending Decision of Attorneys-General of Oregon and Washington, County May Furnish Tickets to Men in Uniform.

Within the next few weeks there is every probability that soldiers at Vancouver and nearby cantonments will be relieved of all bridge tolls on the interstate bridge, if plans which are now being formulated by Chairman Holman, of the bridge commission, are found to be feasible.

Although the plan to relieve the soldiers of tolls was first taken up more than two months ago, the laws of the state of Oregon and Washington are held to be such that rebates to men in uniform could not be legally made, in opinions handed down by District Attorney Evans, of Multnomah County, and District Attorney Blair, of Clarke County, Wash.

Upon the advice of the two District Attorneys, Mr. Holman has written letters to the Attorneys-General of Oregon and Washington asking if some method could not be found whereby soldiers could be relieved of tolls. Replies from these officials are expected by the bridge commission this week.

County May Furnish Tickets.

In the event that the Attorneys-General hold that soldiers must continue paying tolls, Chairman Holman, of the Multnomah County board, will lay before that body a plan whereby Multnomah County will provide tickets for tolls for all soldiers crossing the bridge on personal business free of all cost. It is planned to purchase these tickets for soldiers out of this county's net profits from the interstate bridge tolls.

Mr. Holman said yesterday the Legislature of Oregon and Washington at the coming sessions would be asked to pass remedial laws which will permit free use of the interstate bridge to soldiers in uniform while on personal business.

"It is no more than right that these soldiers should be shown every facility possible by the people of Portland," he said. "Out of their meager earnings of about \$30 a month, the men in uniform cannot afford to pay these tolls several times weekly, and as long as Portland is the central meeting place of soldiers it is no more than right that this city do everything within its power to assist them."

Chamber of Commerce Interested.

The bridge-toll question was taken up recently with the board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce, who unanimously agreed that the bridge tolls for soldiers should be eliminated if possible.

As much as the two state Legislatures will, without doubt, pass the necessary laws relieving soldiers of tolls early after the first of the year, it is believed by Chairman Holman that Multnomah County will be willing to forego a small portion of its bridge profits for the remainder of the year in order to provide free bridge facilities for the men in uniform.

If this latter plan is adopted, the

county will have a supply of special tickets for soldiers printed, which will be distributed among the men stationed at Vancouver. 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FAREWELL PARTY GIVEN

Jewish Draft Contingent Entertained Before Departure.

Affair at B'nai B'rith Temple Is Arranged by Welfare Board and B'nai B'rith Lodges.

Jewish men and boys who are off to war under the latest selective call were entertained at a farewell party Saturday night at B'nai B'rith Temple. The programme was arranged by the Jewish Welfare Board in co-operation with the B'nai B'rith lodges. Twenty-five

Portland Jewish men leave at this time, and a number of them were at the temple for the farewell party.

Rabbi Joseph B. Wise and Alexander Bernstein were among the speakers, setting forth the principles which should guide the Jewish boys during their Army life. Mrs. Herman Politz sang and there were other diversions. About 50 attended. Adolph Solomon presided.

The Jewish Welfare Board is doing for the Jewish men in the Army and Navy what the Y. M. C. A. and Knights of Columbus are doing for men of other faiths. Its work is supplemental and co-operative, field secretaries, chaplains and huts being established in the various camps. The Portland branch was organized several weeks ago on the occasion of a visit to Portland from Rabbi De Sola Pool, of New York. Joseph Simon is president of the Portland branch; Mrs. Isaac Swett, vice-president; Mrs. Julius Louison, secretary, and Joseph Shemanski, treasurer. The National organization has raised about \$1,000,000 to carry on the work, and its records show that there was a net time ago about 50,000 Jewish volunteer men and boys in the military branch of the service, exclusive of several thousand who have joined since.

BOARDS ARE READY

Preparations Made for Registering Youths of 21.

REGULATIONS ARE ISSUED

Failure to Register Is Punishable by Imprisonment for Year, and May Cause Loss of Rights and Immediate Induction in Army.

Locally, there remains little to be done in preparation for registration Wednesday of all young men of the 21-year-old class, to be accomplished throughout the Nation on that day.

Draft board members will direct the work of enrolling the young men, but in cases where the divisions are large volunteer assistants will help. In some districts two registration offices will be maintained, one board will have three, the others will accomplish the task at the regular headquarters.

Instructions Are Issued.
 Comprehensive instructions have been issued by heads of the selective service. Localized with the insertion of street addresses where the person to be registered is located, the instructions follow:

"Who must register—All male persons (citizens or aliens) born between June 5, 1896, and June 5, 1917, inclusive, except officers and enlisted men of the regular Army, Navy and Marine Corps and the National Guard and Navy Militia while in Federal service and officers in Officers' Reserve Corps and enlisted men in enlisted Reserve Corps who are in active service."

"Where—At the office of local board having jurisdiction where the person to be registered permanently resides, or other place designated by that local board. Multnomah County registration office, 407 Stevens building; No. 19, St. Johns City Hall; No. 11, 325 Courthouse, office in Gresham, Or.

"How—Go in person, on June 5, to your registration place. If you expect to be absent from home on June 5, go at once to the office of the local board and have your name placed on the registration card filled out and certified. Mail it to the local board having jurisdiction where you permanently reside. Enclose a self-addressed stamped envelope, with your registration card, for the return of your registration certificate. Failure to get the certificate may cause delay and inconvenience. You must mail your registration card in time to reach your home local board on June 5, if you are in doubt as to what to do or where to register, consult your local board."

"Penalty for not registering—Failure to register is a misdemeanor punishable by imprisonment for one year. It may result in loss of valuable rights and privileges and immediate induction into military service."

FLOUR HOARD IS FOUND

TWO TILLAMOOK COUNTY GERMAN ORDERED ARRESTED.

Seventeen Sacks of Cereal, Stowed Away in Attics of Enemy Aliens Are Brought to Light.

Warrants were issued Saturday by Assistant United States Attorney Rankin for the arrest of Fred Kobbler and his son, Fred Kobbler, Jr., unnaturalized German ranchers living near Mohler, Tillamook County, on the charge of hoarding wheat flour in violation of the act of May 19, 1917.

Deputy United States Marshal Pace left yesterday for Mohler and will return tomorrow morning. The men will be held in the Multnomah County Jail until they are able to post the required cash bail.

Insurances of the warrants for the arrest of the two men was based on the report of William Glover, secret service agent, and Sheriff W. L. Campbell, of Tillamook County, that on their visit to the Kobbler homes the officers found only one 50-pound sack of flour at each place. The officers then visited the general merchandise store at Mohler and seized the proprietor's books, in which the accounts with the Kobbles showed the sale of a barrel of flour each to father and son in the months of December and January last.

Armed with this information, the officers returned to the homes and found two German men removing the boards from the ceiling of an upstairs room in each of the homes, the sleuths found cached away in the attic seven 50-pound sacks in one house and 10 sacks of the same size in the other.

In the search for the flour the officers also found in the possession of the two enemy aliens two long-range rifles, two .25-caliber rifles, one pump gun and one double-barreled shotgun.

During the course of an average day such calls numbering more than 5000 have been transmitted over the lines of the company, causing not only extra labor on the part of the operators, but also tying up lines needed for regulation calls.

NAVY REJECTIONS MANY

NINETEEN PORTLAND MEN REFUSED AND 19 ARE ADMITTED.

Numbers of Men from Shipyards Seek to Enlist Because of Belief That Class 1 Men Will Be Drafted.

What's the matter with Portland's young men?

This question forced itself upon members of the Naval Reserve recruiting party, anchored at Liberty Place, as they Saturday night checked up results of the day's efforts to find an exact division, 50-50, of accepted and rejected applicants. There had been 19 coming weeks.
